## Traditions Committee Making Significant Impact On Campus

As you stroll through the campus center, you may have encountered our ferocious Albright mascot chained above the entrance to the South Lounge. You may have seen the window display near the college bookstore or the pictures from past Albright years in Jake's Place.

These additions are just some examples of the work of the Albright Traditions Committee, an organization of which many students have never heard.

The committee was formed two and a half years ago by concerned alumni, faculty, and staff, who saw some of the old Albright traditions starting to die out. They wanted to preserve them to remind the students of Albright's rich past and to help revitalize school spirit.

"Some of us sensed the need for reviving traditions that could enhance the spirit of Albright and what it stands for," said Mary Fry Good, Class of 1949, the director of Alumni Relations and a member of the committee.

The committee, which consists of five alumni, seven faculty and staff members, and the presidents of the current classes on campus, is trying to give students a sense of Albright's history through the campus center displays and the pictures in Jake's Place.

The committee is planning other historical projects as well. In the future it is hoping to provide students and faculty with the opportunity to learn about the people for whom the college buildings are named. The project coordinators envision having a display in the lobby of each building which would contain a picture of the individual and information about his or her life.

"We think this will add significance and depth to the whole experience of being at Albright on the part of the students," said Good.

Traditions Committee Chairperson and 1971 Albright graduate, Beth Shugar, who according to Good is the Albright Alumni Association's most diligent historical researcher, wants students to be familiar with those people who have made significant contributions to the school over the years.

"It is important to put a face with a name," she said. "We want students to really identify with these people."

Another long term project is to create an oral history of the college from the point of view of former alumni, professors, and staff, as well as current longtime Albright employees.

In addition to increasing awareness about Albright's history, the committee is doing a lot of little things to unite the college community in declaring its loyalty to Albright College.

It has encouraged displaying the school colors more prominently around campus. This is especially noticeable on 13th Street where red and white flags now hang from the flagpoles instead of the green and burgundy ones that hung from them in recent years. The red and white painted "A" on the floor in the campus center is also the work of the Traditions Committee. It has also started the custom of decorating the Jacob Albright statue

outside the chapel with red and white flowers on special occasions, such as baccalaureate and commencement, in honor of Eugene Shirk and Dr. F. Wilber Gingrich.

The committee members have tried to familiarize all students with the alma mater and are attempting to make it a part of more school activities and events. The committee would also like to resurrect an old college fight song that could be played at sporting events.

It has succeeded in making the school mascot a focal point of the campus center. Bill Hill, a carpenter and groundskeeper at Albright as well as a Traditions Committee member, is primarily responsible for this. Hill rescued the once dilapidated looking lion from a storage closet, cleaned him, and mounted him above the South Lounge entrance.

According to Good, all the changes put together will make a significant difference.

"All of these things coming together will make a big impact around the school," she said.

Another milestone for the Committee in its efforts to promote more school spirit was reviving Sports Night, which has been discontinued for several years. Herb Miller, from the Albright Class of 1961, organized this year's event which was held in March and drew approximately 80 participants.

Miller was happy with the turnout and thinks that many more students will sign up in the future as word spreads about how much fun the event is.

"I met students just standing around and when I asked them why they weren't participating they said they didn't know much about it, but come next year they would surely participate," he said. "This thing is going to grow as word gets around and in four or five years it will be what it once was 15 years ago."

For now there will be one Sports Night per year in late winter, but the committee may consider adding another one in the fall or think about organizing another competitive activity if student turnout increases in the next few years.

The Traditions Committee, which normally meets once a month in the Paul Pushman Cottage, is assisted in its work by student groups like the Lion Diplomats and the Spirit Committee.

"Not all the things that are done are a result of the Traditions Committee as a whole," said Shugar. "A lot of the time we (groups) get together and bounce ideas off each other."

The Traditions Committee members fully support the efforts of all student groups to enhance the appearance of the campus and promote school loyalty. Good especially admires the initiative of the members of the Spirit Committee who painted giant lion prints on 13th Street last year.

"We honor them for doing this, for helping to keep the place alive," she said.

Good believes the Traditions Committee is also helping to revitalize Albright and is on its way to fulfilling some of its ambitious objectives.

"If we can help make Albright College more meaningful to our current students, faculty, and staff by reintroducing these traditions of the past, we believe our purpose is satisfied," she said.

## The War in Former Yugoslavia: Anniversary of the War in Bosnia

The former Yugoslav republics of Bosnia and Hercegovina were recognized as independent states by the international community on April 6 and 7, 1992. Since the day of their declarations of independence, Bosnia and Hercegovina and their nation have been faced with the harsh reality of the war. The full scale war that has been raging in Bosnia and Hercegovina for three years has been marked by extreme violations of international humanitarian laws, also known as the laws of war. Indeed, violations of the rules of war are being committed with increasing frequency and brutality throughout the country.

The extent of the violence inflicted on the civilian population by all parties is appalling. The loss of civilian life is over 200,000. A policy of "ethnic cleansing" has resulted in the summary execution, and displacement of hundreds of thousands of people on the basis of their religion or nationality. Independent news media comes day after day with reports showing that Bosnia and Hercegovina provides at the very least *prima facie* evidence of ethnic cleansing, genocide, the cases of disappearance, hostage-taking, mistreatment in detention (prisoners are routinely beaten and otherwise tortured, rape in the case of females).

For most people this year does not seem particularly different than the previous ones, but for me as a Bosnian, it raises a question of when the world is going to stop the passive observation on this part of globe. Fear that every day that passes more people will become statistics, if one has the time to record the number. It seems like the international community is not willing to stop the crimes against the Bosnian nation.

Currently I hope that by letting the media know that we still have hope that one day, before the Bosnian population becomes an "extinct species," the international community will help us stop the crimes.

Experience Event, *The War in Former Yugoslavia: Anniversary of the War in Bosnia*, will be presented by Dr. Paul Mojzes, professor of religious studies at Rosemont College, Rosemont, PA on April 12. He is a



native of Yugoslavians who came to the United States in 1957. Upon graduation from the gymnasium in Novi Sad, he studied at Belgrade University Law School from 1955-57. In 1959 he received his A.B. degree *summa cum laude* from Florida Southern College and in 1965 received his Ph.D. from Boston University in church history with emphasis on Eastern Europe. He taught at the University of New Hampshire, Lasalle Junior College, Lycoming College, Florida Southern College, Rosemont College, and Villanova University. He was also a professor and dean at the Graz Center, Austria, from 1969-1979. In 1968 and 1969 he spent a year in Asia on a postdoctoral fellowship studying Asian religions.

Dr. Mojzes is the co-editor of the *Journal of Ecumenical Studies* and the editor of *Religion in Eastern Europe*. He is the author of four books and the editor of several others. He has also written about 100 articles. He has lectured widely in the United States and abroad. His next to latest book is *Religious Liberty in Eastern Europe and the USSR: Before and After the Great Transformation* (1992). He finished a book on the war in the former Yugoslavia and traveled twice to the former Yugoslavia in 1993 to obtain updated information. His book *Yugoslavian Inferno* was published in 1994. Dr. Mojzes is also the president of Christians Associated for Relationships with Eastern Europe and a member of the Europe Committee of the National Council of Churches.

## Puzzle One (worth 2 points):

A cereal manufacturer puts a coupon, numbered 1 to 5, in each box. When you collect a set of all five numbers, you can send in for a "valuable free gift." On average, how many boxes do customers have to buy to win a prize?

## Puzzle Two (worth 2 points):

A traffic light is red for 30 seconds and green for 30 seconds. (It has no amber.) What is the expected wait at the light?

## Puzzle Three (worth 2 points):

How many people do you need to have in a group to be 50 percent sure that at least two of them have the same birthday? Don't worry about birthdays on February 29.

## Puzzle Four (worth 2 points):

An airplane having a cruising speed of 200 km/hr flies from one airport to another 200 km away then returns. How long does the round trip take if

1. There is no wind?
2. There is a constant 40 km/hr headwind going and tailwind returning?
3. There is a constant 40 km/hr crosswind?

## Solutions To The Last Puzzle Contest:

Glenn Guzzleman was the only one who answered at least one of the puzzles right. Guzzleman is the winner of the gift certificate.

## Solution to the First Puzzle:

The usual answer to this old riddle is as follows. If it takes three cats three minutes to catch three rats, it must take them one minute to catch one rat. If it takes them a minute for each rat, then the same three cats would catch 100 rats in 100 minutes.

Unfortunately, it is not quite that simple. Such an answer presupposes something that is certainly not stated in the problem. It assumes that all three cats concentrate their

attention on the same rat until they catch him in one minute, then turn their combined attention toward another rat. Suppose that instead of doing this, each cat chases a different rat and takes three minutes to catch it. In this case, three cats would still catch three rats in three minutes. It would take them six minutes to catch six rats, nine minutes to catch nine rats, and 99 minutes to catch 99 rats.

A curious difficulty now faces us. How long will it take those same three cats to catch the 100th rat? If it still takes them the full three minutes to run him down, then it will take three cats 102 minutes to catch 100 rats. To catch 100 rats in 100 minutes - assuming this is how the cats go about their rat catching - we will certainly need more than three cats and less than four cats.

Of course it is possible that when the three cats gang up on a single rat they can corner him in less than three minutes, but there is nothing in the statement of the riddle that tells us exactly how to measure the time for this operation. The only correct answer to the problem, therefore, is this: the question is ambiguous and cannot be answered without more information about how those cats catch rats.

## Solution to the Second Puzzle:

It is not necessary to know the distance between Chicago and Detroit in order to solve this perplexing little puzzle. When Smith arrived in Detroit, he had gone a certain distance, and it had taken him a certain length of time. If he wishes to double his average speed, it is necessary for him to go twice that distance in the same length of time. Clearly, in order to do this he must return to Chicago in no time at all! This is impossible, so there is no way Smith can raise his average speed to 60 miles an hour. No matter how fast he makes the return trip, he is sure to fall short of a 60 mile/hour average.

This will be easier to understand if we pick a certain distance for Smith to travel, say 30 miles and back. Since his average speed is 30 miles an hour, he will complete the first half of his trip in one hour. He wants to make the round trip in one hour. He wants to make the round trip with an average speed of 60 miles an hour, which means that he must complete the entire 60 mile trip in one hour. But he has already used up his hour. No matter how fast he returns, his initial time will be more than one hour. Therefore he will have traveled 60 miles in more than an hour, making his average speed less than 60 miles/hour.

## Solution to the Third Puzzle:

## A Word From the Chaplain...

Just before Spring Break, I was approached by a female student who had a tremendous concern. She spoke of rumors of sexual abuse on campus. I had already heard these rumors, and it turned out that she knew as much as I did. She did say that problems of violence appear on campus, and asked if there was any way I could help deal with them. Of course I said "Yes." What other answer is there?

Yet, as I thought about this issue during the break, I became less sure of myself. Violence, especially against women, has always been accepted by our society. The scriptures support male dominance and female subservience in ways that are disturbing to my conscience. Until very recently the police did little to protect women from men. The double murder trial of O.J. Simpson has brought the issue into the forefront of society once again, but little has really been made of it.

In a nation that has defined itself by the wars it has won and the leaders who have been assassinated, to speak against violence is to speak against the very nature of the most violent nation in the world. Instead of working to avoid violence, we build jails to punish offenders, usually poor men of color. Instead of controlling guns, we are seeing a

move in many states to liberalize use of handguns. Instead of teaching boys to hug, we teach them to hurt. Violence is part of all of us.

Patterns of violence, drunkenness, and anti-social behavior can be signs of illness and/or arrested adolescence. Those who use violence as a first and only attempt to resolve problems are little more than undisciplined children whose underdeveloped brains cannot fathom other possibilities. Yes, you read that correctly. The point of being an adult is to grow up! That means you STOP when someone says NO! That means you walk away from meaningless arguments! Didn't your parents teach you anything?

I am no stranger to violence. I was raised in a violent home and was in fights constantly until I was 15 years old. At some point I learned that there are very few fights worth fighting. I also learned that you NEVER hurt someone who is smaller than you - only bullies (read - cowards) do that. In the years since, I have learned that it is a rare occasion that anyone needs to use force.

Our next chapel service (4/12 at Noon) will concern itself with this issue. Please join us!

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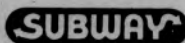
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## Favoritism at Albright?

"Most of the time, it happens when you're drinking, and when you least expect it," sophomore Ryan Graham said. "But there are definitely people who make it a goal for the evening before they go out."

From time to time, those who have boyfriends and girlfriends off campus find themselves hooking up "just to prove they've still got it. It can really make you feel good about yourself," one student noted.

"People hook up for the fun of it, plus it's not bad for the ego," sophomore Marina D'Angelo said. "You can prove to yourself and to others that you can get someone really good. But you have to be very careful not to earn yourself a reputation in the process."

Yet sophomore Jenn Smith disagrees, and feels that "just hooking up says absolutely nothing. In order to receive a real boost in self esteem the other person must follow up."

Frequently, numerous individuals find that "getting together" with someone for the night can either work for or against their self

perceptions, and realize that the vagueness of the definition of hooking up can even work to their advantage.

"Hooking up always seems fun at the time," freshman Claire Struble said. "That is, until the guy doesn't even look at you the next day. That's where immediate gratification comes into play and feelings can really be hurt. I guess it's something spontaneous that you don't have to follow up on, but if you want to, you can make something out of it."

"If phone numbers are exchanged," sophomore Trish Buckalew explained, "and the next day he doesn't call, of course it hurts. But when you just hook up, I don't think you're looking for a relationship."

### Circle of Friends

Set in the beautiful Irish countryside on the outskirts of Dublin in 1957, "Circle of Friends" is an irresistibly funny yet heartwarming tale of three young women venturing into a new world of college life.

The characters display a broad range of personalities. Nan, played by Saffron Burrows, is a sophisticated city girl who has an eye for mature men. Eve, portrayed by Geraldine O'Rawe, is the convent-raised good Catholic girl.

The focus, however, is on Benny, the "soft girl," wonderfully portrayed by Minnie Driver.

Together the three whimsically explore relationship, love, and sex.

This bittersweet romance depicts how the moral forces of the church and the natural forces of the state can come between friends and lovers.
