a miniature light opera will be presented during this time written by carolyn powers it will be a play concerning a brother and sister from north america who fall in love with a brother and sister from south america


aid rowland paul siegfried alyne wylde betty thompson and carolyn powers will take part in the produc-tion which will include several musical selections


staff members continue in trial editor positions



mrs hager a very attractive w an says that while in the china burma india theatre she had to wear such masculine and-er-sloppy attire that a friend whom she had seen last in the orient barely recognized her when she met him later in washington d c so console yourselves pledges at least you dont have to wear the cos-tumes you do off the campus according to mrs hager those tales about the dirt and heat of the jungle and lack of proper sanitary facilities are only too true after spending some time on an assignment in the jungle mrs hager came back to an army post happily looking forward to a bath in a genuwine bath tub only to find that a mouse had reach-ed the tub before she did






