**PRESIDENT HARRY V. MASTERS:
TWENTY-FIVE YEARS
AT ALBRIGHT COLLEGE**



Early in February, 1938, the Albright College community, together with Reading and Berks County, was expectantly awaiting the arrival of the new president of Albright College. On February 2, the trustees had announced that Dr. Harry V. Masters had been elected to this position from a group of thirty-six men who had been seriously considered. Twenty-five years later, at its meeting on October 1, 1962, the faculty of Albright College passed a resolution congratulating President Masters on the commencement of his twenty-fifth year and expressing the respect and admiration which they hold for him. This tribute is readily understood when one reviews the phenomenal progress that Albright has made under the administration of President Masters.

Viewing the situation from the perspective of a quar-



ter of a century, it is difficult to see how the trustees of 1938 could have made a better choice. At that time the new president was thirty-five years of age. He was born on December 2, 1902, at Warren, Ohio, into a family that had long been prominent in the Evangelical Church, the sponsoring denomination of Albright College.

Harry Masters was graduated in 1924 from Western Union (now Westmar) College at LeMars, Iowa, a sister institution of Albright. He continued his education at the State University of Iowa, where he earned an M.A. degree in 1925 and a Ph.D. degree in 1927. During the last two years of his graduate work, he was a research assistant.

In 1926 he married Veerah Jones of LeMars, who

had also been a student at Western Union. The young couple took their first office at Hibbing, Minnesota, where Dr. Masters was supervisor of intermediate grades and junior high schools from 1927 to 1929. From there they moved across the continent to the Western State College of Education at Bellingham, Washington, where he was Professor of Education and Associate Director of the Bureau of Research, from 1929 to 1933. He then became superintendent of the training school at Ohio University, Athens, Ohio, and continued in this position until 1936, when he was elevated to the position of Dean of the College of Education at Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa. It was here that he was visited by Dr. H. F. Schlegel and Dr. E. E. Stauffer of the Albright College Board of Trustees, and interviewed concerning the position made vacant by the resignation of President J. Warren Klein on February 3, 1937.

In 1938, Albright College could look back on eighty-two years of honorable, though complicated, history. What was called the Greater Albright at Reading was the product of a merger of Albright at Myerstown, Pennsylvania, and Schuylkill College on the Reading campus of the latter in 1928. With the actual physical merger, several new buildings were erected in 1929. Just at that time, the stock market crash ushered in the severe depression of the thirties, and the financial situation of the College became increasingly difficult. President W. F. Teel died in 1932, and the burden of seeing the College through the depression was shouldered by his long-time associate, Dr. J. Warren Klein. At one time the funded and floating debt of the college amounted to \$500,000, and the very life of the institution was threatened by proposals to foreclose the mortgages on the science hall and the School of Theology building (now Teel Hall). Fortunately, Dr. Klein was able to interest Mrs. Annie Merner Pfeiffer of New York in the plight of the college, and by the time Dr. Masters assumed office on September 1, 1938, the liquidation of this debt was in sight.

Apart from its financial troubles, Albright College was in reasonably good condition in 1938. Three hundred and eighty students were enrolled, the faculty numbered thirty-eight, and the land, buildings, and



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equipment were valued at \$1,382,974. There were scholarship funds of \$4,896, and an endowment of \$296,141. The net worth was \$1,037,191.

Dr. and Mrs. Masters, their eight-year old son, Thomas Lee, and their two-year old daughter, Jane, were enthusiastically received in Reading by both the college and the community. Thomas is now a graduate of Albright, and Jane, an alumna of Bucknell University, is the wife of Dr. P. Kenneth Nase an alumnus of Albright.

President Masters with what were to become familiar characteristics of understanding and fairness, avoided sudden or radical changes. Yet the growth and improvement of the college during his tenure of office has been extraordinary.

This rapid process of expanding the scope and facilities of the college began in 1939 with the appointment of the Rev. H. L. Brinner as the first full-time director of public relations. The first cultural program committee was appointed in 1940. In the same year, the faculty received the first salary increase since the depression. The first Ivy Ball, an all-college dinner dance, was held October 11, 1941, at a price of \$1.25. In 1942, the first endowed chairs were founded in religion and biology. Mr. E. L. Shirk was named the first full-time faculty manager of athletics in 1942, but did not actually function in that office until after World War II.

The Second World War produced strains on the College, but under the direction of President Masters, Albright adapted its pattern to meet the demands of wartime. As early as the fall of 1939, the Civil Aeronautics Authority sponsored a program on the campus. In June, 1941, the Federal Program for Engineering, Science, Management and Defense Training, in cooperation with the extension department of Pennsylvania State College, began a series of evening classes at Albright that lasted until June of 1945 and trained ap-



proximately five thousand people from three hundred industries and businesses.

By September, 1943, the total full-time enrollment of students had dropped to two hundred and thirty-two, of which one hundred and fifty-one were women. This situation was partially alleviated by the presence of the Seventh College Training Detachment (Air Crew) numbering two hundred men. This training pro-

gram lasted from March, 1943 to May, 1944. During the war years, the college schedule was accelerated, vacations were cut short, and there were two six-weeks summer sessions.

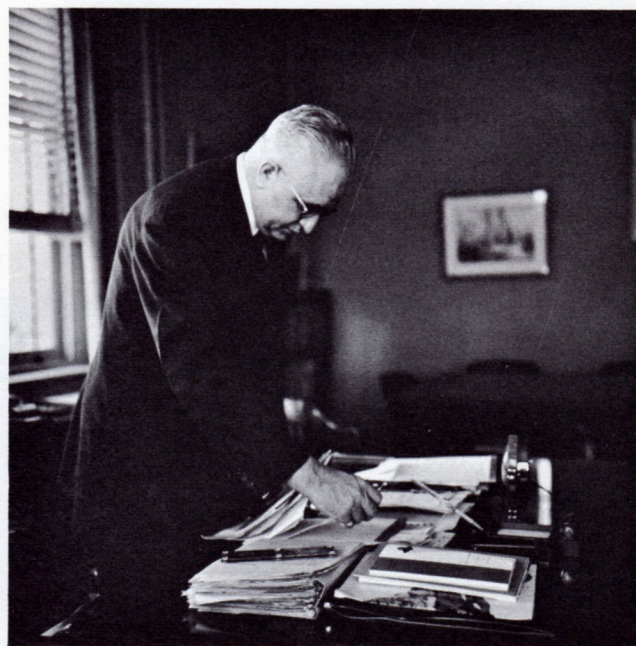
These were years of unusual strain on President Masters. In 1942 he was seriously ill with pneumonia and was hospitalized for over three weeks. On December 2, 1943, his birthday, there was a small fire in the



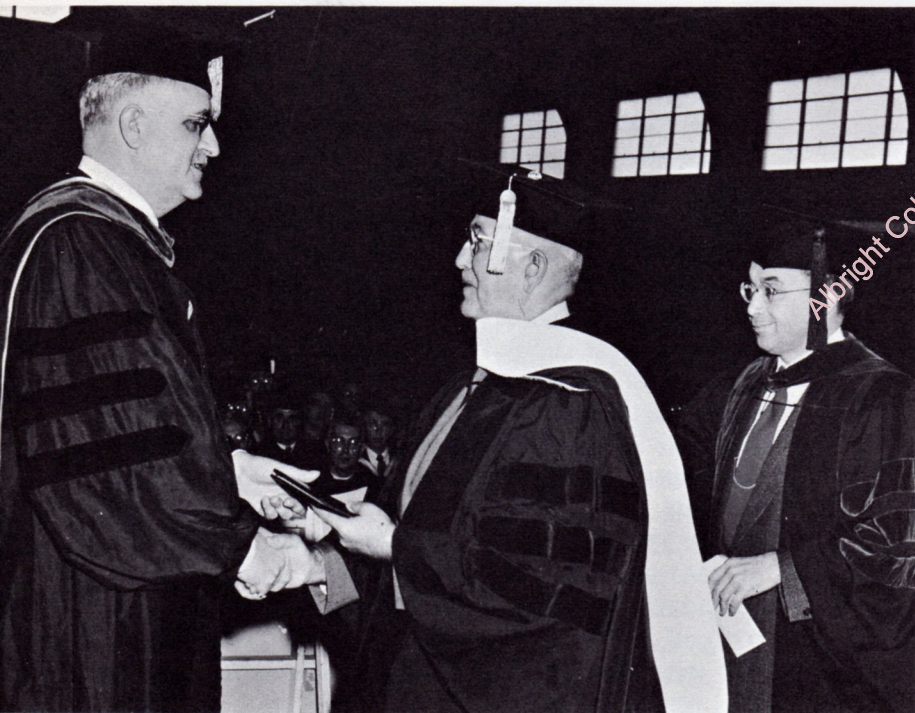
organ in what is now known as White Chapel; he was the one who discovered it and served as an amateur fireman.

The end of the war brought with it a flood of veterans and the necessity of enlarging the faculty considerably, but also resulted in the great satisfaction of dealing with what was probably the finest group of students who ever attended Albright College.

Peacetime also brought a renewed expansion in the facilities of the College. In 1945, a cooperative program for nurses was begun with the Reading Hospital. On November 19, 1945, the Veterans' Administration Guidance Center was established, and after June, 1948, became the Psychological Service Center, directed by Dr. M. G. Geil. Levan P. Smith was made the first dean of men in 1946. The first Pretzel Bowl football game, for the benefit of crippled children, was played November 24, 1951.



A five-year liberal arts-engineering program and a similar program in forestry were instituted in cooperation with other institutions in 1953. In the same year, the women graduates of Albright became eligible for membership in the American Association of University Women. On August 1, 1954, Mary E. Fry became the first full-time alumni secretary. The first annual faculty retreat was held September 19, 1954. The centennial celebration of 1955-1956 was marked by a series of brilliant events and convocations that made such a fine impression that convocations have become a permanent feature of each college year. In the spring of 1955, a system of sabbatical leaves for the faculty was established. Over the years, there have been liberal increases in faculty salaries, and the fringe benefits now in effect are among the most generous to be found anywhere in the United States. This has placed Albright in a good position in the increasingly competitive mar-



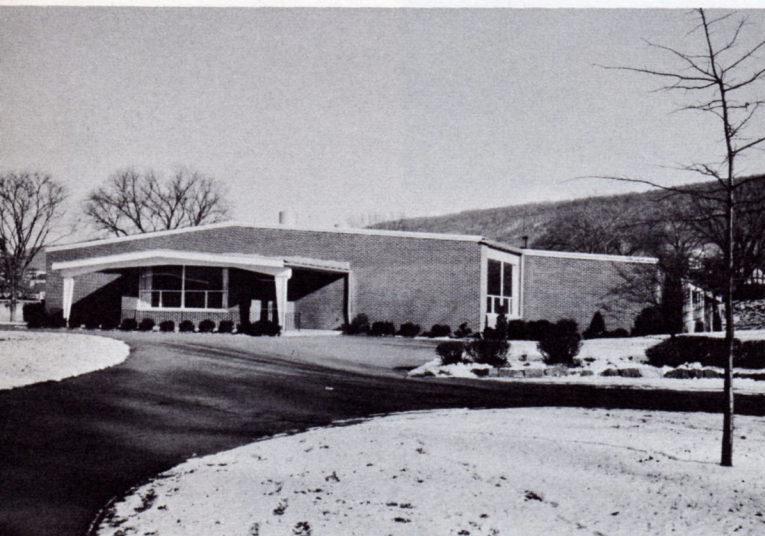


ket for good faculty people.

The improvement in the financial condition of the College during President Masters' twenty-five years is nothing short of astounding. Careful management has enabled him to balance the budget in every year except 1951 and 1954, when there were small deficits. A financial drive in 1950 brought in \$647,000, another in 1955 gained \$470,000, and in 1960 the proceeds were over a million dollars. The United Crusade of the Evangelical United Brethren Church yielded a half million dollars by 1958. As a result of these and other efforts, the report of the treasurer, Charles L. Gordon, shows the following figures for the fiscal year closing June 30, 1962: endowment, \$1,715,374, an increase of \$1,419,232 since 1938; scholarship funds, \$372,832, or \$367,936 more than in 1938; land, buildings, and equipment, \$4,357,933, which is an increase of \$2,974,958 over 1938; net worth, \$6,333,935, or \$5,296,743 more than 1938. The campus now covers more than fifty acres, compared to thirty-one acres in 1938.



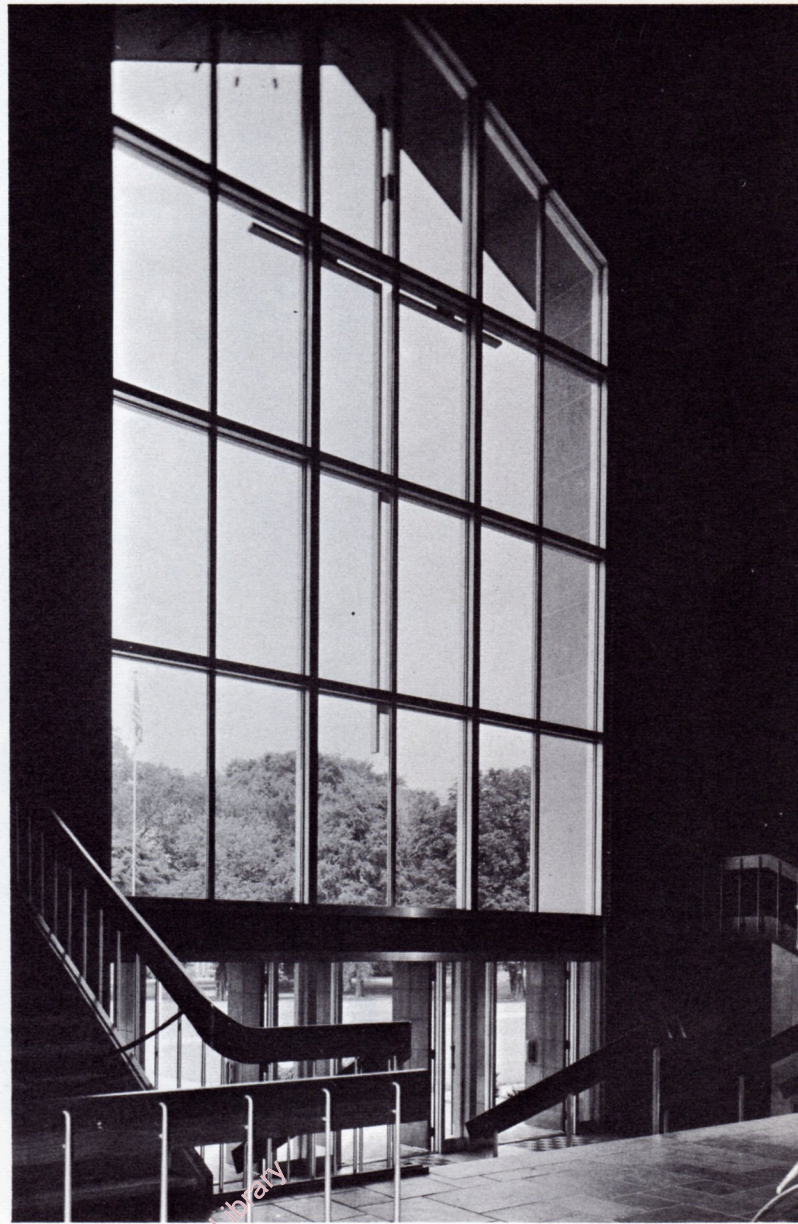
Another measure of the progress which Albright has made under President Masters is the number of buildings erected during his term of office. The old "spring house" was thoroughly renovated and dedicated as Syl-



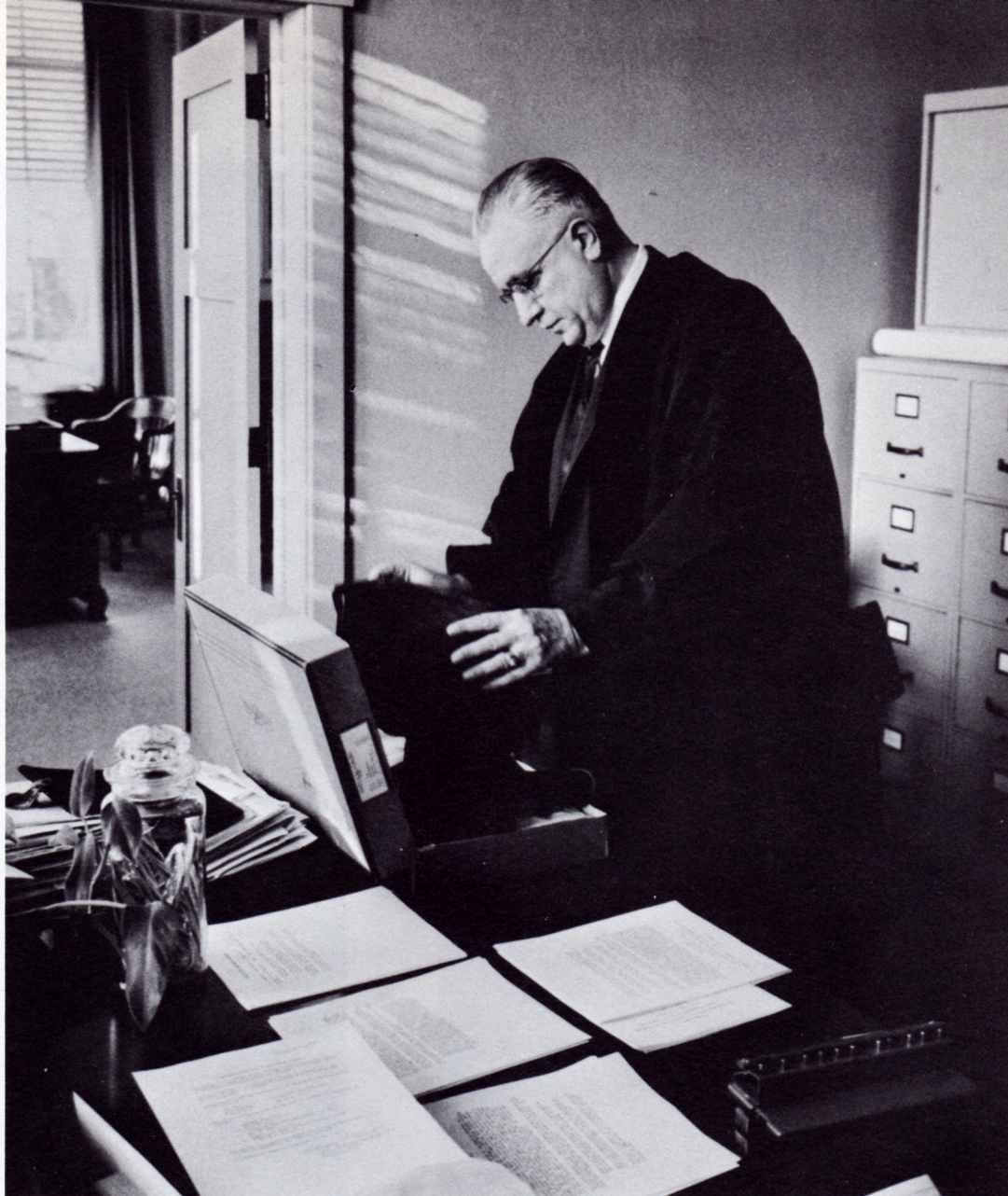
van Chapel on September 18, 1942. In 1945, the house at 1605 Palm Street was purchased to be used as a home for the president. Krause Hall was erected in 1948 as a gift from the federal government and dedicated, in 1952, to the memory of Sarah E. Krause, wife of Lewis D. Krause, a benefactor of the college. Two major buildings, a physical education building and a chapel, had long been in prospect. The first of these, a magnificent building with seats for three thousand five hundred spectators, was completed in 1952. The Merner-Pfeiffer-Klein Memorial Chapel-Auditorium was dedicated in 1960. Meanwhile, an addition to the Alumni Memorial Library had been completed in 1956.

A need for more space for the growing number of resident students required the erection of a new Food Service Building in 1959. Two new dormitories, North Hall and West Hall, were completed in 1962. The same need for dormitory space had caused the college to buy the Albright Court Apartment in 1951 and to purchase four large residences to use as fraternity houses.

At present, plans have been made for a new library and administration building. Extensive renovation of the Science Hall, the present library, and the present administration buildings are planned to follow the completion of the new library, which is now under construction.



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It is common knowledge that a college president must undertake the almost impossible task of being an expert in community and church relations, as well as in the financial and administrative work of the college itself. President Masters has done exceedingly well in this department and has taken an active part in the Daniel Boone Council of Boy Scouts, the United Fund, the Council of Social Agencies, and the Civil Service Board. He has also been active in the Guidance Institute and in Americans for the Competitive Enterprise



System; he is a director of the Berks County Trust Company and a trustee of the Penn Square Mutual Fund.

Academically, President Masters' long tenure of office at Albright has made him one of the three or four oldest college presidents in Pennsylvania. He has been prominent for years in the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities, and was its president in 1955-56. He was also president of the Foundation for Independent Colleges of Pennsylvania in 1959-60. Such





offices indicate the respect which President Masters holds among educators. This respect extends to the Evangelical United Brethren Church in which he has held many positions of prominence, including membership in all general conferences from 1942 to the present.

The respected position which President Masters holds in the community and the progress which Albright has made during his tenure of office clearly reflect his leadership ability, but this does not complete the portrait. His most striking qualities are his warm-

ness and his humanity. Faculty, students, and co-workers know President Masters as a very human, approachable person who is concerned with their problems. This genuine concern, understanding, and sense of fairness play a large part in his ability to work well with people, and, combined with his fine administrative talents, have led to his accomplishments as educator and community member. For an outstanding twenty-five years with Albright College, we pay tribute to President Harry V. Masters.

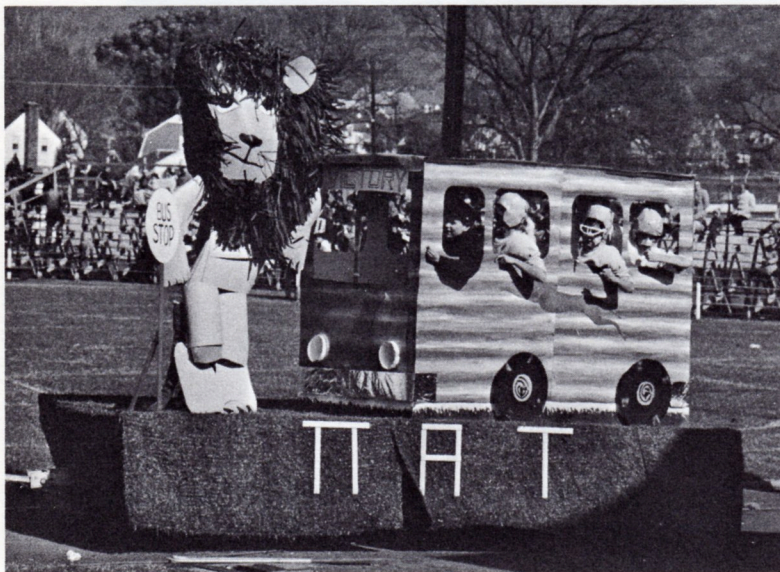
Ingenuity, cooperation, and work produced a good year for the sisters of Pi Alpha Tau.

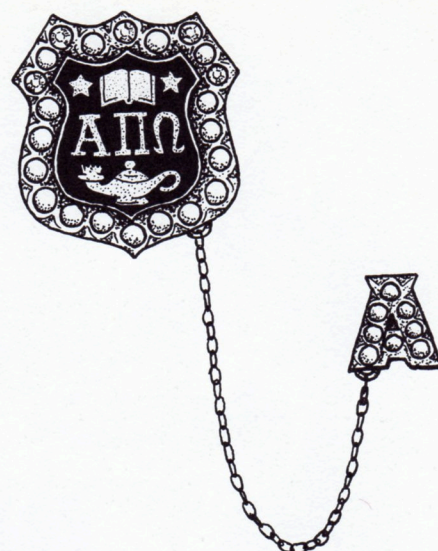
The A P O spirit revealed itself this year with the Brothers' active participation in campus life.

The year ended with a dance during Spring Weekend at the Lancaster Country Club.

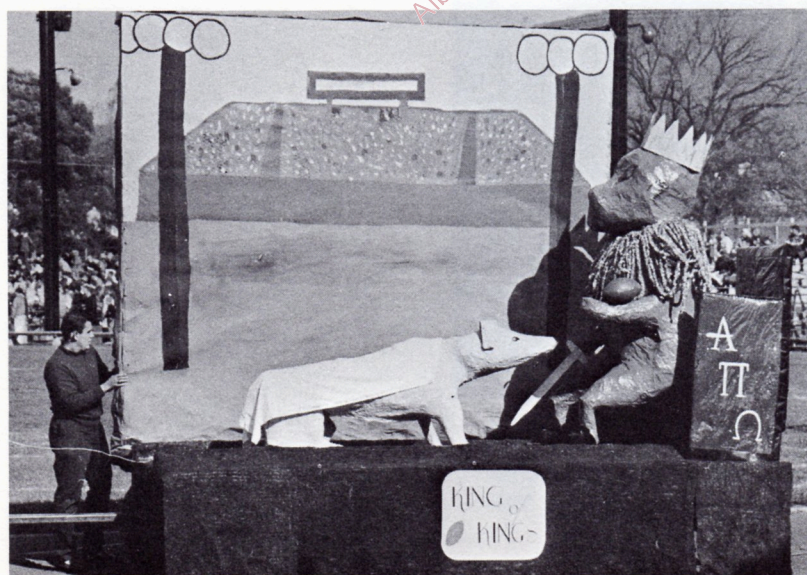

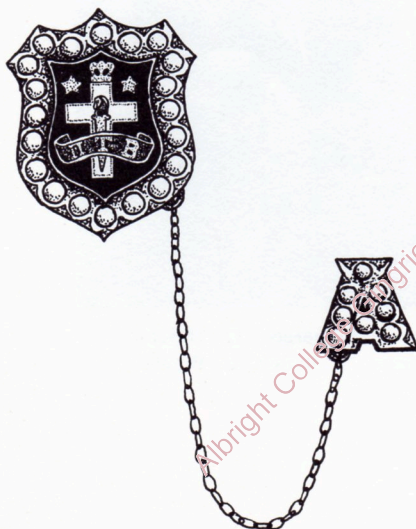

PTB men turned in creditable performances on varsity and intramural athletic teams.

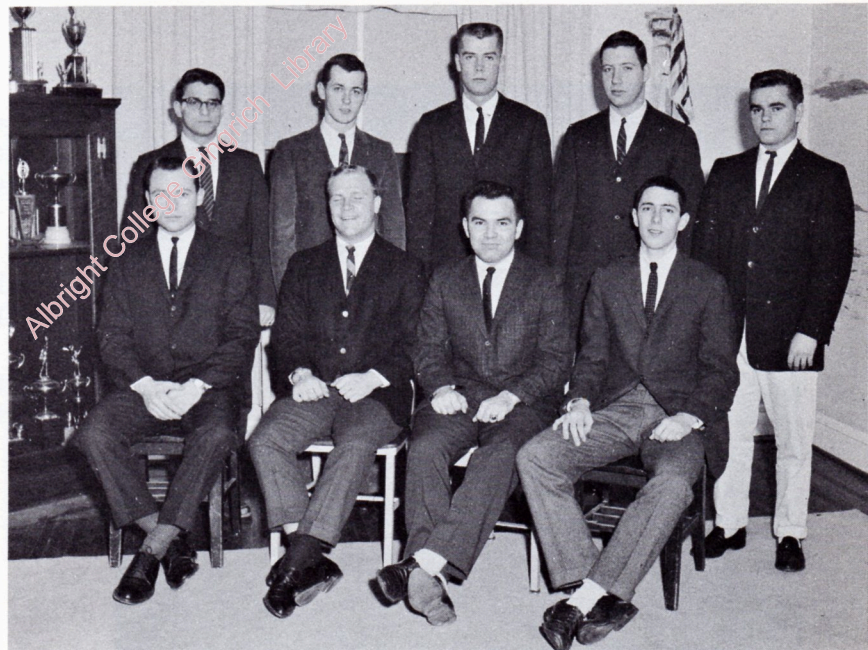
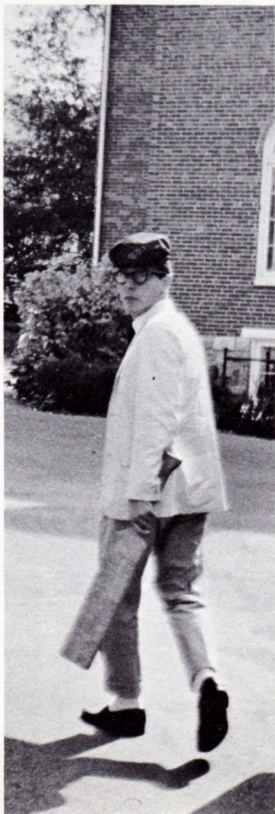

Once again the Zeta's spent the year in the middle of things. They contributed to the athletic, social and intellectual life of Albright College.

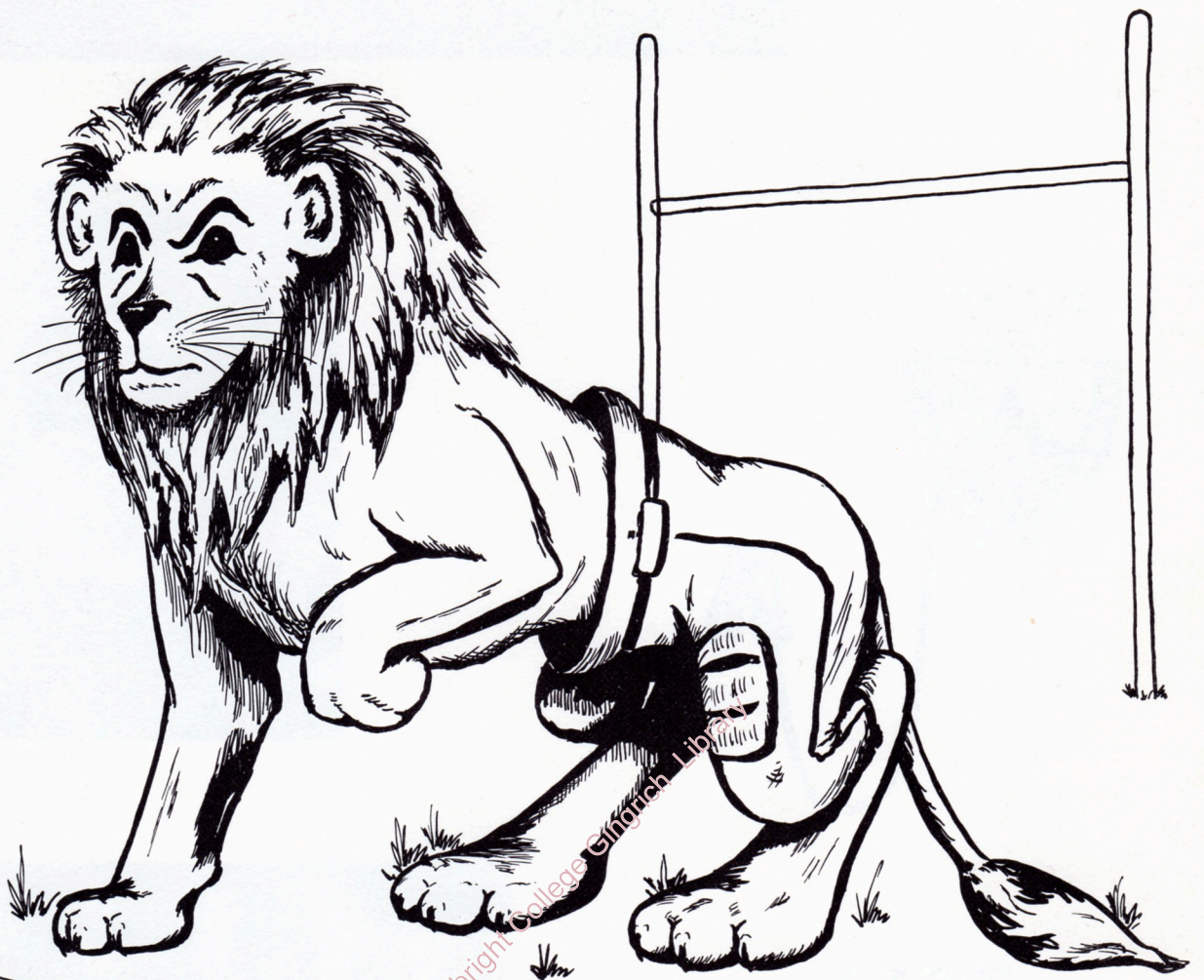
