Albright Students Speak Out

Is apathy reigning at Albright? Robert Henderson, Joseph Sulewski and Michael McCreavy do not think so.

Most students at Albright go through the motions. They only do what is required of them, never questioning if what they are being asked to do is right or wrong. This is made even worse when these actions are being done by others without the students' knowledge or consent.

But Henderson, Sulewski and McCreavy did not act in a way that would confirm that apathy permeates life at Albright. At the end of last year they discovered that Dr. Daniel J. Falabella, Assistant Professor of Computer Science and Chair of the Computer Science department, was going to be let go.

This occurred because when Falabella came to Albright he was meeting his deadline to complete his doctoral degree. But last year a strike at Temple University prevented Dr. Falabella from meeting the deadline. He got his degree this year, but the administration said it was too late.

said it was too late.

According to Henderson, Computer Science majors did not take this news lightly. They started organizing and arranging meetings with Dean Lubot, last year, and President Ellen Hurwitz, this year. Some parents even called the administration saying that their

children would transfer out if Dr. Falabella no longer taught at Albright.

The Faculty and Tenure Committee met after the students talked with President Hurwitz who, in Henderson's words, was "polite, sympathetic and eagerly wanted to help the students find the best way out".

This week the news came out that the now Dr. Daniel Falabella was granted tenure.

Sulewski said he had mixed feelings about the outcome. "I was sad for Falabella, but happy for us. If Falabella had gone he could have found much more prestigious jobs doing research," said Sulewski, "But I am happy because students here will now be able to continue to enjoy the talent that Dr. Falabella has for teaching,"

Others saw the outcome as something with much larger consequences. "This can serve as an example for all students who are dissatisfied with the conditions on campus," said Henderson. "You CAN change this campus."

When contacted by *The Albrightian*,
Doctor Falabella could only say that he was
extremely grateful to all those who worked to

Henderson and Sulewski jokingly suggested that they deserved A's for their part in the outcome. Doctor Falabella replied that they do deserve A's for effort.

Clark Hammond was hired in October as
Assistant Food Service Director. He has been
responsible for many of the changes in the
cafteria including the improvement of the

Dave Tanger, Food Service Director, is also working to improve the dining hall. "We are given \$8.19 per day per student. Out of that money we must be able to feed them three meals a day. That also has to include beverages and labor." Tanger says that he and Hammond are trying to introduce new items.

They are having a difficult time meeting the specific dietary needs of the vegetarians on campus. According to Hammond, "There are six types of vegetarians. We need to know what kind of vegetarians there are at Albright and what they want to eat. Those students should do some research and find out what kind of vegetarian they are." The dining hall has begun to serve vegetarian dishes in an attempt to please the students. However, this has been unsuccessful and the majority of these dishes are thrown away. According to Tanger, the cafeteria cannot afford to do that.

There is now a suggestion box at the back of the cafeteria for students to give their ideas and comments. These suggestions will be taken seriously. "We need positive and negative feedback. We also need a pat on the back every now and then. It keeps us (the staff) going. I want the students to talk to me. I consider the recipes I'm given and if I can, I will make them," commented Hammond.

Administrators Reveal New Financial Outlook

Several years of decreased enrollment, ambitious investment in building and renovations, and increased demand for financial aid have all contributed to Albright's deficit which could exceed \$1,000,000 by the end of this fiscal year. Bill McGarry, vice president of financial affairs, informs us that this trend will not continue.

With this year's budget already in effect, administrators are looking to next year's budget to slow down the deficit. Measures will be taken during the new fiscal year beginning June 1, to increase revenue and to decrease costs. Next year's goal is to reduce the deficit by 50%. The goal for the following year will be to further reduce the deficit and by the 1995-96 academic year the college should be running on a balanced budget.

running on a balanced budget.

The measures that will be taken to reduce deficit spending include both short term and long term plans. Short term proposals having a positive impact on the financial outlook are to increase enrollment in both credit and noncredit courses and to increase the effectiveness of our marketing and public relations material. Long term goals include a long term look at curriculum, more fundraising, new building and renovations done only after the money

has been acquired through fundraising, and eventually reaching capacity in housing. A long term look at curriculum has already

A long term look at curriculum has already begun. The Albright College Curriculum Committee administered surveys on February 9, 10, and 11 regarding Albright's general studies requirements. These surveys will influence the curriculum to fit students' needs. Studies are currently underway to examine the physical education requirement and the necessity of the January interim. These decisions are not primarily budgetary but are being made solely to conform to the needs of the students.

Many channels for fundraising are still in consideration. Phonathons to alumni have raised a significant amount of money in the past and will continue to be held as a fundraiser. However, administrators hope that the college recieves larger donations. McGary foreasts an increase in donations as the community begins to see improvements in the college.

an increase in donations as the community begins to see improvements in the college. Tuition and fees will continue to increase. However, this increase will not be reflective of the past swings of increases. The rate of increase of next year's tuition and fees will be 6.5%. Financia! aid will also continue to grow, although it will grow at a slower rate than in recent years. These figures rely on an expected gradual increase in enrollment.

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Administration **Returns To Old Ways**

Who is directing campus activities and who is tending to residence life concerns? Ed Skoczen and Pete Glass have not only switched offices, but have returned to their original positions as well. Skoczen is the Director of Residence Life, as he has been since the fall of 1988, and Glass is the Director of the Campus Center.

Skoczen, Glass and Dean of Students Stayton Wood had been talking about this change since last fall. It was impossible for the college to hire a new director of student activities, so Wood suggested that the administration "go back to basics." He said one person from Student Affairs could move over and handle the open responsibilities. He thought it would be better to have one person responsible for one area.

Skoczen was asked to assume the position of Director of the Campus Center in January 1992. From this office, he would work as Director of Summer Conferences and as the adviser to the Orientation program. He agreed, saying, "Let's make the most of it." In fact, he thought the position would be temporary until the administration could find a new director for student activities. meanwhile, moved over to Selwyn Hall and handled campus housing. He also worked with the resident assistants and resident directors in the dorms.

Wood arrived on campus in the summer of 1992 and discussion of the situation began. The move was approved this spring and they moved earlier than they had planned. There were additional reasons for the switch and both men are positive about it. They now work in a more concentrated area, which

helps Skoczen feel "more focused." Wood wanted Skoczen, as an associate dean of students with Virginia Scullion in the Career Planning and Placement Office, in close proximity to his office, so the three could

Both men will continue projects they started after the switch. They are developing a leadership training program for student

Skoczen was working on renovations for the campus center main lounge and the Sub snack bar. He is trying to work with SGA and their budget to purchase a big screen TV for the Sub and the main lounge. He wants to change the atmosphere in the main lounge by adding brass light fixtures and potted plants. Skoczen continues to advise the Orientation program and also chooses the new RA's.

Glass continues to be the Greek adviser and the resident director at North Hall, but also assumes the responsibilities at the campus center. He is responsible for the building itself and advises all student organizations, such as Campus Center Board. Any new organizations work with Glass to develop their constitution. Glass is happy with the change, especially because his graduate program was in student affairs administration and he worked in a student union to gain experience in areas from programming to Greek life. Glass said, "This is where I'm more comfortable and this is where I want to be. I had a productive and wonderful experience in graduate school and I'm looking forward to this position. I encourage students at Albright to stop by and make suggestions about changes for the campus center, to make it more like a student union and to make activities better."

Are We Different

The Office of Multicultural Affairs and the African-American Society co-sponsored an experience event on racial differences on February 26th. The event was called "Are We Different.

'Are We Different" was an event with a very important purpose, to try to encourage understanding between African-Americans and whites. As Dereic Dorman said early in the program, "In order for there to be resolution, we must ask whatever questions we may have." Mr. Dorman's statment set precedent for the entire event.

The event included a film in which African-Americans described their encounters with white people and raised the question, "What is black?" The contrast that the film pointed out was the difference in the style of communication between the two races. The film said that African-Americans are generally ore physical in terms of commun African-Americans use their hands and bodies in ways that whites may feel threatened. This poses a larger problem in the (4) of back ground.

The film revealed that there is difference in the way that whites and African-Americans are raised. African-Americans are more spiritual, which is discoved through music such as reggae, ray and soul. Whites are generally raised in a more detached manner. The film sugarted that whites tend not to show as anch emotion in communication and feel becatened when talking with African-Ame, icans. This threatened communication can cause friction and misunderstanding



The racial differences pointed out in the film were carried over into a panel of Albright students. The panel consisted of five students, two African-Americans, two whites and one

Indian. The panel attempted to show a diversity of students that is not present at Albright, which is a white upper-middle class college. This fact was pointed out in the information presented by Mike Steiner, which was compiled Wallace E. Goode of Allegheny College. Mr. Goode assembled his information into categories under the title of "Two areas of difficulty for students of color." The areas are academics and changing from a prejudicial black to prejudicial white setting.

In the area of academics, the panel, and Andre Win in particular, believed that curriculum at Albright and other Western colleges and universities is of a Eurocentric nature. This is to say that the curriculum ignores or does not place great emphasis on teaching Asian and African issues. In fact, it means that they should be non-issues. Mr. Goode states that this method of teaching poses a problem for the Asian and African-American communities in that they feel nated in Western culture, which was echoed

The second area is prejudicial African-Americans to prejudicial white setting and peer groups. This is no where more evident than in the social interaction between African-Americans and whites on the Albright campus. In the cafeteria, African-Americans and minorities tend to sit separately from whites. This may be socially enforced by the belief that whites have more in common with other whites and the same may be true for African-Americans. Statistics compiled by Mike Steiner from the 1993 Albright Yearbook group pictures reinforce the fact that African-Americans are alienated from whites on our campus. Out of all the fraternities and sororities on campus, African-Americans make up only 1.41% of Greek life, people of color 4.52%.
These statistics show the division of cultures

Rumors of an on-campus club have been circulating Albright's campus for months. Gerry Gonnella, a senior at Albright, is making those rumors into truths. "The Pavilion" is an on-campus club designed by Gonnella "to re-group Albright College as it used to be," he said. The building will provide accomodations for students of all ages and interests. Gonnella believes that students need a place that "allows everyone to get together and be together."

An on-campus club is the answer that many unsatisfied Albright students are looking for. Jim O'Neill, junior, is not satisfied with the social life on campus because "it's the same ritual each week," he said. O'Neill believes that the social life on campus has become increasingly worse since he came to Albright. "Once the social life has been removed effectively, which it has, it is harder for students to congeal into social groups, " said O'Neill. He thinks that the school needs to provide a place where the student body can gather as a whole, which is exactly the purpose of "The Pavilion

Many Albright students have the same concerns as O'Neill. Maria Dunlavey, sophomore, said that the social life needs variety, and she believes that an on-campus club would provide the needed change. "With more variety, students don't have to go to the same places with the same people every

enior, commented that Albright needs to find a way to bring all the students together and to bring back the spirit that the students

The Pavilion" can be the answer to these problems. According to Gonnella, the club will be located in Albright Woods and will be open to the entire Albright College community, students and their guests, but not open to the public. The building will be in a simple rectangular shape, containing three rooms. The first room will be an under 21 club, with dancing, refreshments, and booths; the second room is the Outlet, which will be sunken down, and used for improv and just general "hanging out;" the third and largest room will contain an over 21 bar, with drinks, food, and games, etc. Albright College, however, cannot purchase a liquor license. A private person must buy the license and leave it for the school to use, which many alumni have eady volunteered to do.

The building would be purchased by the Student Government Association (SGA) through a loan that will be co-signed by the school, said Gonnella. The loan will be set up for SGA to pay back in 10 years. Along with being owned by the students, the operation of "The Pavilion" will depend on the students. The club will be totally student run, without administration, which will help to strengthen business skills.

According to Gonnelia, the idea of an oncampus club was widely received by the faculty, the administration, and the board of trustees. Gonnella also said that all that is left to be by an architect, approval by the board of trustees, and acquiring the loan. If all of his plans go smoothly and correctly, Gonnella expects the project to be finished by the 1995-

Survey Perpetuates Ethnic Insensitivity

Dear Editor.

We would like to respond to a recent survey distributed by a stude department. The data collected from the rvey, we assume, is to be used to indicate interaction among Albright students. Upon examining the survey, we were highly enraged and deeply offended. The following are our convictions on the survey:

To introduce her survey, the student states that she is a senior sociology major conducting a survey on the interaction of college students. However, while reading the survey, we discovered that it is actually about the. European American, interaction of International, and Students of Color.

After the brief introduction, the student attempts to classify her sample population by class year, gender, and nationality. To distinguish nationality the surveyer lists: "American, Afro- American, Indian, Pakistanian, Oriental, and Hispanic" The estion that came to our mind was: What is "American"? History teaches us that the only 'true' Americans are the Native ans. Next, the politically correct term for Afro-American is African American. "Afro-American" is a term which became obsolute in the mid nineteen eighties. Thirdly, people from Pakistan are Pakistani, not Pakistanian. The next section is entitled Interactions. She breaks the categories into "friends in class, friends outside of class, and friends on social bases." We believe that these categories are ambigous. Is there a difference between "friends outside of class" and "friends on a social basis"? Is the surveyer referring to tes (students taking a particular course) or grade levels? The appropriate phrase, we feel, should augmented to include classmate, aquaintence, and friend. The surveyer also empts to connect ethnic groups with degrees of interaction. She again uses the same choices for groups as the nationality category. The use of "American" in such as manner is in itself prejuidice. By seperating African Americans from "Americans", is the surveyer suggesting that African Americans are subservient to "Americans", meaning European Americans. The next group Who are the ns? Lastly, Geography 101. Oriential d be replaced with Asian. Asian, if should be replaced with Asian. Asian, if necessary, can be further divided into Eastern Asia (China, Korea, Japan, ect.) or Western Asia (India, Pakistan, ect.)

To conclude the survey, students are asked

to respond to several suggestive statements which only prepetuate the sterotypes of Students of Color and International Students. In our opinion the statements are racist. Plea remember, one can only be racist if he has the economic or political power to be suppres Also note, the March 8, 1993, issue of TIME states that by the 21st century the groups that once composed the minority population will be the majority. Thus, we should refered to as People of Color.

Finally, the first and last statements of the survey imply that only International and ents of Color "stick together" and "isolate themselves in the cafeteria". Is it a crime to associate with people whom we can identify with? Let us take a look at the larger picture. Students of Color, at Albright, compose such a small group that it is virtually impossible about other groups of people who share similar interest and congrate together? (For instance: Greeks, Campus Center Board Members, Dimnio Players, etc.). The second statement inquires about the likelyhood of dating outside of one's "nationality". The surveryer repeatly fails to recognize pertainate context errors. Again, "Nationality" should be replaced with race or ethnocentricity. As for statements three and four, we will respond simultaneously. First of all, we are confused as what type of social problems the surveyer is referring to. Is she suggesting that International and Students problems? In reality are we not the product

Color at Albright helped the questionaire to understand them better and that Albright is doing the right thing by accepting these ents. What is the "Right thing"?

This survey only serves as a mechanism to project this student's ignorance of others and the diverse society to which we belong. She is not completely at fault, however. She is one, of many, manifestation of our eurocentric, deficient educational system.

Once again, the delusionary claim that Albright is a multicultural community has been obliterated. In its current state. Albright is nothing more than tokenistic. Our students continue to demonstrate the necessity of a multicultural curriculum. As a liberal arts institution of higher education, how can we proceed to graduate similar, shallow, individuals? Furthermore, how can any professor of department allow an inadequate survey such as this circulate within the student body. We propose that any research obtained from this survey is inconclusive. It should, therefore, be altered using the correct terminology and specific objectives, without any implicative statements

Our generation is suffering from a lack of knowledge and understanding this only perpetuates conflict and intolerance. Will Albright not provide the means for enlightenment as relayed through multicultural curriculum?





Gas Guzzlers Ticketed By Campaign

Students across the country are participating in a groundbreaking campaign to raise awareness about the relationship of automobile feul efficiency and the worldwide global-warming crisis.

The grassroots sampaign, named Ticket America, will be the first direct action effort ever initiated around the automobile. This spring, thousands of college students in hundreds of cities will be ticketing gas guzzling autos in an effort to focus public attention on the need to promote new national fuelefficiency standards.

"We have sent information to 500 schools," aid Joe Mendelson, co-director of Ticket America." A lot of student organizations have joined on already."

Students and others will place tickets sembling parking citations on the windshields of any 1990's-model cars that are below the national average of 27.5 miles-per-gallor. The tickets cite the negative results of gas guzzling, including "auto pollution, urban smog, global warming and an increasing trade deficit and dependence on foreign oil." The backs of the tickets list numerous

steps that car owners can take to solve the lem, including being aware of fuel efficiency when buying cars, and supporting state and national incentives to encourage

increased efficiency.
"Our immediate political goal is to increa
(fuel efficiency) students," Mendelson sa But we hope that it becomes something like the fur coat campaign which raised public awareness so much in recent years. This might be perceived as radical, but sometimes it takes something shrill like this to get the

necessary exposure."





Seniors Finish Career

Captains Bow Out; Team Goes 10-13

Coach Sally Miller's Lady Lions basketball team finished out the 1992-93 season with a 10-13 record. Albright only loses two seniors and more importantly returns 60% of their starting lineup, in addition to a number of key players off the bench.

Leading Albright this year was senior co-captains Connie Grothe and Jen Esposito.

Grothe led the team in scoring at 12.7 ppg and was one of the league's best three point shooters. She finished second on the team with 5.9 rpg and first with 3.9 apg. She also moved to 7th all-time in career scoring with 824 points and 9th all-time with 441 career rebounds.

Jen Esposito was also a key contributor to the team. She was the defensive hustler for the Lady Lions, leading the team with 3.7 steals per game. She finished second on the team with 12.0 ppg and also grabbed 4 rebounds a game. She finished right behind her senior counterpart in careerscoring at 8th all-time with 781 points and finished 11th all-time with 413 career rebounds.

Returning starters for Albright next year will be sophomores Sue Rehrig and Kristen Ruch, and junior Becky Shumaker. This year, Ruch provided a fluent jumpshot and clutch foul shooting. Rehrig gave the team the intangibles that don't always show up on the stat sheet.

Shumaker, likely the captain of next year's team, led the Lady Lions this year with 7.4 rpg and has already moved to 10th all-time in rebounds with one year to go. She will be a key ingredient if Albright looks to make the M.A.C.playoffs in '94.

College Jan. 23, where he pinned six opponents and suffered just one pin himself.

Freshman Makes History Andy Smith Wins First Ever Swim Medal

Freshman Andy Smith won the first and only swimming medal in Albright College history Feb. 27 at the 46th annual Middle Atlantic Conference championships at Dickinson.

Smith won a bronze medal in the 400-yard individual medley, turning in a school-record time of 2 minutes, 4.17seconds. He also took sixth in the 200 IM for the Lions, who completed their second year as a varsity program.

Smith led the Albright men (3-9) in scoring this year and set 11 school records seven individual marks and four in relays. He owns the school marks in the 50, 100, 200, and 500 freestyles, 200 and 400 IMs and 100 backstroke.

In dual meets, Smith mounted the blocks 23 times inindividual events this year- and won

In his first dual meet, back on Nov. 14 at Dickinson, Smith swam in two races and broke two records. He won the 100 backstroke in a school-record 58.12, then anchored the 400 free relay team to a new mark of 3 minutes, 38.15seconds.

At the league championships, Smith led the Albright men to a 13th place in a field of 16. He was the only Lion to make the finals in any individual event.

Debnam Leads Way

Moore, Wenner also Medal!

Sophomore Brian Debnam reinforced his status as one of the best athletes on the Albright campus by placing in all three of his events at the MAC indoor track championships held at Dickinson College on Saturday. Brian won the silver medal in his specialty, the triple jump, placed fourth in the long jump (21'6"), and sixth in the 55 meter dash (6.6). While a silver medal might seem like a lot to some athletes, to Brian it came as a disappointment. Debnam was the defending indoor triple jump champion, not to mention the MAC record holder. "My hamstrings felt tight, and I could never reach my top speed," said Debnam. "I think the wait between the 55 trials and finals tightened me up." Brian mped 44'8", far below his record of 47'2". Still, his performance was a courageous one and one that set the tone for the men's team.

A dynamic duo of freshmen added "Moore Wenners" to Albright's team showing. Chas Moore proved that he's not all talk by tying Debnam for the highest finish with a silver medal in the 55 meter high hurdles. Moore finished a close second to nationally-ranked Greg O'Neill of Moravian with a trial time of 7.9 and a final time of 7.8. His time of 7.8 tied his personal best and put him just one-tenth of a second away from NCAA qualifying.

The other freshman to literally "flop" his way to a medal was high jumper Rick Wenner. Just the week before MAC's, Wenner tied a thirty-year old school record with a jump of 6'6". At the championships, Wenner took the bronze with a 6'5" effort. "No, I wasn't

particularly pleased," said Wenner. His jumping coach, Chris Krow, felt differently. "For a freshman to place that high at a big meet like this is outstanding," said Krow. Rick hopes to improve even more during the outdoor season. "I hope to qualify for NCAA's and clear 6'10"." Coach Krow agrees, "We've had the bar at 6'11" at practice, and although he hasn't cleared it, he just barely brushes it. 6'10" is definitely within his range." Wenner attributes a great deal of his success to teammate Debnam. "I think we motivate each other at practice to work harder. It's good to work with an experience jumper at the collegiate level."

Indeed, Brian is experienced. He placed ninth in the triple jump at the indoor NCAA's as a freshman. And although no one has qualified for nationals yet, all three athletes-Debnam, Moore, and Wenner - have onmore week to qualify. All are very close and

Even if no athlete qualifies for nationals this year, the indoor season was a successful one. Youth is the word for the Albright men. Just look at the 4x200 relay team which took a sixth at MAC's (the Lion's only other place- winner). The team consisted of freshman Mark Vottero, Tracey Johnson, Derek Zbyszinski, and sophomore Pat Lazaro. In fact, no junior or senior even made the trip to Dickinson. Head Coach Bill Popp's Lion's finished eighth as a team with 28 points, their highest finish as a team in over a decade, and one of the highest finishes for any Albright am in an MAC championship in any sport! If age and maturity improves performance then this team could be one to reckon with in the next two years.

New VP Advises Athletics

Ed Hershey adresses Albright Sports
