

## NEOS CELEBRATE 70TH ANNIVERSARY IN ROYAL FASHION

Program Last Friday Night One of Exceptional Merit—Consisted of Literary And Musical Numbers

Last Friday the Neocosmian Literary Society celebrated their 70th birthday, by presenting a well-balanced, interesting, and instructive anniversary program in the college chapel, beautifully decorated for the occasion.

The anniversary, as is usual because of the peculiar time of its celebration is one which was attended by the dignitaries of Albright. Old grads, old faculty members, as well as recent grads, present faculty members and students turned out in force to hear the program. The fact that the anniversary celebrated was the seventieth, filled the hearts of a number of alumni with a strange thrill of pride, they stated later, as they considered the lore and the tradition connected with the literary societies of the college. The fact that both of the men's societies have now passed their seventieth milestone adds prestige and honor which can be credited only to time tested institutions of proved value, was one of special note to them at the present time when there is talk of a change of location in the air.

But the anniversary speaks for itself. Despite the fact that it got away to a late start, because of the girls' basketball game played immediately preceding, the evening did not seem long or drawn out in the least, for the program had both of these saving features—it was short, i.e. relatively so, and it was "snappy."

After Dr. Weber offered invocation, Edison O. Bates, vice-president of the society gave the audience a hearty welcome to the alumni, members of the other societies and friends of the society who had assembled to hear and see their literary skill which

## "PEPPY" PEP MEETINGS DISPLAY GREAT SPIRIT

Pep Meetings On Saturday In Chapel And Dining Room Show That Old Albright Spirit Is Still Alive

Saturday morning a few students and Alumni gathered for the pep meeting of students and alumni which had been announced. As there were so few there it was decided to change it into an informal conference and to hold over the pep meeting until the dinner hour, in order to secure as large an attendance as possible.

He then called on Dr. Winters '99.

He stated that the time was coming when everything thus far known by those in authority should be no longer kept secret, but should be put before the students and faculty. He said this would be done in the near future. He then stated that the name of the school would be Albright, and that the traditions and institutions of Albright would go to the merged school if the students themselves keep up the spirit and institutions, and bring them along.

## ALUMNI CELEBRATE LARGEST AND BEST MID-YEAR ASSEMBLY IN HISTORY

Grads Answer Call of President of Alumni Association By Returning In Force For Annual Meeting

ENJOY UNDERGRADUATE HOSPITALITY

Returning in greater numbers than ever before, the Alumni Association of Albright celebrated their biggest and best mid-year assembly in history. It is true that the old grads did not trek back as had been hoped by the president of the association and others who were planning for a meeting, the like of which had never been experienced in Albright for years. But on the other hand it is true that the success and glory of the assembly rose far above that of the level of former years, which portended a very great hope for the future. The officers of the society realized one thing—that the rut of former years no longer existed—and that the alumni meetings could be made interesting and attractive.

The gala occasion began Friday afternoon when the assembly met for the first official meeting in Excelsior Hall when the ballots were counted for the alumni member of the trustee board which is annually elected at this meeting. Clarence D. Becker, of Lebanon was re-elected for a two year term. Almost one-hundred and fifty ballots were returned by the alumni—almost fifty more than the minimum legal number for an election. Other important business was transacted, among which was a decision to consider a purchase of an intercollegiate debating trophy to stimulate interest in the forensic activity at Albright. After this meeting adjourned, the alumni trekked down to the dining hall where a special table was reserved for them, and where they celebrated and ate as they had done in years past—within the friendly confines of Albright which gave them a rousing welcome as they streamed in the large dining room.

At seven o'clock that evening the alumni helped fill the college gym to overflow in witnessing the impressive victory which the girls court team scored over their old enemies and last year's victors—Millersville Normal. After that, they were treated to one of the finest entertainments of the entire occasion—the Neocosmian anniversary, in which the younger men's literary society of the college celebrated their seventieth birthday. That night witnessed a great get-together for the "old grads," and as Paul Price put it, "the recent grads," who were seen talking with each other in all corridors of the building. ## ALUMNI ASSOCIATION TRANSACTS IMPORTANT BUSINESS AT MEETING

C. D. Becker '10 Elected Alumni Trustee—Pres. Bowman Speaks About Merger With Schuylkill

DISCUSS DEBATING TROPHY

At 4:30 P. M. on Friday afternoon, Feb. 3rd, the Mid-Year Assembly of the Albright College Alumni Association was called to order by the president, J. A. Heck, in Excelsior Hall. The meeting was opened with prayer, led by the Rev. A. A. Koch. The minutes of the June meeting were read and approved, after which the ballots for alumni trustee were counted in open meeting. C. D. Becker, having received the highest number of ballots cast for any one of the nominees, was elected Alumni Trustee for a term of two years.

Previous to the meeting ballots had been sent to all members of the Alumni Association for this purpose. Almost one hundred and fifty were returned, each counting one vote for an alumni trustee.

These ballots which were returned to the secretary of the Association, Martha M. Wray, '18, of Harrisburg, were opened and counted at this meeting. Almost fifty more than the required number were returned.

All members present then adjourned to the college dining hall where visiting alumni were served a delicious meal at a table reserved for them by special arrangement of the program committee.

After the supper hour the Association again met in Excelsior Hall for the transaction of any further business to be brought before the Mid-Year Assembly.

Upon motion the Alumni Association agreed to assume part of the expense incident to supplying the varsity football men who played in the Little Three Championship games with gold footballs in appreciation of their loyal, faithful service. These footballs were given to the players at the football banquet several weeks ago.

A bill of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) was presented by the 1929 Speculum and upon motion ordered paid.

The secretary presented a bill of \$42.91 for expenses incurred in the trustee election and one of \$0.65 for expenses. Both were ordered paid. An order for \$25.00 was then drawn in favor of the secretary for services rendered.

Mr. C. D. Becker, the newly elected trustee, who is also a member of the Commission on merging the two schools—Albright College and Schuylkill College—then spoke to us briefly on the work of the Commission

## PRES. BOWMAN SAILS ABROAD THIS EVENING

Begins 2 Months Voyage of France, Switzerland and Germany At Midnight; Returning In April

TAKING S. S. BERENGARIA

Makes Voyage Across Atlantic In Largest Cunard Steamer; Sister-Ship of Aquatania

Tonight at twelve o'clock, Dr. C. A. Bowman, President of Albright College will set sail for Europe, leaving these shores for the Old World in the S. S. Berengaria, largest steamer of the Cunard lines, and sister-ship of the Aquatania.

At the beginning of the week, Dr. Bowman had not completed his plans for the trip, but he intends to tour France, Germany and Switzerland. He is extremely anxious to see the winter sports on the Swiss Alps. The president does not know the exact date of his return, although he expects it to be about the first of April or a little later. At that time he was busy making preparations for this extended voyage, his passport having come Tuesday morning.

This is the first time Dr. Bowman has visited Europe since 1922 when he made a cruise of Mediterranean. This time, however, his trip will take him over entirely different territory, as he will traverse Northern Europe rather than the southern portion.

The Bulletin will try to keep in touch with Dr. Bowman in his tour, and will keep the Bulletin readers informed of his progress in the old world.
