### Program Prepared For Group of Campers

More than 40 young people will travel to Camp Fernbrook tomorrow for the annual Fall Y Retreat. A program of recreation, worship and fellowship planned around the general theme, "How God Guides," has been prepared for the group.

Leaving the parking lot at 1:00 p. m., the campers will arrive at the camp site at 2:30 p. m. After looking around and getting settled, the first seminar will begin at 3:30 p. m. Rev. Homer L. Trickett, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Reading and speaker for the retreat, will use the topic, "One Increasing Purpose," for the first seminar. A discussion period will follow the meditation. Time will be given for recreation at 4:45 p. m. before supper at 6:00 p. m.

"Living Presence—Guides Us," is the title of the second seminar at 7:00 p. m., followed by an outdoor campfire at which time there will be group singing, entertainment and roasting of marshmallows and hotdogs.

Sunday will start with breakfast at 8:30 p. m. Everyone will then hike up Hopewell Mountain where Rev. Eugene Barth will conduct a short meditation. Dinner will be served at 12 noon. A communion service conducted by Rev. Barth will close the Fall Retreat.

Irene Hawthorne, well-known dancer and choreographer, will be featured at the first cultural program of the season in chapel next Thursday morning, October 22.

The Lionesses battled to a 1-1 tie with Kutztown, deadlocked Cedar Crest, 0-0 and then gave in to Moravian, 1-0. Elissa Toepferwein scored the goal for Albright.

## Bullets Trounce Albright Gridders In Third Setback

The Gettysburg Bullets, paced by sophomore, Frank Gagliardi, and veteran back, Joe Ujbai, handed the Albright Lions their third setback in four starts. Ujbai, the leading Gettysburg ground-gainer, averaged 14.4 yards per carry, as he personally accounted for 216 yards in the quick-opening, Bullet ground attack. Gagliardi, the sparkling sophomore quarterback, scored one touchdown himself, and passed for two others.

Gettysburg scored after ten minutes of the first period. Their opening drive stopped with a fumble on the Albright six-yard line. But the Bullets bounced back to score on a pass from Gagliardi to Eppleman. Again in the second quarter, the visitors marched deep into Albright territory, and Gagliardi raced 15 yards around right end for Gettysburg's second tally of the evening.

Albright came to life when Ujbai's kick went out on the Albright 35. Two passes, one from Sudol to Krize for 13 yards, and another from Dragon to Sudol highlighted a drive that took the Lions to the Gettysburg 32, but the threat ended with an intercepted Albright pass. The Lions got their best scoring opportunity in the final quarter, when Mackler recovered a bad pass from center on the Gettysburg 23. Sudol then went around end to the Bullet 12. Albright then lost eight yards, and a completed pass from Del Rocco to McNeill on the fourth down, failed to make the needed first down, and the Bullets again took over.

On the next play, Ujbai raced 89 yards for the third Bullet tally and then added the extra point. Later, Frank Gagliardi passed to end Fred Allewa for the final score.

The Lions are idle until they meet Franklin and Marshall, in the Homecoming game on Oct. 24.

## Shirk Sets Track Record At Philly

Sophomore Bill Shirk shattered the Haverford College course record Tuesday as his Albright College cross-country mates were bowing to Haverford, 20-43. Shirk's clocking over the four-mile course was 19:50.

The previous standard was set by Joe Stein, of St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, who registered a 19:53 timing in 1949. Shirk's clockmark is the best in the course's 70-year history.

Haverford, in recording the easy triumph, scored second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth places in tallying its 20 points. The Lions' Mahlon Frankhauser was ninth; David Kushner, tenth; John Pfaltz, 11th, and James Ruckstahl, 12th.

Coach Gene Shirk's team now has a record of one-and-one. The Lions defeated Gettysburg, 21-40, last Saturday as Shirk came in first. Tuesday's results:
