Another successful week for Albright in Athletics. The Varsity ball-players journeyed to Philadelphia and found the Osteopaths unprepared for their attack, and the pitchers had even less trouble behind a sound defense. There seem to be no loopholes of weakness this year. The pitching is superb and the fielding is excellent. The batting was chosen as the weakest part of the squad, however, although not exceptionally numerous the hits have been timely, when most needed, and with men on the sacks, in this respect deserved of commendation. The game with Seton Hall was called off because of some contract difficulties, and probably no game will be played against them this year.

The trackmen after having great trouble getting to Shippensburg due to engine trouble and flat tires, etc., had an equally difficult task in winning by a nine point margin from the Shippensburg College team. Again the strength of the Red and White athletes was vested almost entirely in the field events, with practically none in the running events. Green was the outstanding athlete of the day taking four firsts, an three seconds for a total of twenty-nine points or more than half of the total scored by Shippensburg. Shippensburg trimmed Dickinson a few days previous, which of course shows well for Albright.

The Tennis team won one and lost one for the week, for an average of five hundred. Villanova won easily six matches to one on Tuesday, whereas, Albright beat Muhlenberg five matches to one on Wednesday. The Villanova players were in perfect condition having played ten matches already this year, as well as having excellent court facilities for practice. With the reconconditioning of our courts the team should show up much better in its return match with Villanova. The team remains quiet until the 18th against Muhlenberg at Allentown.

The baseball team goes into action against Moravin College this Wednesday, at Bethlehem, and again on Saturday with Temple at home.

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Shippens'g Bows To Lion Trackmen in Dual Meet, 67-58

Green of S. T. C. High Scorer with 29 Points; Bailey Gass Leads Lions

Last Saturday the Albright track team once again showed its fine merit by noosing out a strong Shippensburg aggregation in a dual meet held at the Shippensburg State Teachers College. A fast track and fine weather made it possible for the Red and White feet-foots to show their true ability. The representatives of Albright amassed a total of 67 points while their opponents were busily engaged in collecting 58 points.

Most of the times were unusually fast, especially in the shorter races. Green of Shippensburg seemed to hold a monopoly on the first places in the shorter races. All that the entrants in the hundred, two-hundred, four-hundred and eight-hundred yard dashes saw of him was his flying feet. The four tapes strung up for these events were forced to give way before his heaving chest. However, the Albright men kept themselves in the running by taking second and third places.

The mile run displayed a return of Bartholomew form, as "Red" loped home ahead of field. Reis finished second. Manwiller placed third in the two mile run.

The field events proved to be the strong events in Albright's track team. Bailey Gass walked off with first places in the shot-put and in the javelin, and with a second place in the discus. Dittman threw the discus 123 feet to win.

Albright's star high jumper, Shippe, easily won the high-jump at 5 feet 8 inches. Haines, with a 19 feet 9 inch leap in the broad-jump, added five more points to the Albright column. "Charley" also led the way over the high bar, crossing it with a 10 feet 6 inch vault.

To his four first places on the track, Green also added three second places in field events giving him a total of 29 points.
