Lion Gridders Meet Flying Dutchmen Tomorrow

As the Red and White prepares to meet Lebanon Valley College in their seventh game tomorrow, it has become increasingly evident during this season that football at Albright is in need of some rather drastic changes. Two specific items have caused the poor record of the team thus far this year. These weaknesses in the Albright College football program have not come upon us all of a sudden; instead they have been growing in importance for several years. The two things are a lack of manpower and an overloaded schedule.

The past several years have seen more football players graduate than new players come in and the effects of such a procedure are becoming readily known. No one on campus has any designs on the Lions becoming a great football power, but even for us to compete with colleges generally classed in our category, more football players must be attracted to Albright. Such colleges as Franklin and Marshall and Lebanon Valley have sported as many as twenty-five freshmen football candidates in very recent years. Albright has good grid players but still can not cope with those schools where coaches can afford to be selective and strict in their football programs.

Play Good . . .

The team has been playing good football this season. Roy Dragon and Frank Hoffman have been chosen as "Unsung Heroes" by the EIFA. Dragon, before he was injured, was the No. 3 small college passer in the nation. These distinctions are just further evidence of the calibre of grid play at Albright.

But one weakness again is the lack of manpower. Is the college giving its gridders a fair chance? The football players, after spending many long hours of practice, want to win just as much, and more so, than the college and students want them to, yet they are forced to play against larger and much more powerful teams week after week, always in the role of the underdog!

Greyhounds Halt Lions 35-13 For Fifth Loss

Wetzel Scampers 49 Yards For Lion Tally; Sudock Fills In For The Injured Dragon

Powered by a devastating ground attack, Moravian College defeated the Lions of Albright 35-13 to celebrate the Greyhounds' Homecoming Day at Bethlehem, Pa. last Saturday afternoon. Moravian, who scored the first two times they got the ball, controlled the game all the way despite a second quarter rally by Albright that nearly tied the game.

The loss was the fifth for the Lions in six contests they have waged thus far this season, while for the Greyhounds, it was their third victory of the campaign.

Bob Wetzel and Doug Layman, both halfbacks, accounted for the two Albright touchdowns. The Moravian touchdowns were divided equally among five players, while freshman center Champ Storch accounted for five of the six extra points. Rod Miller, Paul Slefka, Joe Gerencer, Dave Kratzer, and Jack Filnelli scored the six-pointers, the last two on passes.

Take Lead

Albright received the opening kick but was soon forced to punt. Taking over on their own 37, the Greyhounds scored on 14 successive ground plays, the score coming on a one-yard plunge by Miller. The PAT was good and Moravian led 7-0.

The Greyhounds scored again in the opening minutes of the second quarter when Slefka swept around his right end for 10 yards. Again the extra point was made to push the score to 14-0.

As the first half drew to a close the Lions started to breathe fire; after gaining a first down on the Moravian 48, John Kopp blasted his way for three yards. Then Wetzel, taking a pitchout from quarterback Frank Sudock, ambled around his own right end, put on speed, bowled over several would-be tacklers, hurdled another, cutback and went all the way for the Lions' first tally. Ralph Cyphers' try for the PAT was missed and the score was 14-6.

Attack Sails

Cyphers booted an onside kick and recovered himself to give Albright the ball once again, this time on the home 42. A Sudock to Frank Hoffman pass netted the Lions a first on the 22 but here the offensive approach ground to a halt and the half ended with the count still at 14-6.

The remaining Greyhound touchdowns were scored in the third and beginning of the fourth periods to run the score to 35-6 before Albright could again "find itself." Hoffman blocked a punt, then caught a beautiful pass from Sudock to set up the final tally. Layman took it over the Lions and the final score, after Whitey Rightmire converted, was 35-13.

Girls Win First Game

The girls' hockey squad ventured to Elizabethtown College for their first game of the season last Thursday. The varsity and junior varsity suffered two losses with the scores 7-0 and 5-0 respectively.

The following Tuesday the girls played their second game of the season against the varsity team of Moravian College on our home field. This time the team pulled through with a score of three to one. Carol Smith scored all three goals with Marilyn Wertz and Martha Richards assisting. The fullbacks Lynn Hagenbuch and Bonnie Orr with the goalies. Millie Folk and Amelia Potteiger did a good job in protecting the goal.

Play Tomorrow

Tomorrow the squad will play a game at Lebanon Valley College at 10:00.

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Albright Seeks Second Victory Of The Season

The Albright Lions and Lebanon Valley's Flying Dutchmen will renew a college football rivalry tomorrow which began in 1902. Last season at Albright stadium the Lions handed LVC a 21-14 setback to square the series at 15 wins apiece. Two games ended in ties. This year's contest will be played on the Lebanon High School field in Lebanon.

The widest margin of the series was a 48-0 Valley victory in 1919. Albright's best victory margin was a 20 point bulge, 40-20, in 1939.

Rebuilding

Lebanon Valley's coach, Ellis McCracken, is in his second year as head coach of the Flying Dutchmen. Last year he inherited a green team and a rebuilding job. His team dropped seven games in as many starts, but showed some prospects for seasons to come. With sixteen lettermen back from the '54 squad, plus five more lettermen returning from military service, the Dutchmen have already improved over last year's record, defeating Wilkes College 41-6, and tying Millersville College, 6-6. They have lost to Pennsylvania Military College, Muhlenberg, Moravian, and St. Vincent's College. Their latest defeat was to St. Vincent's, 52-14, last Saturday.

Veterans To Start

Probable starters for Lebanon Valley will be ends, Glenn Thomas and Ross Plasterer; tackles, Tom Quinn and Marty Grochowski or Bob Palmer; guards, Joe Toy and Barry Barnhart; center, Paul DiDangrazio or Frank Giovinazzo; quarterback, Bill Deliberty; halfbacks, Dale Shellenberger and Gene Geesey; and fullback, John Ollinger.

Coach John Potskian's Albright Lions have won but one out of six games thus far. The lone victory was a 20-0 triumph over F&M in their Homecoming Game. They have lost to Bucknell, Gettysburg, Muhlenberg, Alfred, and Moravian, with Lehigh and Scranton still remaining on the schedule.

Dragon Out

The Lions' star quarterback, Roy Dragon, who was injured in the F&M contest and was unable to play against Moravian, will be used sparingly if at all in the Lebanon Valley tussle. Frank Sudock, who started the Moravian game, and Al Kornblum will share the quarterbacking chores. Fullbacks Chris Wenger and John Setticeerze and halfbacks Jack Kopp, Bob Wetzel, Willie Smith, and John Cunningham will see plenty of action in the backfield. The line will consist of center Jack Huntzinger; guards, Bob Sulyma and Fred Ardito; tackles, Frank Goldstein and Art Bellisio or Joe Kremer, and ends, Ed Oberly and Dick McCarty or Frank Hoffman and George Flynn.
