ALBRIGHT UPSETS GEORGETOWN

PLAYING inspiring football under their new coach, Clarence Munn, former All-American guard from the University of Minnesota, the Albright College Lions startled the football world at Griffith Stadium by inaugurating the 1935 season with a 7-0 upset victory over the favored Georgetown University aggregation.

The hero of the contest for the conquerors was "Dick" Riffle, giant, speedy half-back, who tallied the winning touchdown in the initial period. Riffle played sensational ball and captured the spotlight with his lightning runs and spectacular kicks.

Although Georgetown earned 13 first downs, the issue was seldom in doubt as the Lions flashed a powerful running attack coupled with lateral pass plays which the Hoyas couldn't fathom.

The Lions' score came in the first quarter when Riffle kicked from behind his own goal line, the ball evading Keating and going down to the Georgetown 20 yard line. Meglen, Hoya captain, got off a poor boot in return, and then the Lions went to work. Riffle and Felty teamed to bring the ball to the enemy seven yard line from which Riffle toted the pigskin over the line for the one and only touchdown of the night. Captain Ross's boot sailed over the crossbar, and the Lions obtained a 7-0 lead which they never relinquished.

Georgetown's biggest threat came in the final period when Riffle kicked to Keating who took the punt and scampered 40 yards to Albright's 30 yard line where Oslislo hauled him down. The defense of the Lions tightened, however, and after a grounded

pass in the end zone, Albright gained possession of the ball on its own 20 yard line. Riffle immediately kicked out of danger, and the last Hoya hope for victory was gone.

It must be said that the Albright warriors played a bang-up game and deserved to win.


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
ROARING LIONS OVERWHELM LEOPARDS

BLASTING six touchdowns with the appalling suddenness and crushing power of a tornado, our Albright College Lions crushed the Lafayette Leopards at the stadium by the score of 38-0 in another amazing gridiron performance.

This victory exploded the myth of the Lafayette impregnability based on eight previous victories over Albright and was the most crushing defeat in the long and colorful career of the Leopards, once an outstanding eleven in the nation.

The touted bulwark that was once the Lafayette line crumbled like a flooded levee as the Red and White struck early in the second period. After a see-saw offensive battle in the first quarter in which neither team reached dangerous territory, the Lions raced to a touchdown after five minutes of the second quarter as "Dick" Riffle on a spinner





play carried the pigskin over the line from the six yard marker. Captain Ross failed to kick the extra point. The next two scores came almost before the dust clouds of the first score had settled, with Riffle again providing a touchdown. After Woods returned a punt five yards to Lafayette's 49 yard line, the Lions went to work. Riffle stiff-armed his way around end for 13 yards; Oslislo hit the line for six yards; a pass to Powell was good for 14 yards; Oslislo again broke loose for a ten yard gain; and finally Riffle took the ball from Woods on a reverse and sprinted 22 yards to score. The attempted kick from placement was again wide. The other score came shortly after as "Lovey" McCormack, substituting for Riffle, intercepted a pass and raced 47 yards for the third marker. This time Captain Ross booted the ball straight between the goal posts and the half ended 19-0.

The second half began much the same as the first with the Leopards showing a flash of power for the first few moments. It lasted just a short time, however, for the fourth touchdown made by the Crimson tornado came out of the clouds like greased lightning, as "Dick" Riffle heaved a 20 yard pass to Powell, who eluded his would-be tacklers and raced 52 yards to the score. Powell attempted to kick the extra point, but it was blocked.

McCormack scored the last two touchdowns during the last quarter, first cutting loose around end and then later hitting the line for the final score after Brandenburg, reserve center, placed the Lions in scoring position by intercepting a pass. The game ended a few minutes after Tony Troisi's trusty toe added the final extra point.

OUR Albright College Lions clawed their way to a third successive win and revenge as well in defeating the Ursinus Bears at Collegeville by the score 23-0.





Moravian swung into its scoring drive at the beginning of the second period. Felty punted to Moravian's 38 yard line. Chanitz immediately hurled a pass to Anderko for a first down and after four plays in which they gained 28 yards, Kantarian took a "Statue of

Liberty" pass from Chanitz and plowed eight yards to Albright's nine yard line. After two plays, Mazza took a long, flat pass from Chanitz and stepped across the goal line.

For the rest of the period and all of the third quarter Munn's eleven were like ragaing beasts in their effort to tie the count but their best attempts fell short until the long drive in the fourth quarter.

For Moravian Todd was the tower of strength on the defensive with his backing up the line, while Chanitz was the star of the offense with his constant running threats. For Albright, Disend, Garnet, Scholl, and Obrzut stood out on the line while "Dick" Riffle stopped many plays in the secondary.



LIONS SUFFER FIRST DEFEAT

THROWING a bombshell into the Albright Lions' camp, the West Chester State Teachers' College shattered the local eleven's winning streak and hopes for an undefeated season by the score of 7-6.

"Pepper" Nye, Teachers' triple-threat half back from Harrisburg, set off the blast which tied Albright's six point lead, scored by Powell in the third quarter, when he intercepted Powell's forward pass, and raced 52 yards behind massed interference for a tally in the fourth period. "Bill" Steckbeck booted the extra point, which provided the margin of victory.



Albright registered 12 first downs to West Chester's four, and gained 279 yards from scrimmage, but in the payoff it was Nye's score which won for a team that was widely outrushed. Albright's backfield aces were Riffle, Felty, Powell, and Tony Troisi, who stepped into "Red" Woods' shoes at the signal calling post. Besides his heady play, Troisi did some brilliant blocking and tackling, and made several long returns of punts. "Moose" Disend was the Gibraltar of strength on Albright's defensive play as he broke through constantly and smashed up interference.

The lot of being the hero and goat of the game fell to "Woody" Powell. In the third quarter, with the ball resting on the six yard line, Powell took a nifty lateral from Troisi and outran the West Chester secondary, crossing into the end zone to score standing up. "Johnny" Muller, however, failed to kick the extra point. Then in the last quarter on the first play after Nye had booted to Troisi "Woody" Powell faded back, stiff-arming the onrushing West Chester linemen. He started on an end run, was smothered, then threw a wobbly pass straight into the arms of Nye. The fleet halfback was off like a rabbit as interference formed in a solid mass around him, and went over for an easy score.

The game was costly to the Lions for "Lovey" McCormack, Riffle understudy and triple-threat halfback, suffered a fractured ankle as he went down under his own punt and smeared Nye on the return.

ALBRIGHT DOWNS TRADITIONAL RIVAL

PROVING their superiority under the new coaching regime of Clarence Munn, the Lions defeated Lebanon Valley's Flying Dutchmen in a resumption of their traditional rivalry at Annville by the score 10-0.

"Dick" Riffle again pointed the way as he brought to a speedy conclusion the first quarter drive of the Lions, by taking a lateral from Tony Troisi, who had received the ball from Claude Felty on a reverse and galloped five yards to pry off the scoring lid. Captain "Hank" Ross added the extra point from placement. From that time the Lions

held the upper hand, repulsing a number of Valiant drives while play swept from one 20 yard line to the other.

The Lions maintained their rigid defensive standards by bottling "Johnny" Tindall, elusive Valiant quarterback, who threatened continuously with his thrusts off tackle. Notable in stopping Jerry Frock's greatest ball carrier was Leo (Moose) Disend, who broke through the line of scrimmage more than once to stop plays before they were under way.

A field goal in the last quarter by "Johnny" Muller put the polishing touch to the decisive triumph, climaxing a drive of 37 yards. With the ball on the Valiants' 28 yard line, after three successive attempts had netted a loss of seven yards, Muller went back to the 36 yard marker and, as Troisi held the ball, sent the pigskin sailing between the goal posts.

Lebanon Valley filled the air with all kinds of passes in the remainder of the quarter, but Albright put up one of its best pass defenses this year to quell the threatening score.

The final score was not truly indicative of the Lions' tremendous rushing power, as they compiled 14 first downs as compared with the Flying Dutchmen's seven. Eight of the Lions' first downs practically went to waste in the second half as their potential scoring drives fell short of their mark.

ALBRIGHT NIPS VAUNTED F. & M. ELEVEN

AN INSPIRED Albright eleven scored the second upset of a remarkable season by defeating Franklin and Marshall's powerhouse 9-6 before 8,500 delirious fans, the largest gridiron gallery in the local college history.

The Lions roared early in the opening period when "Johnny" Muller place kicked a perfect field goal from an angle on the 14 yard line. Several minutes later the Munnsmen scored their touchdown on a 45 yard parade of ten plays, climaxed by "Dick" Riffle's dynamic plunge off right tackle for the marker.

Franklin and Marshall made its lone touchdown in the second quarter as Langford, substitute back, broke through right tackle on a reverse, switched back to the sidelines, and raced 36 yards to score.

During the remainder of the game Albright fought desperately to hold its lead. In the third period Franklin and Marshall swept the Lions' forward wall before a sustained driving attack of 65 yards up the field, but twice the Albright line braced inside its own five yard marker. On the first occasion with a first down on Albright's three yard stripe, the Diplomats were thrown for two successive losses. Medwick, sensational halfback, smashed to the one yard line, and then Wearch leaped into a pile of struggling Lions who stopped him within inches of the goal line. Then after Riffle kicked while standing between his own goal posts, the ball was downed on Albright's 16 yard line, and in two plays the Diplomats had a first down on the five yard line. A run, a pass, and another run were smothered, and then on the following play a desperate defensive line broke

through to deflect Dinsmore's attempted field goal. The last serious threat of the invaders.

Perhaps the outstanding player of the game was Leo Obrzut, Albright center, who recovered one Diplomat fumble and intercepted two long passes at critical moments of play. Conspicuous on the line, were "Charley" Barnard, and Leo Disend, while "Dick" Riffle, and Muller shone in the backfield.

Notable in ground gaining for Franklin and Marshall were Joe Medwick, Langford, and Edward Sielski.

OUR local college eleven crossed their football River Jordan, literally as well as figuratively, when they rolled like a Red and White tide over a hapless Muhlenberg eleven by the score of 31-6 to complete a highly successful season.

Playing in a pouring rain, which converted the gridiron into a quagmire, the Lions tallied seven first downs against seven, and rushed the ball 220 yards to the enemy's 135. The game was not five minutes old when Albright punched across the first score, Powell receiving a lateral from Woods and cutting deeply towards the sidelines, then outrunning the Muhlenberg secondary for 18 yards. The Mules came right back to tie the score when Ed (Scrapper) Farrell took it over from the two yard line after a sustained drive of 84 yards.

Albright's second touchdown was scored late in the second quarter when Riffle dove over the line from the one yard line.

With this slight lead to work on, the Lions returned after half time to crush the forward wall of the visitors, running wild for long gains, swooping on breaks, and parading through the mud for three more touchdowns.

Powell twisted through tackle for the first score after "Dick" Riffle broke loose around end with a brilliant 45 yard run to the Mules seven yard line. The next touchdown came on an unexpected break. Farrell was slow in punting from his own 37, and "Bill" Becker, Albright end, broke through the interference to deflect the boot, picked it up, and galloped over the Mules' goal line. Oslislo cracked tackle for the final score with minutes to play in the final quarter.

For the invading Mules Farrell was undoubtedly the most dangerous threat. His persistent plunges through Albright's slow moving line in the first quarter were responsible for the Utzmen's only score. For the Lions "Dick" Riffle was again brilliant in his work while Felty and Fittipaldi, sub halfback, were outstanding in their last game for Albright. Nine seniors made their final bow on the Albright football stage. They were: Captain "Hank" Ross, "Eddie" Scholl, Caude Felty, Louis Fittipaldi, James Woods, Charles Barnard, Harold Enders, Charles Hinkle, and Carl Buechle.

Basketball

THE Albright varsity basketball team completed their schedule with a record of nine victories as against nine losses for a .500 average in the first year coaching administration of Clarence Munn. They ranked third in the final standing of the Eastern Pennsylvania Collegiate League following Franklin and Marshall and Gettysburg, and preceding Drexel, Ursinus, Lebanon Valley and Muhlenberg.

The Lions got off to a poor start by losing the first three contests. Kutztown State Teachers, Franklin and Marshall, and Drexel before capturing a victory over a weak Munienberg quintet at the local Y. M. C. A. They won the next battle by upsetting the Ursinus Bears on a last minute rally, but then lost two in succession to West Chester Teachers, who seemed to be having an exceptionally good season, and to St. Joseph. They returned to winning ways by easily defeating the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy and then our traditional rival, Lebanon Valley. Muhlenberg then downed the Lions, but the latter came right back by beating Trsinus for the second time. Again the Lions went down to defeat—this time at the hands of Gettysburg, champions of the league, whose rally in the last few moments of the game shaded the Lions by only one point. Albright, determined to improve its slate, won three games in succession by drubbing Franklin and Marshall, highly favored to annex the championship; West Chester, and Drexel. The season was finally brought to a close by the second loss to Gettysburg and an easy victory over the Lebanon Valley Valiants.

Here we can see that, although the Lions were inconsistent at times, they did very well in the face of conditions. Considering that it was the first year under Munn's coaching regime, the Lions played as good as could be expected and in another year should improve immensely. The team consisted mostly of sophomores, men who had no varsity experience prior to this year. "Red" Woods, captain, and "Hank" Ross, both seniors, formed the nucleus of the squad consisting of Kehler, Becker, Riffle, and McClintock, juniors; and Troisi, Oslislo, Knox, Slingerland, Shirk, Treida, and Disend, sophomores. Captain Woods, finishing his third year of varsity play, was the best offensive threat for the Lions throughout the season and finished seventh in the league standings with a total of 90 points. Oslislo, brother of "Goose" Oslislo, all-conference guard two years ago, was a brilliant performer on the floor, and while not an outstanding offensive threat, played sensationally at guard and time and again prevented what would have been goals for the opposition. While "Dick" Riffle was, as usual, very dependable, "Bill" Becker gave a fairly steady and consistent performance throughout the season.


Debating Team

Under the direction of Dr. Eugene R. Page, head of the English department, the team participated in debates with Swarthmore, University of Pennsylvania, Bard College of Columbia University, Colgate, Penn State, Lebanon Valley, Moravian, Bucknell, Grove City, Geneva, Hampden Sydney, Ursinus, and Susquehanna. The popular and controversial question was "Resolved, That the Congress of the United States should have the right by a two thirds majority vote to overrule the decisions of the Supreme Court affecting the constitutionality of legislation passed by Congress." The second question which was debated several times early in the season was "Resolved, That the United States Constitution should be amended permitting Congress to regulate intra-state commerce."

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
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
