

## F.T.A. Sees K-Town Lab School Techniques

Several members of Future Teachers of America and their advisor, Dr. Russell B. Smith, visited the experimental laboratory school at Kutztown State Teachers' College last week in a survey of the unique educational setup at the school for pupils from nursery school age through junior high school. Many new pedagogical techniques are constantly tried out at the school, revealed the director of the experimental program.

Representing the campus F.T.A. on the tour were Marian Fiedler, Robert Mattern, president of the Albright chapter, Kenneth Good, and John Kissinger.

Mattern reported on the Pennsylvania State Education Association convention at Harrisburg at the meeting of the Future Teachers last Thursday evening. Kissinger also conducted a panel on teacher ethics and the code of ethics set up by the National Education Association.

Several faculty members were present at the meeting, including Prof. Florence Innis, Dr. Virgil Zener, Dean Levan Smith, and Dr. Russell B. Smith.

## Raepfel Conducts Library Survey

A study to determine how the College's library facilities can be improved is being conducted by Librarian Josephine E. Raepfel in collaboration with Richard L. Brown, head of the Reading Public Library, and will continue for three months.

Students and faculty using the Fifth and Franklin building are asked to fill out questionnaires kept at the main desk of the Public Library. The questionnaires will help Librarian Raepfel determine what volumes the College lacks and what added facilities are needed. She also expects, to report her findings at the convention of college librarians this summer.

The dinner was planned by Professor Consuelo Rodriguez and Professor Mary Jane Ward, and all the students worked to prepare it. Several of the items were especially ordered from Puerto Rico for the occasion.
