



1984 vs. 1984


"The sum total of this diversity is greater than its individual worth."






"Knowledge is strength, not ignorance."

At AC, the fall semester embodies the




Something Old ... Something New

Arms and the Man







Arms and the Man, George Bernard Shaw's comedy of Bulgarian bungling, melodramatic mixups, and remarkable reverses, opened the Domino Players Company '83-'84 season.

Shavian comedy demands honesty, accuracy, and credibility. Shaw's humor is discovered when the audience finds the characters, who must remain believable, to be unbelievable. This strange paradox is the very heart of **Arms and the Man.**

The setting of the play is an imaginary Bulgarian/Serbian war. Fleeing from the arms of war, Captain Bluntschli falls into the arms of Raina Petkoff, the unwilling heroine. He relates to her the true story of her fiance's bold but stupid cavalry charge, contradicting the more embellished story of her mother. As the plot continues to unravel, the romantic ideals and pretentions of the Bulgarians

are shattered and stripped away by the clever and blunt Captain Bluntschlip

Arms marked Dr. Lynn Morrow's 30th production at Albright. The cast of theatre newcomers and veterans included Kieran Shea, Diane Weaver, Jeffrey Lentz, Sue Tennis, Elizabeth Kress, Todd Kelly, Tim Smith, and Dr. Arthur Hilt

The colorful and versatile Arms set was designed by Ray Rechat, known for his work on the Broadway productions of Annie and The Gin Game and the movie, Death Trap.

The production was an entry in the American Theatre Arts Festival collegiate competition. Lentz was nominated to compete in the Irene Ryan National Acting Competition.

Pinter's works are so distinctive that the term, "theatre of menace," was created to describe his style. Rising to the task of creating a set versatile enough to adequately stage five separate plays was Karen Gerson, designer in residence. In the past year, she has designed 55 shows alone, including the costumes for the Pennsylvania Stage Company production of All My Sons.

With time limitations and the demands of preparing five plays, many students assumed double and triple duties for the festival. Assistant directors were responsible for running rehearsals, actors were in numerous plays, and technical workers were assigned to a variety of crews



MIRRORS OF THE PAST

MIRRORS OF THE PAST MIRRORS OF THE PAST

Albright College supports a unique blend of liberal arts and professionalism

When the religious forefathers of the Evangelical Church assembled in 1856, they expressed their reservations about establishing an institutuion of higher education where clergymen could receive formal training. Yet, the brethren were aware of the intellectual and cultural needs of the youth. Therefore, they consented to the founding of Union Seminary — an institution dedicated to the goals of a liberal arts program and governed under the auspices of the church council. Located in New Berlin, Union County, PA, the seminary was structured as a secondary school rather than a theological institution.

In this learning institution, the primary objective was to teach students how to think. The earliest academic courses focused upon public speaking, reading the classics, and writing. The college catalog listed eight faculty members and a student enrollment of 200. For students, literary societies provided extra-curricular activities. These societies were entitled the "Excelsior" and "Neocosmian." The members presented papers and were criticized by their peers. These debating sessions provided ample opportunities for students to express themselves publically. In 1887, Union Seminary was rechartered Central Pennsylvania College.

Four years later, the Evangelical Church suffered a schism which resulted in the Evangelical Association and the United Evangelical Church. The latter congregation established the Albright Collegiate Institute at Myerstown, PA, in 1895. After three years, the institute was chartered as Albright College. The

Central Pennsylvania College and Albright College merged as Albright College of Myerstown in 1902. Simultaneously, the Evangelical Association founded Schuylkill Seminary originally located at Reading, PA, but later removed to Fredericksburg, PA, in 1886. In 1902, the Schuylkill Seminary returned to Reading and rechartered as Schuylkill College in 1923. The two congregations reunited in 1922 and in 1928 the Greater Albright College of Reading was created from the merger of Albright College, Myerstown, and Schuylkill College, Reading. Thus, the genealogy of Albright College is outlined; a most noteworthy history.

History denotes a dichotomy of change and continuity. While the "Excelsior" and "Neocosmian" literary societies no longer exist, Albright College preserves and champions the ideals of a liberal arts education which were established by the original Union Seminary. While our technological society dictates the need for highly trained technical people, Albright College supports a unique blend of liberal arts and professionalism. The high calibre of academic standard instructs students to think while preparing them for professional occupations. Outside the classroom, Albrightians learn in other settings from living in a dormitory to participating in a variety of activities including organizations and intercollegiate sports. Albrightians are afforded many opportunities to explore and to satiate their intellectual, cultural, social, and athletic interests.

WINDOWS OF THE FUTURE WINDOWS OF THE FUTURE

What awaits Albright College in the future? While no one can forecast the events of 1988, 1999, or 2034 (the 50th reunion of the Class of 1984), Albrightians can perceive a positive outlook for the college's existance. According to President Ruffer, Albright College will remain committed to the ideals of a liberal arts education and a high standard of academic excellence. Ruffer projects that Albright will preserve its small college atmosphere because it is conducive to fostering a liberal arts program. "Liberal arts is a fresh breath of education. The acceptance of ideas and the exchange of thoughts help students survive in an ambiguous society."

From President Ruffer's perspective, the exchange of ideas can not be hindered. "Ideas make faith grow." This theory is supported by Ruffer as well as the Methodist Church which is presently affiliated with Albright College. "Values must be discussed and explored in the college setting where freedom permits the discussion and clarification of values. Thus the objectives of a liberal arts education will be nurtured and permitted to grow at Albright College."

Albright's optimistic future is a product of its rich heritage. In 1956, Drs. F. Wilbur Gingrich and Eugene H. Barth coauthored A History of Albright College (Albright College, 1955). These faculty members labored to reconstruct, via the written word, the lifeline of Albright from its inception to its centennial celebration. Dr. Barth plans to publish another volume on Albright's history covering the

memorable events from 1956 to the present.

When contemplating about Albright's future, Dr. Barth foresees an institution that continues to uphold the liberal arts objectives. "A liberal arts institution does not teach specific courses. The courses are taught from perspectives of depth and breadth." Supplementing a strong liberal arts curriculum is a quality enrichment program consisting of featured speakers and events. These activities broaden the minds of members in the Albright and Reading communities. According to Dr. Barth, the portent for the future is the expanding evening program. Also, an outstanding aspect of Albright College is the dedicated faculty. "Professors here provide more than a superficial education. They are interested in the personal growth of a student as well as his intellectual development.

From its incipient stages, Albright College has grown and prospered from a humble seminary to a reputable institution steadfastly devoted to the values of a liberal arts education. These ideals of scholastic excellence and high moral character will be perpetrated in the future by the Greater Albright community.

Albright has always been more than an institution. Our college is a community of individuals who accept the challenges of education and are grateful for the gift of learning. Embodied within each of us is a plethora of knowledge, a reservoir of potential, and a spirit of brotherhood which have and always will characrerize Albright College, our alma mater.

Living it up!









Defense Leads the Way





During the 1983 football season, Albright fans cheered an improved team through a winning season. At the season's close, the Lions had compiled a 6-4 record and the defensive squad ranked second in the Middle Atlantic Conference. The Lion defense, led by seniors Bob Smith and Art Vellutato, proved to be a formidable force while the offensive squad, mentored by senior quarterback Jim Kirkpatrick, did its best to put points on the scoreboard for the Lions.

They vanquished opponents such as Upsala, Wilkes, and Moravian. Unfortunately, the Lions fell short of victory in contests with Deleware Valley and Susquehanna, the MAC champion. The Homecoming game was the highlight of the season when the Lions shutout Lebanon Valley 27-0. After the game, Tim O'Shea '85 and Chris Arnout %5 were named the sportswriters' choices for outstanding lineman and outstanding back.








TOP, L-R: Chip Carey goes for the field goal. John Shultz tries to put it up. Time out. Rick Duney makes a jump shot.










Greeks In Action . . .




Gamma Sigma Sigma

Some people take externships to gain practical experience; some even get paid for the experience. As far as I am concerned, an externship is a must regardless of your major. What better way to see how professionals in your intended field really go about their jobs? An externship allows one to see beyond articles, brochures, etc, and gain entry to the inner sanctums of law firms, hospitals, accounting firms, etc.

As one of 15 English/Communications concentrators at Albright, I am required to take three practicums worth three, two, and one credits, respectively. This semester found me taking the three credit practicum at Y-102, WRFY. I drove to the station twice a week staying 2½-3 hours each time. At first I figured I would be straightening files and emptying trash cans, while straining to over-



hear bits of information from WRFY employees passing by.

Although some of my duties included tidying the station, the vast majority of my time was spent in the production studio and main control room of the station. I watched DJ Al Burke create taped commercials out of typed scripts. I learned from DJ John Ryan how his 12-

3 slot was run using computers to select songs and commercials. Production Director Joel Michaels allowed me to proofread radio scripts and label commercial files. Program Director Mike Shannon let me literally run free throughout the station. This freedom enabled me to learn more by observing at my own pace. 

"DILM is an innovative and exciting method of learning Spanish. It provides the opportunity of learning in a relaxed atmosphere with students and an instructor who became more than just 'other people' to me."

This is a quote from a former student of Albright's Dartmouth Intensive Language Model (DILM) in Spanish when asked to complete the statement 'DILM is . . . "The program is in its second year of successful implementation in the Modern Foreign Language department.

The method was designed and used by

Dr. John Rassius of Dartmouth College and has been brought to Albright by the dynamic Dr. Donna Shute. Including extensive exposure to the program as consultant for the Rassius Foundation, she has had complete training in the technique that the program utilizes.

DILM attempts to facilitate the communicative skills that are necessary in a language and applies them in conversational situations recreated for the classroom. The students receive "hands on" experience with the language in situations that emphasize a necessity to communicate in a positive reinforcement atmosphere where the teacher rewards accurate responses with much praise.

The program thrusts its students, who have little or no experience with the language, into an intensified exposure with Spanish that demands approximately eleven hours of class time per week.


Part of the model includes the assistant teacher or A.T. who is responsible for a segment of the class time used for

reinforcement and repetition of new fundamentals. The A.T. often becomes a vital and personal link that the student has with the new language.

Positive reaction from all areas has meant the growth of the program at Albright. In the second year of implementation in Spanish, the program has doubles in size. Next year, the DILM method is expanding to the French department.


DILM at Albright is a unique and innovative learning experience. It combines increased contact hours, a dynamic classroom atmosphere, a variety of presentation and teaching techniques, reinforcement of material by the A.T., and it results in a proven proficiency of new Spanish communicators. As a former student, I can honestly attest to the success and fun of learning a language under the guidance and care of Dr. Shute and the DILM program.







It is an opportunity for pre-professional science students to secure their directions for future careers in medical fields. These junior and senior students participate in a program offered at the Reading Hospital and Medical Center. For me, this internship was a truly rewarding and valuable experience that not only secured my future career goals, but, created an enthusiasm which will contribute in the development of a determined. dedicated attitude that will remain with me always.

During the first week, we were introduced to the laboratories of the hospital, since we were told that these would be the tools that we should appreciate with considerable understanding before attempting to even follow the doctor or resident into a patient's room. Inexperienced Team Fairs Well















WRESTLING




Powerful Performances






GOLF Impressive Season



Perseverance and Talent






Baseball Respectable Record



A Passover Contata













A harsh spotlight slices the darkness of the theatre revealing a single figure dwarfed between two mountains of stone slabs. In the background, wooden reeds, suggesting bars and imprisonment, jut upward towards a huge white disc covered with death-like and ghostly faces. Slowly and painfully, silhouetted figures emerge from the crevices and crawl laboriously down the platforms. These are the oppressed of Egypt; these are the Hebrews; and this is **The Haggadah**.

The Domino Players Company closed their '83-'84 season with an integrated performance combining mime, choral singing, ritualistic dance and stage movement, and suggestive masks and puppets to trace the life of Moses. Following the format of the Passover Seder, Elizabeth Swados' musical, The Haggadah, includes such memorable events as the Plaques, the crossing of the Red Sea, the idolatry of the Golden Calf, the delivery of the Ten Commandments, and the arrival of the Promised Land. The cast members assumed multi-roles, depicting Hebrews, Egyptians, Sorcerors, and others.





































Around The World

SEPTEMBER

The Soviets shot down civilian Korean Air Lines flight 007 when it strayed into Soviet air space. 269 passengers were killed, 61 of which were American... Vanessa Williams became the first black winner of the Miss America Pageant.

Poland's Lech Walesa, leader of the banned Solidarity movement, won the Nobel Peace Prize . . . Joseph Papp's "A Chorus Line" became the longest running show in Broadway's history with its 3,389th performance . . . 147 U.S. Marines were killed when a truck full of dynamite driven by a terrorist crashed through barricades at the U.S. Marine Command Center at the Beruit International Airport.

Spring Fever '84




