Two-day competition for the Middle Atlantic States Conference Track and Field Championships will be held this weekend at Lafayette College. Today, the qualifying heats will be held, while tomorrow the semi-finals and finals will be held in all events. Albright will be looking forward to a good showing in view of their excellent record thus far this year. The Lions have won six dual meets and placed second in two triangular contests.

## Greenwald Returns

The Shirkwald will depend on their balanced running events and the field events of the discus, javelin, and shot put to spearhead their hopes. Ken Greenwald, returned to the team after an injury suffered in the Penn Relays, will be entered in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes, while Don Gottshall will test the competition in the quarter, half, and one-mile runs. Paul Gehris will also compete in the quarter-mile.

## Frosh Mile

In the distance events, Bill Shirk will compete in the mile and two-mile races, and Rudy Becker will join him in the one-mile run; Becker also runs the half-mile. Freshmen George Mack and Dick Thrasher are entered in the Frosh Mile, and it is expected that with the fine showing thus far this season of Mack in the two-mile run that Albright will be strong in this event.

## Huntzinger Sets Record

Huntzinger, who has broken his own Albright record in the discus several times this season, last week set a new field record at Bucknell University in a triangular meet.
