

Commission on the future launches kick-off meeting of forces

With the new century here, the Albright Board of Trustees established a program to guide the College's future for the next twenty years so that Albright can be considered a world class institution.

The Commission on the Future is the name of the endeavor and its purpose is to do just that – ensure advancement within the college to make Albright the best it can possibly be.

The idea became reality last fall and the Board of Trustees appointed John Broadbent Jr. as cochairman. A part-time position was then created for the sole purpose of being director of the Commission on the Future. Gretchen Keith was hired for this position. The program was modeled after Wharburg College in Iowa.

The first phase occurred in early fall. Over seven hundred invitations were sent to external constituencies, alumni, faculty, staff, and students, asking them to become members of the commission. Of

those invited, 360 people accepted and are now part of one of the ten specific task forces that make up the commission as a whole.

According to Keith, The Board of Directors divided all aspects of the College into ten categories, and consequently ten specific task forces were created.

Each task force consists of 20 to 50 members who have diverse interests. About 95 % of those invited were selected for a certain task force based upon their personal interests. Each task force has at least two students, one faculty representative, and representatives from the administration.

Keith explains that the Commission has already begun its progress toward bettering Albright

College. The big kickoff event was held on January 15, 2000. Although some were unable to attend, about 250 of the original 360 members were in attendance.

The day began with a general assembly in the Meridian Theatre. The assembly consisted of President Zimon's Cabinet which spoke about the current state of Albright College.

In addition, several speeches were made from various spokespersons with regard to the subjects of the task forces.

Speaking were: Sally Stetler, from athletics; Paul Gazzerro, on finance; Dr. Greene, on academics; Dr. Daniels, on student life; Dr. Kelsey on Spirituality; Dr.

Kirkwood on Advancement; and Dr. Greg Eichorn on admissions.

Following the assembly, all went to a luncheon where Dr. Zimon issued his charge. The afternoon was spent in individual task force meetings and the entire Commission reconvened for a celebration.

Although all task forces are working toward the same goal – a perfect Albright – each has its own area.

The ten areas are: Academic Programs; Admissions; Retention; Financial Aid; Alumni Programs; Arts & Culture; Athletics, Recreation and Wellness; Facilities and Financial Management; Faith, Values and Spiritual Development; Information Technology; Computing and Library Services; Marketing and College/Community Relations; and Student Life.

The purpose of each task force is to brainstorm ideas relating to how they feel Albright should look in 20 – 25 years. They will do this in 4 to 5 meetings, which will take place between January and June.

January 15th was the first

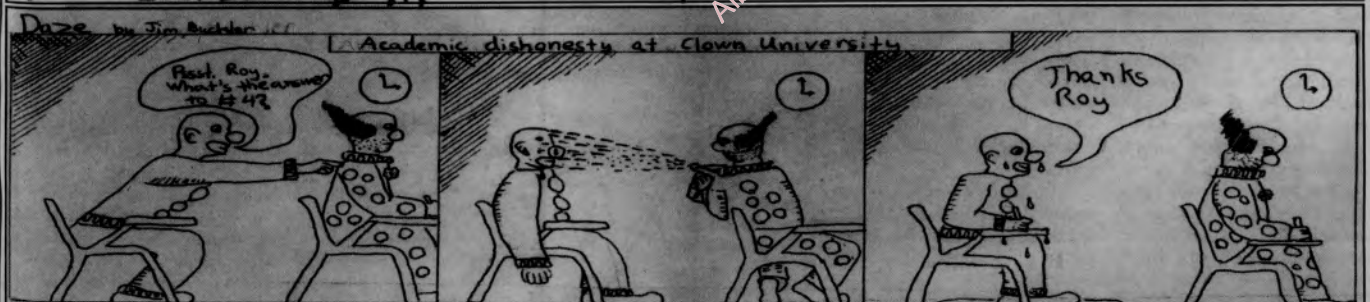
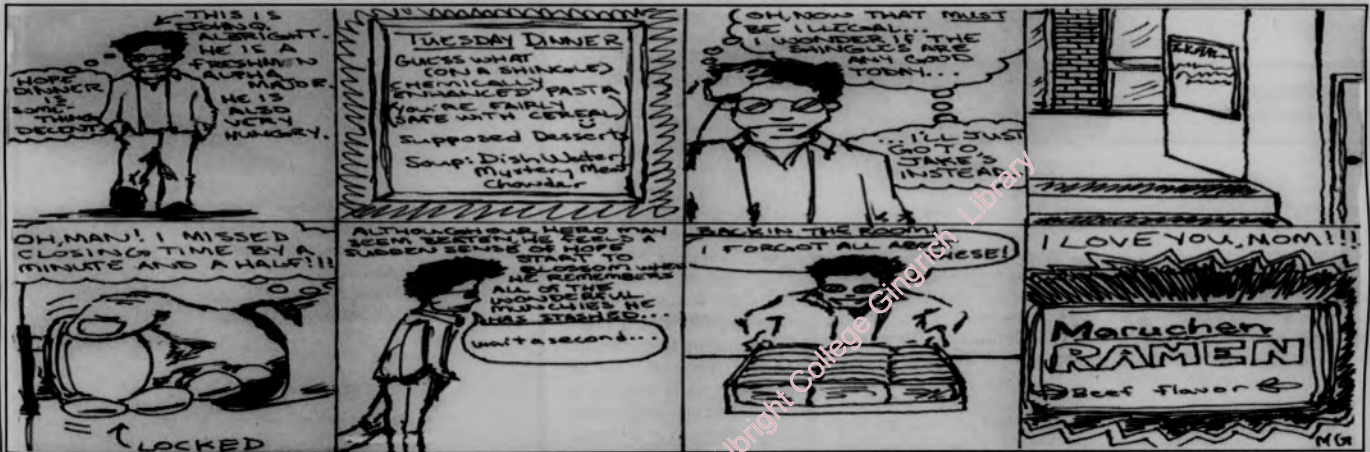
meeting date for all task forces and each force has a second meeting already planned. Some task forces have every meeting already on the calendar.

Once the brainstorming is complete, each task force will write a report and make recommendations for improvement. These recommendations will go to the faculty and staff and then to the Board of Trustees by October. Students and faculty may hear of the ideas in September. Once the Board is aware of the Commission's concerns, a Strategic Plan will be written.

The Commission is made up of people from 19 different states. Of the 360 members, 224 are Albright alumni and many of the others are just people who have an interest in Albright.

"I think this is an excellent way to involve as many people with interest in Albright College to be involved with planning. It allows for participation at every level," said Keith.

In addition, she believes the "This has been an overwhelmingly positive experience for the college."

David Ireland's exhibit: Everyday Art consists of a wide array of thought provoking pieces. Ireland's work places focus on objects that are not normally used for aesthetic purposes. His use of commonplace objects results in an extraordinary feast of images that leave the onlooker questioning the purpose of Ireland's work.

Ireland discourages the intellectual approach to viewing art, but in doing so he raises questions that are impossible to ignore. "Marcel B." consists of painted sardine cans miscellaneous strewn across the floor and on top of a make shift table. I was drawn to the simplicity of the piece. I hesitate to describe its visual elements as an art piece, because I think it would defeat Ireland's intent. For me "Marcel B." is intriguing because it is an odd combination of ordinary objects and a seemingly lacksadaisical attempt to make them aesthetically pleasing (by slapping a coat of paint on them).

"Tray of Dumb Balls" struck me

as boring, however I liked the methodic process that was used to form the balls. It would seem that Ireland also relished this meditative quality, and attempted to express its value by presenting the balls on his mother's silver tray.

I find this type of minimalist art intriguing, because the only limitations it seems to have is the avoidance of limitations. It leaves me, however, with the desire to look at the traditional types of art that are created with the idea of being visually stimulating (if not pleasing). The ideas behind Ireland's work are intellectually interesting to me, but usually when I look at art I want it to be visually stimulating. The strongest value in Ireland's approach to art is the emphasis that it places on creating art simply for the idea of creating it. This notion of art for art's sake encourages artists to create works that are personally enjoyable to construct and/or are pleasing to the artist's eye.

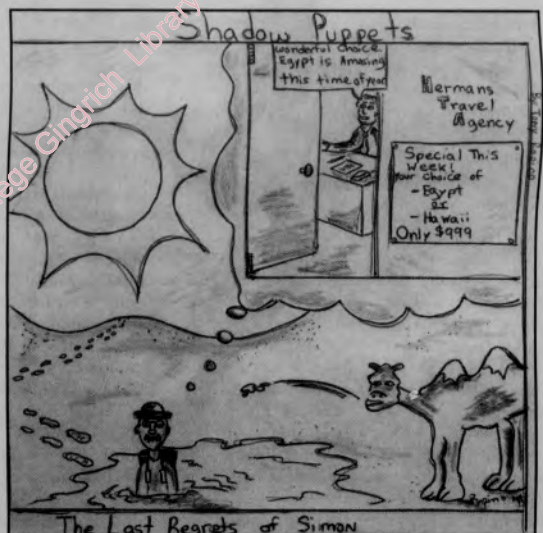

Swavely soars into Albright record books as Lions hoopsters end season

At the turn of the century, Albright possessed a team that will always be remembered with pride. A team that on all occasions had the interest of the game and the school at heart. They did their utmost to bring credit and glory to the Albright name.

It was a team that would beam with pride at the accomplishments of head coach Ken Tyler and his Lions today.

This includes the achievements of senior guard Shawn Swavely, who scored his 2,000th career point last Tuesday night at the Bollman Center. Establishing a new school record in the process, Swavely scored a game-high 34 points to lead Albright in a 101-48 victory over Stevens Tech.

Swavely entered the game with 1,966 points, which placed him fourth on the school's all-time scoring list, surpassing Paul Mellini (1974). Swavely became the third player in school history to surpass the 2,000 point mark.

This tremendous feat could not have been reached without the thirteen remaining Lions who helped to bring honor and respect back to the hardwoods of the Bollman Center. Anchored by the two other

senior captains, James Drewry and Kai Dawes, they include Matt Clair, Colin Donohoe, Brandon Ferns, Jimmy Fox, Howard Payton, Erick Hardwick, Mark Moritz, Tim Redding, Terrence Skyrn, and Phil White.

Despite their accomplishments, the road to success has not been without its bumps. The Lions were brought to their knees several times during the season, including their fall to

Widener University in a MAC Commonwealth League contest on February 3rd and their defeat to Lebanon Valley College this past Tuesday, which dethroned the Lions from their first place position in the Middle Atlantic Conference Commonwealth Division.

Even with those bumps, the Lions have proved themselves to be a perennial power in the Middle Atlantic Conference and have given many teams in the Commonwealth Division a run for their money. Alvernia, Juniata, Franklin & Marshall, Moravian, Messiah, and Allentown have been among the teams the Lions have defeated this season. Many

of the match-ups have been extremely close, as illustrated by the 103-100 overtime win the Lions posted against Elizabethtown at the beginning of the

season. After the triumph, senior guard Shawn Swavely said "It was a close game the whole way. Elizabethtown is a good team and they kept making big plays at both end. They were a relentless, hardworking team

that never gave up and kept coming at us."

James Drewry, also a senior guard, believes matchups against teams like Elizabethtown and Steven Tech are the ticket to gaining respect in the conference. "We have showed leadership and experience and we have learned how to win as a team. We wanted to send the message to the MAC that this team is for real."

The message has been received. The Lions have made history more than once this season and have brought respect back to the Albright College name.

As Lions fans and supporters, we should only hope that history continues to repeat itself.



Young Lady Lions end rebuilding season and prepare for next year

Saying farewell to some old faces and finding places for the future, the Albright womens basketball team finished with a 8-15 record this season.

The team's record, in no way, expresses their hard work and dedication.

Our team was made up of a bunch of hard workers," said head coach Anne Bonner. Of course, no coach likes to see their team win just 8 games in a season, but she does express pride in the way the team came back from injuries and adversity they faced throughout this season.

"We were young in the post and experienced at the guard positions. That makes for a tough mix," said Bonner. The team started out with

an 0-5 start this season, but battled back to a 6-7 record, before skidding toward the end of the season.

The team was lead by senior co-captains Rachael Connolly and Dawn Iancale. Connolly averaged 19.7 PPG, 5.4 RPG, and 2.8 APG. While Iancale averaged 6.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists.

Coach Bonner stated "My captains lead by example on and off the court.

They will both graduate this spring and will be key losses to next year's roster. They both have been valuable members of the team for years and they leave a lot of memories behind. Their

contributions to the program will not be forgotten."

Injuries plagued the team all season this year. The key loss was a season ending torn ACL for freshman starter Anne Dougherty. Dougherty was averaging 11.7 point and 5.5 rebounds when she went down with her injury.

Amy Buzinski, another freshman contributor, was hurt for a portion of the season as well. She averaged 10.0 PPG and 5.5 RPG.

Tami Correll played the entire season with what is believed to be stress fractures in her legs. This kept her from playing the number of minutes that she was expected to play at the beginning of the season.

Amanda Roncick filled in nicely for the teams injured players, and ended up being coach Bonner's most pleasant surprise. Hanincik was not expected to start, but ended up starting a majority of the teams games.

The future looks bright for the lady lions. Dougherty is expected to heal completely from her torn ACL and will be ready to start the 2000-2001 season.

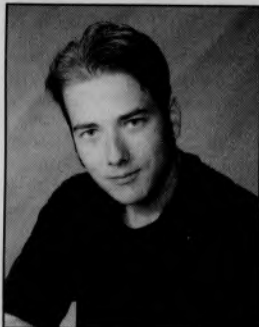

Which Albright professor influenced you the most?

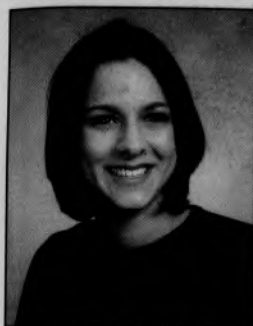

Andy Ker. It might sound corny, but he is the best thing to happen to me in a long time.

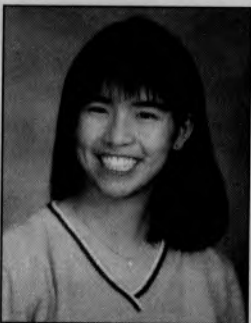
How do you think that you have changed in the past four years?

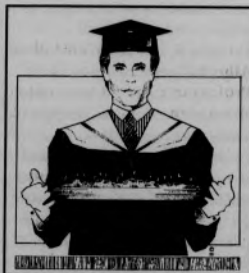

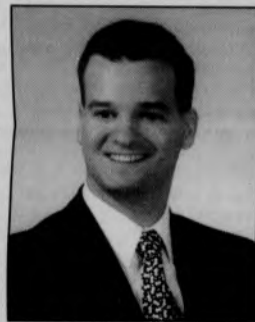

The injury to Matt Matlack's ankle may have been detrimental to the season record for the men's tennis team, but not to the players' spirit and determination.

Going into the season, the players and head coach, Dale Yoder, held high expectations of winning the MAC Team Championships, as they did two years ago. The first few matches went well, only losing to King's College 3-4. Co-captains, John Fotopoulos and Matt Matlack, made up the first doubles team, and played first and third singles, respectively.

The turning point came in a match versus Messiah. Matlack had won the first set and was down in the second when he overturned his left ankle, tearing ligaments. He, resultantly, forfeited the match, but Albright pulled out a 5-2 victory.

Yoder comments, "Matt's injury forced us to rearrange the lineup entirely. It was a big loss in this way because seven positions were affected by the loss of one man. The third, fourth, fifth, and sixth positions were influenced because everyone had to move up from number three down. Then we had to switch around the doubles teams."

From that point in the season on, the team suffered a few close losses. Yoder says, "It was not the same at all. There were a number of losses

that were close, that we would have won with Matt in the lineup."

They ended their season with an 8-6 record and a second place finish in the Commonwealth Division of the MAC. They made their way into the team playoffs as one of the top four teams, but fell to King's College 1-6.

Yoder adds, "Though I may be somewhat disappointed with the final results of the season, I am not at all disappointed in the players. From the first player on the ladder to the last, everyone gave their best. They showed great team spirit and support for each other. There was total cooperation."

"The players who normally did not get much playing time gained much experience. That experience will help us a lot next year. It also gave freshmen, Matt Califano, Rich Carrione, and Ryan Kurtz the chance to show what they can do out there on the court. We have dedicated guys, and the juniors from this year will come back even stronger. I really think that we can win the championship next year."

To end the season, six members of the team traveled to Elizabethtown College to participate in the MAC Individual Championships. John Fotopoulos led the way as he earned a spot in the semifinals match of singles play.

In getting there, Fotopoulos defeated Joe Panchenko of FDU-Madison in two sets following a first round bye as the second seed of the tournament. He went on to gain a 6-

3, 6-2 victory over King's College's Anthony Scala in the quarterfinals. Fotopoulos faced a tough opponent in the semifinals, where he lost a two-set match to the third seed, Chris Hileman, from Lebanon Valley.

Yoder comments, "It was an accomplishment for him to get to the semifinals. Only four players get there. John beat Chris during the regular season, but he didn't play very well in the semifinal match. Chris did; that made the difference. Everyone thought that John had a real chance to win the whole thing."

Keene Turner, the second singles player during the regular season, emerged as a victor in the first round. He defeated FDU-Madison's Mike Gunther, 6-4, 6-3. Turner fell in the second round, losing in two sets to Kevin Mungal from Drew.

"There has been constant improvement in Keene's game. He only gets better as he plays the better players and moves up higher in the rankings," responds Yoder.

The doubles teams who competed were two seniors, German Gomez and Keith Stankiewicz, and two freshmen, Califano and Carrione.

Gomez and Stankiewicz suffered a second round loss to Moravian's Dan Gorman and Jason Birli after a first round bye.

Califano and Carrione endured a first round marathon match with the hosting Elizabethtown's Kevin Holton and Brandon Yorte. They eventually lost in the third set duel by a score of 5-7, 6-4, 5-7.
