Lions Trounce Mules In Bowl; Pollock Stars

Albright scored twice on Muhlenberg miscues in last Saturday's Pretzel Bowl Game, to set the Mules back with a 12-7 victory.

In winning, the Lions proved that whatever else they negotiate this fall, they certainly have the number of the boys from Allentown. This was the fifth straight time the Lions have mauled the Mules. Albright now has a season record of 1-1 while Muhlenberg stands 0-2.

Pollock Stars

Sophomore Tom Pollock appeared to spark plug the Albright machine. Tom's statistics of the game included two pass interceptions, a recovered fumble, and a TD. For his performance Pollock received the Outstanding Player award from the Rajah Shrine Temple of Reading. Paul Truran, Muhlenberg center, also carried home a trophy. Truran launched a savage attack against the Lion backfield.

In the first quarter Newman's fumble, recovered by Pollock, on the Mules 14, gave the Lions an invitation for a tally. Pollock also set up the next TD by intercepting a pass from Muhlenberg's Bill Keeny. Willy Smith did the actual scoring on a spectacular 35-yard end run.

Gamble Backfires

In the first quarter the Lions gambled on a fourth down on their own 49. Their failure to make it put the Mules in favorable scoring position. It took them just 13 plays to cover the 49 yards to pay dirt.

There was only one period of crisis in the 3rd round, making the outcome of the game uncertain. The Lions relinquished the pigskin midway, the Mules grabbed the opportunity and added 21 yards to their already gained 74 for a total of 95 yards from scrimmage, compared to Albright's 213.

The fourth quarter threat came when the Mules strode to the Albright 38. The Lions took over on their own 35 and controlled the ball for 19 straight plays. The clock ran out leaving the Lions victorious...

Roaring Lions Face Bullets Tomorrow at Gettysburg

Red and White Seeks 2nd Win

On Saturday, October 9, Coach Eddie Gullian's Albright Lions, fresh from the 12-7 victory over Muhlenberg, journey to Gettysburg to meet John Yovicin's Bullets in a contest that will be of great importance to both teams. The Bullets, who were beaten last Saturday, 29-0, by the Bucknell Bisons, also on Albright's schedule, will have to win this game in order to have a successful season. The Lions figure that a victory will be all they need to begin a successful campaign also.

Leading the Bullet's brigade of talent will be Frank Gagliardi, a junior quarterback and a member of the Little All-American team last season. Senior Bob Eppelman, who gained 320 yards in 79 carries last year, is the starting fullback. Junior Ernie Paliszewski, Johnstown, Pa. speedster, heads the list of returning halfbacks along with veteran Jim McGee. At the end slots are 6'3" Dick Lewandowski and 5'11" Fred Alleva along with Tommy Kostelac, who was out last season with a leg injury, and Dick Hammett. Filling in the tackle positions are 6'3", 210 pound Bob Finnegan, 220 pound Buck Beaver, and 190 pound Frank Eckert. Carl Beck, likely all state candidate along with veterans Bill Weitzel and Barry Attig are the leading guards. Sheldon Yingst, last year's starting center is back along with Bob Hoffman.

Lions Hopeful

The Red and White backfield quartet of Tom Pollock, Roy Dragon, Willy Smith, and Chris Wenger will be assigned the task of scoring against the Bullets well-balanced line. All four turned in a fine game against Muhlenberg last week. Starting in the Lion forward wall will be Ed McNeill, Bob Krize, Jack Huntzinger, Fred Hess, Wally Goss, Bob Sulyma, and Frank Goldstein.

Last year the Bullets had an 8-1 record, their only loss coming at the hands of Delaware. They have beaten Albright eight times out of their fourteen meetings, four games ending in ties. Last year Gettysburg was victorious 27-0, but this year the Lions are hoping to bounce back into the win column.
