A version of the 50's and the mooning performance (an abbreviated streak) earned the Zetas a first-place award. By popular demand, the Zetas did a encore routine.


'The Honeymoon Suite' by Bucky Gill and his troupe was awarded a second-place prize. Bucky will be remembered for his role in this travesty.

Albright Honors Students Who Excell

One-hundred and seventy two Albright College students recently were named to the college's Dean's Honor List for academic achievement during the 1976 fall-1977 January interim semesters, Dr. Robert E. McBride, vice-president for academic affairs, announced.

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Fourty-three of the students cited achieved the distinction with a 4'0 (A) cumulative average, including 6 freshman, 8 sophomores, 12 juniors, and The Dean's Honor List is all students who earn a cumulative average of 3.5 or above in the equivalent of 12 grade point hours. The normal course load for the period is four in the fall semester and one in the interim with a total average of fifteen credit hours.

The Dean's Honor List is comprised of 30 freshman, 38 sophomores, 50 juniors, and 54 seniors.

World News in Brief

In a message to Congress ... President Carter asks for aid for drought victims in the Plains and Western states. Carter's proposal includes 594- million in loans and 250-million in outright grants from various public agencies. The President says the government must lead the way in water conservation ... which he says is the only hope for immediate relief.

And agriculture secretary Bob Bergland today outlined to the Senate Agricultural Committee a major farm bill. The four-year administration program includes modest increases in crop support prices. Committee chairman Herman Talamadge questioned why ... After raising milk to 83 per cent of parity ... other major crops are held to 61 per cent of parity.

President Carter has announced the U.S. and VietNam will open talks in Paris to start working toward establishment of normal diplomatic relations. No exact date was set, but Carter said talks would begin 'without delay.' He said Hanoi suggested the breakthrough parley . . . and that there are no pre-conditions for bargaining. Carter said Hanoi made the suggestion as a follow-up to last week's negotiations with the Presidential commission on Americans missing in action. The commision reported to Carter today and received High praise for what it accomplished.

The House Committee on assassinations met privately today to hear results of the staff interview yesterday with James Earl Ray in the Tennessee prison where he is serving 99 years for the murder of Martin Luther King. Chairman Louis Stokes said afterward that the contents of the interview could not be disclosed because Ray was not under oath and further interviews are planned.

The White House announced today that President Carter has approved continuation of work on 307 land and water construction projects now under way. However, 30 other projects are under review and Carter will make a final decision in mid-April on whether the projects are continued modified or halted. Former President Ford delivered a foreign policy address in New York City today and said Russia is embarked on a massive military buildup. Ford said the buildup threatens to scuttle the chances for a meaningful arms aggreement with the communist superpower. The former President added that the coming arms limitation talks with Russia 'will be difficult.'

Career Conference

Announced

Today's uncertain economy and tight job market has caused some college students much anxiety with career-related decisions. If you are such a person the career Conference on Tuesday evening, March 29, might provide some assistance.

The Counseling Center in cooperation with Lehigh Valley Alumni Association has invited approximately fourteen alumni from a variety of fields to participate in informal, small group discussions about their occupations and careers. Specifically, these people will be prepared to discuss: (1) the relationship between their occupation and college experience ingeneral, and major field in particular, (2) the employment outlook in their field as well as related occupations in their major field of study, and (3) their career pattern, how their first job was attained, occupational changes. future expectations in their occupational field, etc.

The conference begins at 6:30 p.m. in South Lounge of the Campus Center. Much preparation has gone into this program for all students at Albright, and we hope you will take advantage of this worthwhile program. Because of the informal nature of the conference you will not be required to commit a specific amount of time although we encourage you to take full advantage of any resource person you feel might be helpful to you . Refreshments will be served. Recent incidences on campus have warranted an investigation of dorm security and lock systems. Although Albright is situated in the residential section of Reading, we do have outbursts of city problems, namely Peeping Toms, vandalism, and harassing phone calls. Security problems have been brought to the Union's attention, and we would like to suggest possible solutions to the problem. All suggestions have been fully discussed with Dean Tilden and have the support of his office.

The card key system presently in use is an electric system and therefore sensitive. Locks in East and Crowell are easily popped open and broken, offering little security to the girls. An alternate, more effective and articient system is proposed as follows. Each girl would be issued two keys, one for her room and another for the outside breezeway. All doors, including side doors, would be locked from 12pm to 6 am. An alarm system could be attached to the side doors. This system would then be triggered by any attempted above after 12 pm and before 6 am. In order that this policy would not be considered discriminatory, we encourage that some security measure be installed on male dormitories.

The Union would also like to see a girl guy desk receptionist team during the late hours of 9 pm to 3 am. All men are encouraged to apply for these positions.

The Union welomes any elements suggestions concerning dorm security. Please address all suggestions to Sox 110.

NETWORK: 'needs work'

Network, one of the great expectations of the year was, in this viewer's opinion, a diaster.

The plot evolved around an imaginary television station, UBS, and the people that make it work.

This was Hollywood's idea of letting the people sneak a peak at what really goes on 'behind the scenes' of a large TV corporation. Frankly, it ended up as an insult to the viewers intelligence—how could anyone believe that people act that way? Exaggeration does tend to get one's point across, but when overdone becomes farcical. Cliches were predominant throughout Network and even those most unfamiliar with the field of communications would have no trouble understanding it.

More and more, it seems Hollywood is tailoring its films to the intellectually feeble! Here's one you can even take the five-year old to see. The only semi-shocking scene is the final one in which a very predicatable shooting sequence meant to leave a profound effect on the viewer.

Not to be accused of posthumorus praise, I considered Peter Finch to be quite convincing as a crazy but profound philosopher. William Holden and Faye Dunaway were ridiculous in an inaffectionate love affair that had no basis for occuring—especially after she steals his job.) Faye flits about in (what can be described as) those 'damn silky blouses' while spewing instructions a mile a minute. The question which naturally arises is, 'Does anybody behave like this?' The answer is 'No'!

The chief adjectives which keep coming to mind with this movie are 'over-exaggerated' and 'simplistic'; it is for this reason that Network doesn't work.

OVERSEAS ADVENTURE.

Hundreds of U.S. students will find jobs in France, Ireland and Great Britain this summer through the Work in Europe program sponsored by the Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE). For the past eight years, this popular program has provided students with the direct experience of living and working in another country and, at the same time, helped them reduce the cost of their trip abroad. The program virtually eliminates the red tape that students faced in the past when they wanted to work abroad.

Participants must find their own jobs but will have the help of cooperating student travel organizations in each country. In France and Ireland they may work during the summer; in Great Britain they may work at any time of the year for up to six months. The jobs are usually unskilled - in factories, department stores, hotels, etc. Salaries are low but students generally earn enough to pay for room and boand while they work. A typical job would be that, of chambermaid in a hotel in London's West End. But last summer one enterprising student found work in Paris as a wine steward in a restaurant on the Champs-Elysees!

To qualify for CIEE's program, students must be between the ages of 18 and 30 and must be able to prove their student status. To work in France, they must also be able to speak and understand French.

ATTORNEY'S ADDRESS SEMINAR

Three local attorneys addressed the topic of 'wills, probate, marital rights, and joint ownership' at the second of a four-part Women's Finance Seminar sponsored by the Albright College development office Wednesday, March 23.

Speaking before the more than 150 registrants in the college's Campus Center Theater at 10:30 am were Attorneys Donald K. Bobb of Balmer, Mogel, Speidel and Roland; D. Frederick Muth from Rhoda, Stoudt, and Bradley; and Sidney D. Kline, Jr.; of Stevens and Lee.

The seminar is designed primarily to aid women who assume the management and disposition of newly acquired financial resources and estate holdings. The program open by invitation, anjoyed a gratifying response from men and women registrants. A partner and officer of Stevens and Lee, Mr Kline is a graduate of Dickinson College, and he received the bachelor of law degree with honors from Dickinson School of Law. A former council member of the Real Property and Probate Division of the Pennsylvania Bar Association, he was last year a Fellow of the American College of Probate Counsel. Board member and past president of the United Way of Berks County, Mr. Kline is a director and vice president of the Reading Center City Development Fund.

Mr. Bobb, a graduate of Layaffette College and the University of Pennsylvania Law School, is a partner in the firm of Balmer, Mogel, Speidel and Roland. As an instructor for the Society of Chartered Life Underwriters of Berks County, he has taught also at the Berks Campus of Pennsylvania State University. He is a member of the American Bar association Section of Real Estate, Probate and Trust Law, and he is admitted to practice in the United States Tax Court.

A graduate of Haverford College and the University of Pennsylvania School of Law, Mr. Muth is a partner in the law offices of Rhoda, Stoudt and Bradley. He is a member of the Real Property, Probate and Trust Law Sections of the American and Pennsylvania Bar Associations, and last year was elected

Fellow of the American College of Probate Counsel. A past president of the board of directors of Family Guidance Center, Mr. Muth is a member of that group's HELP advisory committee and of the legislative committee of the Berks County Mental Health Association.

However, we feel that the show could have been improved in a couple of ways. The major idea is that faculty should have performed. Why can't you just picture some of the acts



BASKETBALL UPDATE

Senior forward and co-captain Dan Jones has been named to the 1976-77 Middle Atlantic Conference Northern Section All-Star team. The 6-3, 180 pound leaper of Coatesville Area HS finished ninth on the all-time Albright College scoring list with 1334 points. This past season Jones was fourth among the top Albright scorers with 359 points for a 12.38 ppg average.

Also garnering honors for the Lions were sophomore forward Paul Deal and

freshman gaurd Bill Carey, Both players were named to the MAC North Division second team. Deal hit for 490 points and 16.90 average this season for the Lions. Carey led all Lion scorers with 499 points and a 17.21 average. Both Deal and Carey were each named once this season to the ECAC Weekly Division III All-Star team. Deal had the highest individual scoring effort in a single game with 39 points against Muhlenberg, while Carey's single game high was 36 against Upsala.
