## Benninger To Serve As Registrar

Elected to Fill Post  
Vacated by Danford

Anna R. Benninger, '30, has been elected registrar of Albright College by the executive council of the board of trustees, Pres. Harry V. Masters announced yesterday. Miss Benninger will combine the duties of her new position with her present work as assistant to the dean of the college.

The new registrar fills the post vacated by the resignation of Newton S. Danford, '35, late in September. The position of director of admissions, which Danford also held, remains to be filled.

Returns as Record Clerk  
A resident of Shillington, Miss Benninger returned to Albright one year after graduation as record clerk and secretary to the dean and registrar. Later she became assistant to the dean and registrar. In 1948 Miss Benninger was designated executive secretary of the committee on placement.

Miss Benninger received an alumni citation from Albright in 1950 in the field of education.

The registrar is directly responsible to the president of the college. The chief duties of this position involve the supervision of registration, the maintenance of records, the compilation of enrollment statistics and the editing of the college catalogue. In addition, the registrar acts as secretary of the faculty.

Prepares Schedules

In connection with registration, the registrar determines procedures, sections courses where necessary, prepares semester schedules of classes, assigns rooms, determines examination schedules, acts upon "request for change of roster" when academic requirements are not involved and makes an individual schedule for each freshman.

Record-keeping tasks of the registrar include the keeping of a complete tabulation of students, registered and withdrawn, the reporting of grades to parents, students and other institutions and the maintenance of records of the academic standing of all students.

## Debaters Win 4-School Contest

Albright's debate team won four rounds and lost two to emerge as winner of the four-school Lehigh debate tournament held last Saturday afternoon at Lehigh University, Bethlehem. The host school and Lafayette, with three-three records, and Bucknell, which won two rounds while losing four, followed Albright in the standings.

One affirmative team and one negative represented each school participating in the tournament. Albright's affirmative team was composed of Richard Witmoyer and Russell F. Weigley, '52, while Michael Lafferty, '53, and Ray Weitzel, '54, debated for the negative. Dr. Samuel B. Shirk, coach of debate, accompanied the group to Bethlehem.

Debating three rounds each, the Albright affirmative and negative teams both scored two-one records. The affirmative defeated negative teams from Bucknell and Lafayette.

## In the Lion's Den

### Tough Week

Although it no doubt couldn't be helped, it's too bad that the second week of the basketball season will bring Coach Gulian's squad up against two of their most formidable opponents. It's hard to imagine that the Lions will be able to salvage even one of the next two contests coming up, especially since their inexperienced basketekers have not really begun to work their plays with any degree of efficiency as yet.

Tomorrow's encounter with Lafayette will pit Albright against a fast, tall and determined band from along the Delaware. These Leopards are still stinging from their last two encounters with Albright athletes, namely their 64-59 basketball loss last winter and their 12-6 football setback this fall. They will be led by a new coach, Bill vanBredaKolff, of New York Knickerbocker fame, who has some good height on his squad along with a pretty sensational little guard by the name of Pete Carril. This fellow, although only 5' 6" high, can do tricks with a basketball much in the manner of Bob McCann, former LaSalle standout.

And if this were not enough of an ordeal, the schedule finds the Red and White slated to meet LaSalle in the latter's gym on Tuesday evening. That floor in Philadelphia has been a definite bug-a-boo to Albright teams in years past, as no Albright aggregation has ever been able to score a victory on it. Again this year there are very slim prospects of doing anything to remedy the situation, for the Explorers, who are big-timers in every respect, show that they will mean business.

Although most of us hope that we can settle for something short of the 84-37 licking absorbed two years ago, it is quite doubtful that we can come very close to the big Philadelphiaans.

### Chances of Victory Slim

But even if chances of racking up victories this week are slim, there is still the factor of experience gained to be considered. It's quite possible that some of the less seasoned squad members will find themselves learning a lot of basketball from these engagements, with the result that that knowledge can be put to good use throughout the remainder of the schedule.

As far as the team goes, there is little to comment upon except that a lot of work needs to be done yet in polishing up on ball-handling, etc. It also seems that there is a great deal of fouling being charged to Albright players. In both the Dickinson and Fort Dix games we outscored our opponents by a wide margin from the field, but when it came to the foul line we lagged behind. This, of course, wasn't important at Dickinson, but against Fort Dix it was the deciding issue. Of course the tight, pressing defense used by Coach Gulian this year has, without doubt, a great deal to do with the number of fouls. Still, it seems that many of the violations are relatively unnecessary. In effect they practically give the opponents points which they themselves have done little to deserve.

## G-Men Defeat Dickinson, Lose to Fort Dix GIs

### Stop Red Devils, 60-45, In Opening Contest

Using a pressing defense which kept their opponents off balance a good part of the time, Albright opened its basketball campaign with a 60-45 victory over Dickinson on December 5.

A crowd of approximately 700 spectators watched in the gym at Carlisle as George Amole, junior from Birdsboro, led the Lion scoring parade with 15 counters. Gerry Potts, team captain, was close behind with 13 markers while his partner on the double pivot, Connie Detting, had 12. Dick Witman, who saw action with "Lefty" Leitham at guard, threw in four important buckets, mostly of the long variety, for a total of eight points.

The first quarter of the contest saw Albright pull away to a 6-0 lead on buckets by Witman and Amole before Zilling, who had 15 points for the losers, counted on a foul shot. The Lions maintained their pressure throughout the quarter and were leading, 14-7, as the second period got under way.

### Jersey Soldiers Score Last-Minute Victory

Suffering their first defeat of the 1951-52 season, the Albright basketekers dropped a close 59-57 decision to the soldiers from Fort Dix last Saturday night at Northwest. A crowd of 800 persons was in attendance.

The Lions got off to an auspicious start as they rolled up a convincing 24-13 first quarter lead. The soldiers came back, however, and played the hosts on almost equal terms for the second ten minutes. In this quarter Albright scoring was cut nearly in half as the Red and White could tally only 13 markers as compared to 24 in the first quarter. But the visitors were able to get only 12 points in this period and the teams left the floor with Albright leading, 37-25.

### Soldiers Slice Lead

The third quarter saw a rejuvenated band of recruits take the floor, for the Jerseyites sliced Albright's lead by 11 points and the Lions had only a slim one-point margin, 49-48, to work on as the final period opened.

The last quarter was a see-saw battle with the lead changing hands no less than five times. Dick Witman opened the scoring with a set shot that gave Albright a three point lead, but Mike Kearns dropped in two quick baskets for the visitors and the soldiers led for the first time since the first quarter. Kenny Nace then put the Lions ahead, 53-52, but Kearns came back to give the soldiers a one-point bulge.

George Amole's field goal put Albright back in the lead, 55-54, for the last time because Kearns' fourth goal of the period gave the visitors the lead they never relinquished. The clincher was a twin-pointer by Marty Saul on a lay-up with seventy seconds to go.

### Detting Scores

Although Connie Detting tallied for Albright to narrow the gap to one point, 58-57, the Lions could not make good on any of three subsequent field goal attempts. Perry Del Purgatoria's foul conversion was the final tally of the contest.

Top scorers for their respective teams were captain Gerry Potts for Albright and Del Purgatoria, former Villanova ace, each with 16 counters. Kearns and Saul had 15 and 12 points, respectively, for the visitors while Detting and Amole had 10 counters for the home team.

In the J.V. contest the Cubs overcame a 22-9 halftime deficit to stop Sammy's Steaks, 45-40. It was Coach Bobby Hicks' squad's first victory.

## Model U. N. Meets in April

### Albright to Send Delegates to Confab

Plans are being made for the annual meeting of the Model United Nations General Assembly to be held early next April at Barnard College, New York City.

As usual, delegates from colleges in the Middle Atlantic region, including the International Relations Club of Albright, will represent various member nations and act upon proposed resolutions as their nations would act in the UN.

Agendas of the committees of the Model UN will closely parallel the programs being considered by the UN in New York and Paris. Among the questions to be discussed are the conflict in Korea, problems of security and peace in Iran and Egypt and the possibility of arms limitation.

This year's assembly will be the 25th in the series of Model Leagues and Model UNs begun in 1927. The idea was suggested at that time by H. Duncan Hall, an Australian professor teaching at Syracuse University.

Throughout the 25 year history of the meetings, a continuation committee of student delegates and faculty advisers, reorganized annually, has planned the assemblies with the cooperation of the host schools.

Students from the host school will act as the UN Secretariat.

## College Enrollment Drops; NYU Has Most Students

College enrollment showed a decrease of 7.8 per cent this year from the figure for the fall of 1951. There were 2,116,440 students enrolled in American colleges and universities this fall, as compared with 2,296,592 last year, the U. S. Office of Education has reported.

Male students declined in number by 10.8 per cent, while the number of women students decreased only 1.3 per cent. Among freshmen, the drop among male students was 12.3 per cent, with the figure for women declining by three per cent.

The number of veterans enrolled decreased by 31.1 per cent to 388,747, although those studying under the GI Bill of Rights still make up about 18 per cent of the college population.

Of the 1,806 institutions of higher education surveyed, the ten showing the highest enrollment were New York University, the University of California, City College of New York, Columbia University, University of Illinois, Northwestern University, University of Minnesota, Ohio State University, Indiana University and Boston University.

New York led the states with the highest enrollments, followed by California, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Texas and Ohio in that order.

## Science Foundation Gives Fellowships For First Time

A national program of predoctoral fellowships is being sponsored for the first time by the National Science Foundation in cooperation with the National Academy of Science-National Research Council for the academic year 1952-3.

The aim of the awards is "to promote the progress of science by offering opportunities for further study" to students who might not otherwise be able to take advanced training. The tenure of a fellowship is for one year and can be arranged to begin at any time after July 1, 1952.

Applicants will be required to take a fellowship record examination which will be administered at approximately 175 centers throughout the country on January 18, 1952. Stipends will range from \$1,400 to \$1,600 plus tuition and laboratory fees, and grants will be made for dependents in certain cases.

Information and application blanks may be secured from the Fellowship Office, National Research Council, 2101 Constitution Avenue, Washington 25, D. C.
