



Off-campus students will not see benefits of technology fee until 'probably' spring semester of '98

Off-campus students will have to wait at least another semester before they see any benefits from the new \$400 technology fee. Last year when students were

notified about the \$400 technology charge that would appear on their bill, students living off campus were told that they would have the same

access students living campus. However, this has not been the case.

DAdministration hopes to increase enrollment by creating a better image for the College.

Albright has a dying social life. Albright is financially unstable. Albright's administration is not amunicating. These are some of the ideas commonly associated with Albright. Clearly, the College has an image problem. To help improve the image that Albright puts forth to others, consultant Richard Moll was brought on campus and asked to explain from where Albright's image problem stemmed.


"Our Strategic Agenda calls for dramatic growth in admissions, stated President, Ellen Hurwitz. "The market for admissions is highly competitive, so we want to identify areas that need attention, and address them." It is the hope that by improving Albright's image, the College's admissions will increase in quality and quantity.

Moll has been successful at improving the admissions departments of schools such as Bowdein, Vassar and the University of California, Santa Cruz. He is nationally known for his writing and speaking about the college admissions game. Moll arrived on campus a few weeks ago and met with the administration, faculty and a wide range of students to determine what image Albright puts forth, not only to others, but also, to itself.

Moll acknowledged some of the existing trouble areas at Albright, including the self-perception problem that seems to be plaguing campus this year. He also identified some other areas of the College's image that need to be addressed. These included not only aesthetic aspects of campus but also deeper and more internal problems. He suggested working with Penn State Berks and connecting our liberal arts background with the AlbrightWORKS program and hands-on experiences, such as internships, as well.

Aesthetically, Moll noted that the admissions office, currently located in the administration building, did not convey the warm feeling of community that was evident at Albright. He suggested that the office be moved to a more comfortable and warm location. Albright has the appeal of a small, friendly liberal arts school, but that feeling is not transcended through the current physical appearance of the admissions office. Often the

dmissions office must rely upon the friendliness of the Student Ambassador's to convey that communitarian feeling.

Moll's findings also indicated that student morale, as well as school morale as a whole, had to be improved.

"In the past the school has been financially unstable, but for the past two years we have had a anced budget. Our admissions have increased, our faculty remains as superb as ever, and we have a great student body," claims President Hurwitz. So why has the morale on campus decreased so heavily? Even more importantly what can be done to reverse the effects of apathy? "We need to celebrate our blessings," states Hurwitz

Other movements are being made to help create a better self-image of Albright. Ron Potier, the former director of admissions at F&M and Elizabethtown, will be advising the President with regard to the admissions department as well as financial aide. The suggestions made by Moll must be examined thoroughly. Not all of his ideas will be utilized, but they will be taken into consideration.






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Discovering the Origins of Western Art

Amnesty International celebrates Human Rights Day

Wednesday, Dec. 10 was Human Rights Day. It also marked the beginning of a year-long campaign celebrating the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). The UDHR was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on Dec. 10, 1948, and is the most widely accepted statement of human rights. Its purpose is to show that all human beings are equal in value and entitled to certain fundamental rights, such as life, liberty and security. This document serves as the basis for the work of Amnesty International and other human rights organizations.

Over the past few months, Amnesty International has been

distributing pledge cards to all its members; by signing them you are stating that you support the UDHR. These pledge cards are then going to be compiled into "the World's Biggest Book" to be presented to the Secretariat of the United Nations in Paris, on Dec. 10, 1998, to show that the world still cares about human rights.

A celebration of life: Christmas, Kwanzaa and Chanukkah

There are a number of differences between Christmas, Kwanzaa and Chanukkah. However, one similarity runs through all three holidays--the celebration of life.


Christmas is the celebration of the life of Jesus Christ. Kwanzaa celebrates the life of the Black family, which has endured oppression, slavery and racism. Finally, Chanukkah celebrates the courage of the Jewish people who have fought time and time again for their beliefs and their ways of life. There is a tremendous spirit that comes with the celebration of

each of these holiday. Christmas

Jesus Christ was born nearly 2,000 years ago, but no one is sure of the exact date. Dec. 25 was a pagan holiday that somehow ecame labeled as the

day Christ was born. Ironically, the pagans did not believe in Jesus Christ. An attempt to figure out the day Christ was born happened during the third century, when historians tried to decide when the Nativity occurred.

It was known for sure that the Nativity happened on the 25th of one month, but which month was the mystery. It was a common belief that Christ was born on the winter solstice. This was based on the interpretation of prophetic scriptures and the idea that both the Annuciation and the Crucifixion happened on the same day -- March

25th of the ninth month. At that time the ninth month was December. The Roman Church finally declared Dec. 25 as the birthday of

century, proposed that the feat

persecution that happened around AD 310, and Dec. 25 became universally celebrated as Christ's birthday during the fifth century. During the late 19th century in

America, Christmas was not accepted because it was thought of as a "human invention" since the actual date of Christ's birth had been lost in

time. In 1886, one newspaper, called The Christian Advocate, said that Christmas was a day on which more sin and sacrilege and pagan foolishness is committed

than on any other day of the year.

Around 1810, many citizens of ennsylvania had no interest in Christmas. This began to change with the diary of one Quaker woman, who wrote that she "carried out a vigorous housecleaning before Dec. 25 and baked mince pies and doughnuts and shopped for sents for her family. pre

During the 19th century, Christmas was present most in New York. Dutch Settlers celebrated New Year's Eve and New Year's Day with Santa Claus, who would visit the children on New Year's Eve. (Santa Claus emerged in Scandinavia

before Christ was born.) New York had acquired many European traditions and interchanged the traditions of each culture.

Christmas observances became secular once emphasis was put on the children, hospitality, seasonal good cheer and military parades. Special performances in theaters and music halls also became part of the celebration. New England, which had rejected the ideas of Christmas until this point, held the first Christmas celebration in 1887. It was in Bridgeport, Conn. and was compared to the mardi gras of New Orleans. Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is an African-American spiritual holiday, which was formulated, devised, developed and initiated by Dr. Maulana Ron Karenga on Dec 26, 1966. Kwanzaa is a festive and joyous celebration of the oneness of life. It is based on the cultural principles of the Kawaida theory, which believes that "the social revolutionary change for Black America can be achieved by the act of revealing and disclosing individuals to their cultural heritage.

The focus of this holiday is for Black Americans to relate to their past in order to deal with the future. To be able to look forward to prosperity is to be able to look back on ancestry. The purpose of Kwanzaa is to maintain a history -- a history which is knowledge, identity and power.

There are seven social and spiritual principles of Kwanzaa called the Nguzo Saba, which allow Black Americans to relate to each other and rebuild their lives in their own images.

uzo Saba: 1. Umoja (Unity): To strive for and maintain unity in the family, community, nation and race. 2. Kujichagulia (Self Determination):

create for ourselves and speak for

3. Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility): To build and maintain our community together and make our brothers' and sisters' problems our problems and to solve them together.

Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics): To build and maintain our own stores, shops and other businesses and to profit together from them

5.Nia (Purpose): To make as our collective vocation the building and developing of

our community in order to restore our people to their traditional greatness. 6. Kuumba (Creativity): To do always as much as we can, in the way that we can, in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it.

7. Imani (Faith): To believe with all our hearts in our parents, our teachers, our leaders, our people and the righteousness and victory of our struggle.

Chanukkah

Chanukkah, "dedication," is celebrated on the day 25th day of Kisley, which is the anniversary of the rededication of the Holy Temple by the Maccabees.

In memory of the Miracle of the Oil. Chanukkah lasts for eight days. The Miracle of the Oil occurred years With the early death of ago. Alexander the Creat, many generals fought over his empire. Antiochus IV took over the Seleucid kingdom and called himself Antiochus Faiphanes, "God Incarnate". Antiochus IV outlawed all religions nd replaced them with the worship of Zeus. Disobedience was punished by death, which acquired Antiochus Epiphanes the title "The Madman" by the Jews.

Antiochus IV destroyed Jewish

Temples and ordered Yeshivas (seminaries) to be closed and all copies of the Torah (the Five Books of Moses) to be burned. He sent his army to the village of Modi'in, in Judea, to convince Aattathias, the

elderly, honored son of the High Priest, to lead his village in pagan worship. Mattathias refused and was

ered by one single villager who decided to conform. With that he killed the villager and the emissary, which began a guerrilla war between the Seleucids and the people of Modi'in. Once Mattathias died he

appointed his son Judah (called ccabee or "Hammer") as leader. His followers became known as the Maccabees and won several battles against the Seleucids.

After the battle on the Temple ount in Jerusalem, the Maccabees rebuilt the Altar and purified the Temple. When it came time to light the Menorah (the seven-branched candelabra), there was only enough oil to burn it for one day.

Despite this, the Temple was rededicated on the 25th day of the Hebrew month of Kisley, 165 BCE. Miraculously, the oil burned for eight full days, until new oil was prepared and brought to the Temple.

Gay, & Lesbian Activists and Supporters.) Make some gay/lesbian friends


III. Support Change In Others: Acknowledge when someone is non-heterosexist.

Have you seen Scream yet? Well, whether you have or not, the soundtrack will be plenty to get your heart pumping. The soundtrack takes all different musical styles and mixes them together to create the feel of the movie

This soundtrack was excellent overall, but the fact that the producers put two remakes on the album--remakes which are nowhere near as good as the originals--takes away from the entire effect. School's Out, originally by Alice Cooper, is redone by The Last Hard Men, and does not sound nearly as good as the original. The main thing that I can't understand is why they used the original song during the movie yet neglected to place it on the soundtrack.

The other mistake was putting Don't Fear The Reaper on the soundtrack, performed by Gus rather than by The Blue Oyster Cult. This version is much softer and much less effective than the original. What a waste of space that could have been filled with something so much better!

However, not all the of songs on the soundtrack are horrible. For instance, the techno song Artificial World has a beat that is perfect for dancing and seems to lighten the overall mood of the soundtrack. Another good tune is Red Right Hand by Nick Cave. You're sure to

recognize his voice and style if you're heard or seen Natural Born Killers. There is one popular song on

the album which you're sure to have heard on the radio, Youth of America by Birdbrain. If you were looking for that song, this is the only place you're going to find it. It is not on any of Birdbrain's albums.

My favorite song from the ndtrack is Sidney's Lament, the most powerful song by far on the entire album. The song begins soft and slow with light operatic singing in the background. All of a sudden there is a terrifying pounding, almost like that of the human heart. Then a bass line comes in with drums and a sort of Nine Inch Nails tone. This song is one that can definitely not be overlooked.

The Scream soundtrack was released on TVT Soundtrax. You'll recognize some of their other works such as Seven, Mortal Combat (all of the Combats, of course) and Two if By Sea. As most of us well know by now, there is a sequel out to Scream and, yes folks, there is a sequel to the soundtrack, available right now. Even better, there are no sorry remakes on the second soundtrack! Perhaps the second one will truly be worth its name, but the first one only makes a "Screech."

The survivors from the blockbuster original Scream are all back for the sequel. Sidney and Randy are freshmen at Windsor ege. Gail Weathers' book The Birdsboro Murders, which tells the story from Scream, has been mad into a movie. The murders begin at a sneak preview for this new movie, Stab. The carnage quickly makes its way to the Windsor campus. Sidney is again the killer's main

target. Dewey, who received crippling nerve damage from a previous knife wound, shows up to protect her. Gail also visits the ampus, bringing with her Cotton Weary, who spent a year in jail after being falsely identified by Sidney as her mother's killer. He wants retribution for her false accusations.
