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Security Officer Becomes Police Officer, More Police to Follow

■ Albright Security sends Michael Mulholland to the Reading Police Academy. The goal is to protect the campus from outside intruders.

Sergeant Michael
Mulholland is more than just
a cop without a gun. In fact,
he marks the first time in
Albright history that an actual
police officer is on staff with
campus safety and security.

Last November, Mulholland completed six months of police training at the Reading Police Academy. He has twenty years of experience at state and county correctional facilities, and he has worked as campus security for three years. On campus, Mulholland is the only officer who has the power to detain and arrest individuals who cause problems.

Robert F. Gerken, Director of Safety and Security, said that employing Mulholland as a police officer on campus is not a result of an inability to control students, but a precaution against problems from the city that spill over onto our campus.

"It's a better way to protect our Albright campus community," he said.

Although Sgt. Mulholland is the only certified police officer on campus now, for the past year and a half all security officers have been carrying batons, handcuffs, and pepper spray. Mulholland, who through his own police training has become a certified instructor on the use of the weapons, helped to train the other officers.

It was not cost effective to individually train every security officer, according to Gerken.

Before security officers were authorized to carry and use pepper spray, they were each sprayed with the visionimpairing chemical that also affects one's respiratory system so that they knew what reaction to expect if they ever used the potent spray on someone else, according to Gerken.

Sgt. Mulholland said that officers would use the pepper spray to protect the Albright community from outside threats:

"It's not for the students on this campus." However, officers do have the power to arrest Albright students for offenses, as well as people from the community on Albright's campus.

The police officer will continue attending classes through the Reading Police Academy in order to be updated on any new procedures. He will then pass the information on to the other on-campus officers.

Security's main goal over the next few months is to hire several certified officers to be on duty at once, Gerken said. He added that next month they will welcome to the force a female member who is already a certified police officer. The new officer must be sworn in through Berks County Court before becoming a member of Albright

For now, both Gerken and Mulholland said they think that the officers' weapons provide adequate protection. Even though Mulholland is licensed to carry a gun, Gerken said the need for a gun-toting officer would be worked in gradually and on an as-needed basis.

Security always has an officer on patrol and will continue working with the neighboring police forces of Reading and Muhlenberg to ensure safety on campus. Gerken said he would not comment on the exact number of officers that are on staff, but he assured that in comparison with other colleges Albright has a sufficient security force.



In an effort to let students know who represents the student body of Albright College to the administration, the Albrightian decided that it might be best to interview Andrea Blassingame, (A.K.A. Mamma Dre) the current president of the Student Government Association. It was well after 12 in the morning before she could fit me into her hectic schedule when we sat down to chat. Determined to separate fact from fiction about what I had been hearing in the college rumor mill, I interviewed her last Tuesday night and this is how it went

EG: So, how's SGA looking so far?

AB: So far so good. We have a very diverse group of people on the Executive Board this year. I feel that Albright is very well represented. Everyone gets along nicely.

EG: How are allocations and committees going?

AB: Well, we got through allocations but we haven't got to committees yet. That is the Vice President's job and she's just now able to get to it. [Allocations being how much money SGA gives to each campus organization and committees being what students who sign up to be in SGA are placed into to be

student representatives.]

EG: What do you want to accomplish through SGA this year?

AB: I would like to improve communication on campus. I would like SGA to become a liaison between the students and the administration. That would be my main goal. I would like to give students a resource to actually do something about their gripes. I would also like to get an NAACP chapter on Albright's campus. I would like to help get a lot of organizations up and running. I would really like to see AGON and Cue become more fully developed organizations

EG: So, I've been hearing rumors about administration trying to push for Albright to be a dry campus. Are you aware of any actions being taken?

AB: No, I'm not aware. It has never come before SGA. We've never discussed it. It's just a rumor running through the student body.

EG: If administration did ever ask SGA what they thought about it, how would you handle the situation?

AB: I would poll the student body and see what they thought. But, on a personal note I'm totally against alcohol. A main concern of mine this year is to alleviate alcohol pressure for freshmen. I would like to see the school enforce its policy of no underage drinking.

EG: Rumors are circulating accusing you and Dean Daniels of being racist and discriminatory against anyone who doesn't belong to a minority group. Reportedly there was an incident involving the POPs organization. POPs has a blind application process [meaning that they don't actually see the applicants or their names while deciding who is going to be in the organization] and that you and Dean Daniels wanted to abolish it to include more minority students without subjecting them to the application process? What are your reactions to this?

AB: (She paused with a serious frown on her face) Yes. of course I've heard these things. I don't know. It's hurtful and I'm very offended that people would think I'm racist. (She paused again) Every decision I make, I make it for the betterment of the student body. I can't worry about 100 people. I have to worry about 1600 people. I have to be as fair and ethical as I can possibly be without compromising my own personal beliefs. People don't like me, (she shrugged) but in spite of that I'm still going to do what I think is for their well being.

EG: I've also heard that Albright is trying to get rid of all Greek organizations. Have you heard anything about that?

AB: People don't know what's

going on. Let them talk. I don't know that to be factual at all. That's not the case. From my experience with administration, those are just

AB: Yeah, I hate giving tours on campus and having potential students parents ask me about the smokers in front of the campus center. I would like Albright to be more health conscious. I want to push for the smoking situation to be different. I also would like to see people get ponded more often. I think it's a great tradition for Albright. I'd like to make sure that it stays around. (She paused for a few seconds before she got really excited) I also would like to have concerts and events outside. I know we have the whole noise ordinance situation, but I'd like to do some research to see if there is any way we could get around it. I think it would bring some much needed energy and excitement back to Albright

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

The main objective of Freshman Forum, formerly known as Gateway, is to provide an introduction to demic study at Albright College. Lions Take Lyco for First Time in 24 Meetups 49-32

READING, PA - Albright rolled up 554 yards of offense on the way to a 49-32 victory over Lycoming Saturday afternoon at Shirk Stadium. The win snaps a string of 24 straight wins in the series for Lycoming, and puts Albright at 3-0 on the season and 2-0 in the MAC. The Warriors fall to 1-2 overall and 1-2 in the MAC.

Lycoming raced to a 16-0 lead in the first eight and a half minutes of the game. The Warriors scored on their opening drive, with Phil Mann hitting Tim Brown from 22 yards out to give Lycoming a 7-0 lead. Following an Albright three-and-out, Lycoming again struck quickly. Mann hit Richie Schiccatano at the 11, and Schiccatano took the ball to the three, but was stripped by Albright's Steve Butler at the thee. The ball squirted into the end zone, where Tony Kopp recovered for another Lycoming score.

After Lycoming held Albright to another three-and-out, a Lion special teams gaffe gave the Warriors two more points. The snap on the punt sailed over Albright punter Seth Kaplan's head and into the end zone. After a scramble, the ball went out of the end zone for a safety.

Nick Cushman Named to Team of the Week, MAC Honor Roll

Albright senior wide receiver Cushman (Perkiomenville, PA/St. Pius X) was named to the D3Football.com Team of the Week on for the games of September 18. Earlier in the week he was named to the MAC Honor Roll, Cushman caught nine passes for 155 yards and three touchdowns to help lead Albright to a 51-34 over Ursinus last Saturday. He also moved into third place on the Albright career receptions list, finishing the game with a career total of 179 receptions

giving the Warriors a 16-0 lead and the ball. Albright's defense held for the first time, and the Lion offense began to get untracked on the next series,

Albright took over on its own 31, and drove 69 yards for a touchdown to cut the Lycoming lead to 16-7. The big play of the drive came on a John Port to Steve Mocey 36-yard pass to the Lycoming one yard line. Adam Hubley dove over the pile on the next play to get the Lions on the board.

After Lycoming's Chris Schrader missed a 46-yard field goal attempt early in the second quarter, Albright continued to roll on offense. Port drove the Lions 71 yards in seven plays, with Port hitting Nick Cushman from six yards out to make the score 16-14 early in the second quarter.

A key play in the gamae came late in the second quarter. With the score still 16-14, Lycoming took over on its own 23 with 2:43 left in the half. On first down, Mann's pass slipped through his intended receiver's hands, and into the hands of Lion linebacker Muhammed Siddiqu at the 27-yard line. Siddiqu ran untouched into the end zone to give Albright it's first lead of the game at 21-16.

Albright took the ball to open the second half, but gave the ball right back to the Warriors when Vinnie Andrews' fumble at the Lion 46 was recovered by safety Nick Pinto. The Lion defense came up with a big stand, as they forced a threeand-out and a Lycoming punt, which was downed at the Lion two-yard line.

Albright methodically moved the ball out of the shadow of its own goal line, and nine plays later faced a second and 10 from its own 49. Port and Cushman then connected on a 51-yard touchdown pass that gave Albright a 28-16 lead with eight minutes left in the third quarter. Three plays later, Butler intercepted Mann at the Lycoming 43 and returned the ball to the 31, putting the Lions in scoring position yet again. It took Albright only three plays to find the end zone, with Hubley scoring for the second time on a 12-yard run to make the score 35-16.

After the teams exchanged punts, Lycoming got into the end zone late in the third quarter. Mann hooked up with Chris Beissel for a 15-yard scoring pass to make the score 35-22. The Warriors went for two, but Mann was sacked by Siddiqu to end the play.

On Albright's first play of the ensuing possession, the Warriors recovered an Albright fumble at the Lion 28. Again, the Albright defense held when it need to, and the Warriors settled for a 33-yard field goal from Schrader to cut the lead to 10, 35-25.

The Lion offense had an answer. After Port was sacked on first down, he hooked up again with Cushman for another big play. Cushman beat his man down the near sideline, staved in bounds, and raced

71 yards to the end zone to give the Lions a 42-25 lead with 13:15 left in the game.

Lycoming was not about to go away, however, as Mann drove the Warriors right back down the field. Lycoming covered 48 yards in just 1:35, with Mann hitting Tim Brown for a six-yard score to make the score 42-32 Albright.

Once again, Port and the Albright offense had a response. First, Port hit Bryon Haupt for a 39-yard gain to the Lycoming 20-yard line. Three plays later, on third and seven from the 17, Port again found Haupt, who made his way into the endzone for Albright's seventh touchdown of the game. Dustin Kaplan's extra point put the score at 49-32 with 7:30 left on the clock.

Lycoming again drove downfield, but on fourth and four from the Albright 22, Lion cornerback Josh Benson broke up Mann's pass in the end zone to effectively end any hope for the Warriors. Albright ran the final 5:30 off the clock, and left the field with a win

over Lycoming for the first time since 1977.

Port had a huge day, finishing 20-30 for 414 yards and four touchdowns with only one interception. Cushman had seven catches for 172 yards and three scores, while Steve Mocey had six catches for 148 vards. Adam Hubley had a stellar game for the Lions, as he rushed for 107 yards on 17 carries and two touchdowns. Darnell Hayes added 63 yards on the ground for the Lions. Linebacker Pete Manotti led the Lion defense with 14 tackles, including nine solo stops. Safety Paul Mohr had 10 tackles, nin solo, and forced a fumble

For Lycoming, Mann was 23-35 for 236 yards and four touchdowns. but he was intercepted three times. Brown had five catches for 97 yards and two scores, while Joe Cosmello led the ground game for Lycoming with 59 yards on 18 carries. Jim Smith, Mike Piotrowicz, and Matt Murdock each had seven tackles for the Warriors.
