### TWENTY-FOUR RECEIVE COVETED VARSITY "A"

They came here with a passing attack that was hard to break up, and it was only in the last few minutes of the game were they able to penetrate their defense with any degree of success.

Karlrip started the scoring for the Red and White when he tapped one in under the basket, later Gunther added a foul, Trumbauer taking a pass from Bollman, gave Moravian their first points, from then on the game was nip and tuck with Albright not more than three points ahead at any time. The first half ended with Albright leading 15-12.

The second half saw the boys from Bethlehem break loose, but for only a while, after they put the game on even terms the Wellerites got going and soon drew away from them, Karlrip dropping in three baskets in a row which was the turning point of the game. Bollman was the high scorer for the Moravian clan getting four goals from the field. 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## NEW COURSES ARE ADDED TO ROSTER

Four Courses Never Before Offered To Students—Includes Social Problems And Journalism

A number of new courses have been added or will be added to the roster next semester. #### Debating Needs A New Stimulus; A Trophy Will Do It

At a time when enthusiasm was at its low ebb and when gloom and despair was beginning to enshroud the beautiful campus of the Red and White, when the standards which have floated so proudly seemed sure to fall, at a time when, disturbed and torn by internal dissension and deserted by its own clientele, Albright was brought back to its feet and awakened from its lethargy by the timely assistance of a loyal alumnus who arrived on the scene in the nick of time, and at the psychological moment, like the immortal Sergeant Jasper at Fort Moultrie, retrieved the falling colors and replaced them on the tottering tower, and thus the day was saved this fall. In this manner gridiron victory and a championship was snatched out of the jaws of defeat. Out of chaos came a cosmos!

Today a similar situation is facing the students and college in another field, albeit in the same way. For several years debating has been at a low ebb. The situation for the last two seasons was almost deplorable. Members of a debating audience were scarcer than bankers on Saturday afternoon. This season is seeing an honest and supreme effort to retrieve the former forensic laurels which were formerly prized so highly. The speaker paid a great tribute to Frock, Brown, Weaver and others who finish at the college this year and will therefore pass out of the team. He described this year's team as it started out with a discouraging aspect, and then was brought into glorious shape by Coach Weller. He

told of the latter's troubles and trials.

The speaker is evidently not one of those who favor removal of Albright to Reading, for in pointing out that the American youth is traveling collegeward in greater numbers than in all previous history, he insisted that Albright gets its share, and demanded that leadership be secured which will achieve that end. With some vehemence he declared:

"We need a business getter; a business builder who has the business ability to run a "Greater Albright" in a businesslike way. The business of running a successful college today has entered the field of what is commonly called "BIG BUSINESS."

Closing with an eloquent admonition to the team to carry on future victories, Mr. Mohn later presented Coach Weller with a beautiful gold signet ring, expressing the esteem and high regard of the champions and his own personal appreciation.

Best o' luck, Virginia. May success be yours.

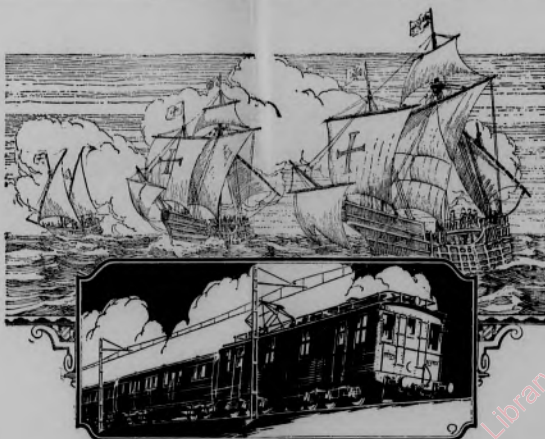
**NEW COURSES ARE ADDED TO ROSTER**

ing how it is related to business and professions, etc.

Besides the course in Social Problems which he is offering in connection with debating two hours a week for nine weeks, Dr. Weber is offering two new courses. A choice of two will be made between Logic, Philosophy of Religion and Anthropology. The selection will be made by the students taking the courses. The two which receive the highest vote will be selected. As yet details have not been worked out.

Likewise, Journalism will be offered for the first time. It will include the practical phases of journalism and the principles and art of creative writing. It will be offered by Dr. Chislett one hour a week. Advanced public speaking which is another English course will be offered by Prof. Boyer. The time this



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semester will be devoted to either debating or the rhetoric or oratory, whichever the class decides. It will be either one or two hours, to be decided.

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
