Council Discusses Cribbing Problem Here at Albright

How do college students taking a blood test relate to public? It seems they do, as was pointed out in last Thursday's Student Council meeting.

The session began with the usual committees reporting. Joyce Thompson and Harold Matter were approved as co-chairmen of the Parents' Weekend. Council approved of the Junior Class selection of John Werley and Walt Hayum as Business Manager and Editor respectively of the 1950 Cue.

William Marlow opened a discussion on cribbing here at Albright. It seems this vice has taken on a proportion unhealthy for all concerned. Beverly Bresler's report on a survey of academic dishonesty contributed some concrete, but not conclusive facts to bear out this contention. Marlow suggested the need for some type of counter movement to combat this large-scale cribbing. Professor Clyde Harding explained the Honor System which seems to work well at all-women or all-men colleges. It was generally agreed that the system would not work at Albright but that we need to combat cribbing.

Under new business, Miss Thompson moved that all Council

members take a blood test. This was the beginning of how college students taking a blood test relates to publicity. Some Council members, unsure of what she meant, asked when the test was to be taken as well as a few other of the details. It was pointed out that since no time was specified, then students married in Pennsylvania had no need for the test, since the test is required before marriage. The discussion revealed that the state of Pennsylvania is conducting a special campaign against venereal diseases. For that reason, the Community General Hospital is authorized to give free blood tests for a limited time to detect syphilis. It was suggested that the whole idea should be publicized, that we students should avail ourselves to the tests for the prestige we would lend to the worthy cause. Students taking the test, said Miss Thompson, would help make the socially unacceptable test more acceptable in the public's eye. The motion was reworded to the effect that Student Council members should go as a group at a time to be decided to take the blood tests. Council members agreed with a majority vote for the motion.

Organizations Vie For Stunt Night Gold Cup Prize
