# Red and White Seeks 2nd Win

On Saturday, October 9, Coach Eddie Gulian's Albright Lions, fresh from the 12-7 victory over Muhlen-From the 12-4 victory over Muniten-berg, journey to Gettysburg to meet John Yovicsin's Bullets in a contest that will be of great importance to both teams. The Bullets, who were beaten last Saturday, 29-0, by the Bucknell Bisons, also on Albright's schedule, will have to win this game in order to have a successful season. in order to have a successful season. The Lions figure that a victory will be all they need to begin a successful campaign also

Leading the Bullet's brigade of lent will be Frank Gagliardi, a junior quarterback and a member of the Little All-American team last season. Senior Bob Eppleman, who gained 320 yards in 79 carries who gained 320 yards in 79 carries last year, is the starting fullback. Junior Ernie Paliszewski, Johns-town, Pa. speedster, heads the list of returning halfbacks along with veteran Jim McGee. At the end slots are 6'3" Dick Lewandowske and 5'11" Fred Alleva along with Tommy Kostelac, who was out last season with a leg injury, and Dick Hammett. Filling in the tackle posi-tions are 6'3". 210 pound Bob Finnetions are 6'3", 210 pound Bob Finne-gan, 220 pound Buck Beaver, and 190 pound Frank Eckert. Carl Beck, likely all state candidate along with veterans Bill Weitzel and Barry At-tig are the leading guards. Sheldon Yingst, last year's starting center is back along with Bob Hoffman.
