




The Lion Dips are a big part of Homecoming Weekend. They often work overtime to pull it all off. Thanks guys!




In the MAC Championships, Albright's men finished 10th in the 14-team field.




In the MAC Championships, Albright's women finished 11th in the 14-team field.






Albright finished 5-12 overall, 1-6 and in last place in the eight-team Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League.

Junior Rachel Connolly led the point scorers with seven on three goals and one assist, and was named the MAC Commonwealth Rookie of the Year.


Junior Rhiannon Maniscalco tied for the team lead in goals with three. Sophomore Jenn Parish had two goals and two assists for six points.










In a strong finish, Albright closed the season with a 23-16 upset at Susquehanna and a 34-33 overtime loss to then-undefeated Catholic in Shirk Stadium.

The Lions had chances to win every game but a midseason 33-0 loss at Widener. The other five losses were by a combined 26 points.

Among the individual stars were junior Matt Santoro, who led the runners with 801 yards and eight touchdowns and ranked sixth in the Middle Atlantic Conference; freshman punter Chris Morehouse, who averaged a school-record 43.2 yards per kick to rank No. 1 in the nation in Division III; senior Eric Nemec, who led the team with 57 catches and graduated with nearly every school receiving record; and senior Bob Maro, who led the team with four interceptions and graduated with the career interception record.

Seniors Greg Fisher and Anthony Della Ventura joined Maro and Morehouse as firstteam Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League all-stars. Morehouse also was named the league's Rookie of the Year.



and ranked fourth overall.




Sophomore Sutton Smith scored three goals to lead the Lions to a season-ending 3-0 victory over Widener and provide dramatic evidence of the damage his torn hamstring did to the offense.

With Smith back in the lineup, Albright won five of its final seven games to finish 6-11 overall, 4-3 and in fourth place in the eight-team Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League. Overall, the Lions were 6-5 with Smith in the lineup and 0-6 without him. They were outscored 20-15 with him, 24-3 without him.

Smith finished the season with a team-high five goals and added two assists for 12 points. Senior co-captain Andy Shuman had four goals and one assist and was named a first-team MAC Commonwealth all-star. The only other senior, co-captain Dyke Sassaman, had two goals and two assists.

The Lions opened the season with a four-game winning streak in which they outscored opponents 22-3, but some nagging injuries and a tough midseason schedule caught up to them.

Sophomores Marisa Yoda and Christy Gentile each scored four goals in a 13-0 victory over Alvernia to open the season. However, Yoda broke several toes in the season's first loss, 4-0 to Messiah, and Albright scored just five goals the rest of the way en route to a 5-12-1 record, 1-6 and tied for last place in the eight-team Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League.

Yoda led the Lions with 10 goals and four assists for 24 points Junior keeper Kelli Bracken finished 17th in the nation in Division III in saves per game with 11.3. Gentile had seven goals.




Dennis, playing No. 1 singles, had a 9-6 record. Canelas, playing No. 2, was 9-5.


Albright opened the season with a 5-4 victory over Alvernia and closed with an 8-1 victory over Allentown.

Other highlights included a 9-0 shutout of Wilkes and a 5-4 victory over FDU-Madison.










Junior Lauren Ernst compiled a 10-1 record and junior Andrea Dennis was 9-2.







Despite a 1-5 stretch run, the Lions finished 16-10, which continued the trend of steady improvement during Ken Tyler's tour as head coach. The 16 victories were the most for an Albright men's basketball team since the 1979-80 NCAA Tournament quarterfinalists went 23-7.

Before Albright even played a game, it lost tow of its five returning starters from the 1997-98 team that finished strong to win the MAC Commonwealth title. Although the Lions were loping along at 15-5 through 20 games, they never did really hit stride. Their 21st game was a loss at lowly Juniata that signaled the staggering finish. The 1-5 home stretch included five defeats by a total of 21 points, capped, appropriately, by the overtime loss to Penn State-Behrend.

Junior guard Shawn Swavely, with 1,554 career points, was a first-team Commonwealth and NABC all-star, a second-team ECAC regional all-star, and, most impressively, one of 10 finalists in the nation for the Jostens Trophy, awarded to the Division III Player of the Year, based on performance both on and off the court.


In the season-ending overtime loss, Drewry became the 29th Albright player in men's basketball history to reach 1,000 points. He scored 30 and 29 points in his last two games, and showed flashes down the stretch of the 1997-98 first-team Commonwealth all-star. He was the team's second-leading scorer for the second straight season.






Albright won just five games in 1998-99, but there were plenty of reasons for optimism.


The Lions' top two scorers, guards Alison Proch and Rachel Connolly, averaged 16.0 and 15.9 points per game, respectively. Proch set school records for 3-point shots made and attempted in a season and tied a school record for 3-pointers made in a game. Connolly, a second-team Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth League all-star, scored 365 points, giving her 871 for her career and moving her within striking distance of becoming the eighth woman in Albright history to score 1,000 career points.

Albright won the season-opening Washington College Tournament. The Lions lost seven games by eight or less points, making the overall record a deceptive 5-18 overall, 2-12 in the MAC Commonwealth.





The Lions set nine school records at the MAC Championships and also set many pool records as well.






A lack of available bodies contributed to a 3-12 overall dual record and eighth-place finish in the Middle Atlantic Conference Championships.






















In defense of their Middle Atlantic Conference title, the Lions went 16-3 and repeated as MAC Commonwealth League champions at 6-0. Unfortunately, they fell a set short of repeating as overall conference champions in a 5-4 loss at FDU-Madison. But they earned some consolation when senior Jon Schappell and sophomore John Fotopoulos reached the MAC Singles Tournament semifinals.

The season began, appropriately, with a 7-0 victory over Ursinus. Until the championship match, the Lions' only losses were 5-4 to St. John's (MN) during the spring trip to Myrtle Beach (without No. 1 player Zinn), and 4-3 at Centennial Conference power Muhlenberg. Overall, they won 126 singles and doubles matches and lost just 37 for a winning percentage of .773.

Zinn, playing the entire season at No. 1, finished with a 14-4 record. Fotopoulos, playing No. 2 most of the way and filling in at No. 1 on the Myrtle Beach trip, was 20-3. 


















At 9-24-1, head coach Jim Campbell might not have been satisfied with the final results, but he did take encouragement from the improvement the Lions showed.



Perhaps the biggest news item of the past year concerned the possible impeachment of President Clinton. Everywhere you turned, people were talking about Clinton and Monica Lewinsky and how this incident affected his ability to govern the country.

President Bill Clinton became embroiled in a White House scandal that led to Congressional hearings on possible impeachment. It all started when Republican attorney Kenneth Starr was appointed as a Special Prosecutor to investigate President and Hillary Clinton's failed investment in an Arkansas real estate venture called Whitewater. A grand jury was called and that led to several other investigations that eventually focused on accusations that the President was involved in obstruction of justice and perjury. He was accused of having an 18-month sexual relationship with Monica Lewinsky, then a 21-year old White House intern. President Clinton eventually did admit to inappropriate behavior, but Congress pushed forward forward to bring the President to an impeachment trial in the Senate.

House Judiciary committee chairman Henry Hyde, a Republican from Illinois, led the House of Representatives in the impeachment of President Clinton. He then delivered the Articles of Impeachment to the U.S. Senate. A trial to impeach the President was conduced but not before a vote of 43-57 rejected a motion to dismiss the case against the President.



Serving his tenth term in Congress, Newt Gingrich was the first Republican to be re-elected Speaker of the House of Representatives since 1928. He was first elected Speaker in 1995 with the promise of enacting a new conservative agenda. He was re-elected in 1997. Characterized as arrogant, but also intelligent and effective, Gingrich had described himself as a "conservative futurist."

Jesse Jackson was many things to many people. He was a civil rights activist, a Baptist minister, a presidential candidate and confident of President Clinton. As controversial as he was charismatic, he was always named whenever there was talk of the need for a new African-American leader. He was undoubtedly one of the more striking figures in American public life in the late twentieth century.






Hurricane Georges was the costliest disaster in the 17 years of Red Cross relief efforts, topping the \$81.5 million the agency spent on Hurricane Andrew. Georges ripped up through the Florida Keys and into the Gulf of Mexico before it slammed into Mississippi and Alabama. Preliminary industry estimates put Georges' cost to insurance companies at \$2.5 billion, the third-costliest such storm on record. Georges costs rank behind Hugo in 1989 and the No. 1 hurricane for damage, 1992's Andrew.

Pope John Paul II began his 21st year as Pope in the fall of 1998. The 78-year-old pontiff continued to be a champion of economic justice and an outspoken defender of the Catholic Church in Communist countries and remained uncompromising on moral issues. Noted for his energy and analytical ability, he traveled to many countries, preaching to huge audiences. In 1981 he survived an assassination attempt, when he was shot during an appearance in St. Peter's Square.






As students were preparing to return to school in September, the stock market's Dow Jones Industrial Average was taking a dive. Down 512 points — or 6 percent — in one day. It wasn't a pretty picture on Wall Street. Investors saw the stock market make tremendous gains earlier in the year. But during the summer, stocks began to lose value and by early fall the market had lost all that it had gained during the year. It was not a time for jittery investors to be in the stock market.




Mark McGwire (top) and Sammy Sosa (right), two power-hitters in the game of baseball, were in a battle of home runs during the summer. Both were looking to beat the home run record of 61 set by New York Yankee Roger Maris in 1961. When the dust settled at the end of the season, McGwire, a 34-year-old right-handed hitter from the St. Louis Cardinals, won the home-run record with 70. Sosa, a 30-year-old right-handed hitter from the Chicago Cubs, hit 66 home runs.





Quarterback John Elway led the Denver Broncos to a 34-19 win against the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl XXXIII at Pro Player Stadium in Miami. The Broncos scored 17 points in the game's first half and then 17 more in the fourth quarter alone.

The New York Yankees won a record 24th World Series championship with a sweep of the San Diego Padres. IN addition to dominating the Series, the Yankees dominated the 1998 baseball season. They finished the year with an overall record of 125-50. The best ever. Scott Brosius is seen here at the plate in the third game of the World Series.



U.S. Senator John Glenn ended his long career in the Senate with a return to space. Astronaut Glenn, 77, who made a pioneering space flight in 1962, returned to space in November, 1998, aboard the Discovery on a 10-day mission.





The World Cup competition is held every four years. The 1998 games were held in France and it was the French team that won the nation's first-ever World Cup title by defeating Brazil 3-0. More than a million revelers packed the historic Champs-Elysees to celebrate the victory. The broad avenue became the focal point of celebrations and many called the impromptu street party the largest outdoor celebration since Liberation Day in 1944.



Terrorist bombs exploded at the American embassies in Kenya and Tanzania in late summer. The Nairobi bomb took place almost simultaneously with the bombing in Dar es Salaam and killed 247 people. Another 5,500 people were injured. The Dar es Salaam explosion killed 11 people. A few arrests were made, but American government officials say the man responsible was Osama Bin Laden. While Bin Laden, an exiled Saudi millionaire, was not charged in the bombing, U.S. officials suspect him of financing several terrorist strikes around the world. One of those bombings was the 1996 bombing of Khobar Towers, a U.S. military apartment complex in the Saudi Arobian city of Dhahran. Nineteen U.S. servicemen were killed and about 500 people were injured in the blast.





The Backstreet Boys got together about five years ago when Howie, Nick and AJ met at auditions. They decided to form a group and Kevin heard about them and they got together. Kevin's asked his cousin Brian to join, and there you have the Backstreet Boys. The group was named after a big market in Orlando, FL, and they won the Viewers Select Award at the MTV Europe award two years in a row. Their albums have topped the charts and their hit songs are always on the radio. This all-boy band has hit stardom and they don't seem to be slowing down.

Sarah McLachlan is a talented Canadian whose work is marked by expressiveness, warmth and the skillful blending of moody rock and folk. Her debut album, "Touch", in 1988, quickly got her a lot of attention. Her latest album, "Surfacing", debuted at No. 2 on the charts and quickly hit the top spot. It went on to sell more than 3 million copies. Nearly a year after its release, it was still going strong, winning her two Grammy Awards.





Celine Dion was the youngest of 14 children, growing up in a working-class family in Quebec. In her home, two things were important — children and music. Her parents operated a small restaurant and club where the children could showcase their musical talents. Dion's rise from teenage nightclub singer to an award-winning superstar. In 1990 she made her English-language debut with Unison.



When Shania Twain launched her phenomenal recording career five years ago, she decided to initially support her albums with music videos rather than touring. Now, three albums and 15 music videos later, Twain has become one of the top selling female singers in the United States, with sales approaching 17 million albums worldwide. She says the music videos are crucial. "It's really been the only true performance in my career for the last four years, so I think that speaks volumes for what it's done for my career."

















































































The Degree Completion Program
