According to a report just released by Dean Walton, 13 seniors who will be graduated next month have won the coveted class honor distinction by maintaining an "A" rating throughout their entire college course.

By placing 18 percent of its members in its commencement honor group, the class of 1939 has set a record unequalled by any preceding class in the history of Albright Reading. During the past decade an average of 13.8 percent of each class have been graduated as honor students, and in no class have more than 16.2 percent won this honor group rating.

Most of the leading roles will be taken by students who have had previous experience with Greek tragedy. This presentation will mark the sixth annual production of a Greek play on the Albright campus. In 1934, the Antigone of Sophocles was presented. In 1935, Oedipus was the feature of May Day and a part of the Commencement Week exercises. In 1936, the Medea, considered by many the finest of them all, was produced on the campus. Hippolytus was the Greek tragedy presented on May Day, 1937. Last year's Iphigenia in Tauris is connected with this year's production in that they both deal with what happened after Agamemnon sacrificed his daughter to the gods.

The translation being used by Director Work is the prose translation of Jebb, which differs somewhat from the one used by Blanche Yurka in her famous presentation of the Electra.

The Calendar of Events for the week preceding commencement has just been released. On Thursday, June 1, a tea for the senior class and faculty will be held at the home of President Masters. In the evening the Mantle Ceremony and the crowning of the May Queen have been scheduled. Friday, June 2, is reserved for the presentation of the June Week One-Acters. Saturday, June 3, is Alumni Day. On Sunday, June 4, Baccalaureate services will be held. Music will be furnished by the Emmanuel Choir and Brass Quintette. Monday, June 5, a fitting climax, Commencement.

## Tennis Squad Wins Two

The Albright tennis team is experiencing one of the worst seasons it has had in the past few years. After a rather promising start, in the form of the southern tour, the boys came home and fell into a six game losing streak, which remained unbroken until the past week, when Albright beat Upsala and Susquehanna.

Out of seventeen matches played, thus far only five can be registered on the win-side. The first match in the North was over at Lehigh, where a very strong outfit completely outclassed the Albright boys, 9-0. Their Marvin Kanbrowitz is one of the best tennis players in college tennis in this section. Then Rutgers and Franklin and Marshall whipped our boys, 8-1 and 9-1 respectively.

A very promising Muhlenberg team outclassed us 9-0. They have a very well balanced team of boys which, with some experience under their belt, is going to make a very strong squad. The next match was the first one at home, with Catauba. After beating them at Salisbury, N. C., we were defeated, 5-2 on the Reading County Club courts. A strong Haverford team won over us, 9-0 and then Lebanon Valley had little trouble registering a 5-1 win. That brings us up to May 8, when Albright crashed into the winning column with 5-4 win over Upsala.

Three days later another win was scored at Susquehanna, 6-1. So much for the team record. As for individual records Willis (Bitzy) Heisey has been the most consistent winner on the squad with 10 wins and 7 defeats. Co-captain Cliff Raffensperger follows with 7 wins.

The rest of the squad strings out behind these two. Undoubtedly, this condition has not been caused by lack of material. Since there is nothing which teaches a team more about a game than several good defeats, one consolation is that the boys are learning some tennis this year.
