


FOREWORD


DEDICATION






THE Y RETREATS ARE A HIGH POINT IN EACH SEMESTER




KAPPA TAU CHI




PHILOSOPHY CLUB




DEBATE SQUAD

"Parles-vous français? Mais oui, mais oui!" . . . of course, they speak French, but fluently!





VARSITY FOOTBALL


Football came back as one of Albright's major sports this year as the Roaring Lions of Albright, under the spirited leadership of Coach LeVan P. Smith and Captain George Urosevich, convinced grid fans that Albright's ability to produce a winning football squad is far from diminished.

To be sure, the Lions with only two triumphs as compared to six reverses and two deadlocks did surpass the '46 record by only one win but, on the whole, they showed a vast degree of improvement. The Red and White scored major upsets in deadlocking both F & M and Gettysburg, strong pre-game favorites, by the identical scores of 13-13. They suffered their worst defeats from powerful Muhlenberg, 53-0, and Scranton, 43-0, but they rallied strongly towards the end of the campaign.

Next year will see the return of virtually the entire squad with the exception of Captain George Urosevich, the only senior on the squad. This forthcoming fall grid campaign should be one of the brightest spots on the sports card.

Coach Smith, despite the mediocre record of the team, had succeeded in developing a strong offensive in the last three games of the schedule and this was built around Jim Maracani, brilliant sophomore back from Hazleton, and the discovery of a new capable quarterback in Al Harnly, who likewise will be a junior next year.

Maracani won honorable mention on the All Pennsylvania collegiate squad picked by the Associated Press. Little Billy Krohto, speedy Frosh scatback, paced the Albright scorers with 42 points to rank 15th in state scoring.





VARSITY BASKETBALL

Last year was a hot and cold one for Albright's basketball team. It was a tough season for the team, who had returned almost to the man, from last year's record-breaking squad. Exception to the above statement was Russell Guensch, whose loss through graduation last year proved to be a great one. It was a tough season for Bill Horine, the likeable and energetic local court mentor, called on to fill the gap created by Coach Neal O. Harris, who is on leave of absence to Egypt where he is building up an Olympic cage squad.

The final log for the season read 11 victories and 12 defeats and included in that record was a Middle Atlantic States Western Division record of five wins and three losses. However, at the fag end of the campaign the team rallied and closed their yearly court chores with a winning streak of five straight games to be carried over for next year's squado

Eddie Anlian, Union City, New Jersey hotshot, again set the pace for our Lions and again tallied over 300 points. He was awarded the Ron Regar trophy as Albright's most valuable basketball player. Anlian was aided by Ozzie Kriebel, towering center, who improved steadily over last year and is an important factor on the offense. "Hops" Guldin was still one of the flashiest floor men and again copped third place in scoring. Little Jesse Ervin, sparkplug from the team of '44-'45, was back and turned out to be the flashiest guard on the team as well as an offensive man. Mort Witman showed flashes of brilliance in several starts as did teammates Cookie Wagner, Stew Beyerle, Elmer Davis, Ray Chelius, Gene Shollenberger, John Yocum, who were shocktroops.

The entire team will be back in Red and White uniforms next year which should see the boys adding to the five straight victories they posted at the end of their otherwise mediocre '47-48 court wars.

Albright—47 Gettysburg—45 In the season's curtain raiser Albright edged a fighting Gettysburg squad. Albright grabbed an early lead and held it all through the game with Eddie Anlian showing the way with 18 points. Gettysburg's last period drive gave the home fans a scare as it fell short by two points.


Albright—48 St. Joseph's—57 Albright put up a game battle, but the Hawks of St. Joe packed too much moxie as the Lions dropped their first game of the season. Ed Anlian again led the Lion attack while Jack Ramsay and Bob O'Driscoll canned 25 for the Hawks.

Albright—48 Elizabethtown—41 E-town's Lizzies came to town with dead eye Frankie Keath, one of Pennsylvania's leading scorers in the fold. Albright made the Lizzie's trip a sad one, thanks to Ozzie Kriebel's 15 points. The highly-touted Keath was held to 13 points.

Albright—42 Loras (Ia.)—45 Albright's fourth straight home game turned out to be the most exciting of the old year. Loras, a snappy western club, had Mickey Marty, an All American, who hypnotized the crowd with his 11 perfect pivot shots. Marty, who had 30 points for his evening's work, dunked the winning goal in the last 45 seconds.

Albright—53 Loyola—62 The Lions journeyed to Baltimore for their first away contest. However the Saints were too much for our lads, especially All American Jim Lacey, whose picture shots made life miserable for our defense.

Albright—39 Duquesne—53 Albright stepped out of her class as they traveled to Altoona to meet the powerful Dukes of Duquesne University. The Lions built up an early 9-5 lead on shots by Anlian and Kriebel, but the Dukes caught fire and were never headed.



Albright—49 Lebanon Valley—47 Coach Horine's hoopsters snapped their three-game losing streak as they pulled a hot one out of the fire on the Dutchmen's home court. Anlian and Kriebel set the pace, but it was Cookie Wagner's last second hook shot that iced the verdict.

Albright—57 Juniata—43 Returning to their native den, our big cats made it two straight league victories by scalping the hapless Juniata Indians at the Northwest Palestra. Towering Ozzie Kriebel threw in 14 to lead his cronies in the conquest.

Albright—37 Scranton Univ.—38 The Red and White got a jolt as they traveled to Scranton and lost their first league game. Albright built up a big halftime bulge, only to have Scranton, paced by Mike DeNoia, slash back to grab a slim lead which they jealously guarded to the final whistle.

Albright—37 Lincoln Univ.—45 Lincoln University sports one of the classiest colored combinations in the east and they have a reputation for being particularly tough at home. Anyway Albright's Lions found it so down at Lincoln. Anlian was hot, but the Lincoln sharpshooters built up an insurmountable lead.

The league-leading Moravian Greyhounds hit Northwest in what was expected to be a tight ball game. However, Albright's unpredictable Lions made it a runaway as they built up a quick lead and guarded it for the entire contest.

Albright—30 LaSalle—68 Powerful LaSalle, one of the nation's leading quintets, handed our Red and White passers their worst setback of the season. Big Larry Foust broke his school scoring record as he dunked 34 digits on the LaSalle court.

Seton Hall was highly favored in this contest, but again our inspired cagers rose to the occasion as they extended the Pirates to the limit and only going under in the last period. Kreibel, Anlian, and Mort Witman shared 30 points in the losing cause.

Bucknell—54



Although the record is not a brilliant one, showing 10 wins and 10 losses, it is one of improvement from beginning to end. The team started out slowly, losing eight of its first 12 games. Roaring into the stretch they caught fire and finished up with a hard won, respectable .500 percentage. 


TRACK
