Student outcry over Albright "policies" is something we've heard quite a bit of this year, and it seems as if it may have finally been recognized.

For those of you who do not know, Albright has a recycling program - sort of. There are separate bins for recycling in certain areas of some buildings.

Yet, this inconsistent placing of bins and the fact that the program was set up solely to satisfy the state law requiring largescale institutions to recycle, have done nothing and few bother to separate to help the program's efficiency

In fact, an "audit" done on garbage at Albright several years ago, reveals that approximately 35% of recyclable were trashed, while another 22% of recyclable were deemed unrecyclable due to the amount of trash mixed in with them. This audit examined only certain buildings, but its results were significant enough to conclude that the recycling program here is largely inefficient.

Albright Environmental Action (AEA) has targeted the present program's problems and proposed a new one. The proposal includes consistent labeling and placing of the bins, education as to what can be recycled, and several work-study openings under a new position of a Recycling Coordina-

Brought before Dean Daniels, the proposal come a widely known fact seemed to be received

with excitement. Agreeing that change was needed, extra bins will be placed in the Woods, and over the summer a meeting has been scheduled with a Recycling Coordinator from another college in order to discuss possibilities. The administration building will also be targeted this summer. As for the AEA proposed new positions, Dean Daniels said that positions have not yet been discussed, as they would prefer to wait and first discuss the issue with the new Director of Facilities, once he is appointed. Although it seems as if

progress is being made on establishing a successful recycling program here at Albright, there is still much to be done.

With the year drawing to a close and the program being delayed, many fear that the program will never be implemented. Pressure for recycling at Albright needs to be maintained. AEA promises to push the program, but will it be enough?

Reforming policies at Albright is something students seem to want. Could this be a foot-in-door? It looks like we will have to wait till next year to see.


Tuition continues to inflate, while academic standards deflates

from, and if it is poor it will be difficult to get that job over the next person."

Albright had been in the third quartile as recently as 1996, but since then they have fallen to the fourth and have been falling ever since. In 2000 Albright ranked 148th out of 160 schools as ranked by U.S. News.

Albright's academic reputation has fallen considerably since the arrival of President Dr. Henry A. Zimon. Zimon, who was appointed to the president position during the 1999-2000 school year, had vowed to the Reading Eagle/Times to turn Albright into a "world class institution," however Albright has headed in the opposite direction since his appointment.

Zimon refused an interview on the subject.

Albright will also raise its tuition to 20, 750, despite the fallen academic reputation of the college. The raise is comparable, however, with several surrounding col-

"Our tuition and fees place us in the midprice range of comparable liberal arts colleges in Pennsylvania and nationwide,' said Executive Vice-President Paul Gazzerro. "This increase represents a 4.9 percent increase over 2000-01, and a 4.13 percent average annual increase over the past eight years (since 1994). This increase is substantially less than that of many other colleges. In the previous three years, Albright's tuition increases were by far the lowest of our competitors (Ursinus, Lebanon Valley, Elizabethtown, Moravian, Susquehanna, Muhlenberg) which ranged from 5 to 14 percent.

According Gazzerro, the costs will go to the day to day operations of the college, including increases in faculty and staff salaries, fuel, food, repairs and maintenance.

"Every year, the cost of living rises, and we have to stay parallel to

that," mentioned Gazzerro. "If the price of fuel goes up, we are going to have to pay more for fuel, and we have to get that money from







"It is not a practice at Albright or other private colleges to increase institutional funds based on

tuition increases," said Director of Financial Aid. Mary Ellen Duffy. "We prefer to offer students a fixed dollar amount at the time of admission, and retain this award for the entire four years as long as eligibility continues to be met.'

Gazzerro stated that one of the reasons why tuition continues to rise is to meet the demands of highly intensive liberal arts colleges. He also stated that Albright needs to recruit the best professors in a highly competitive market. It can also be noted that Albright's professors are among the lowest paid in the country.

"We need to be able to have the money to go out and hire the most capable professors in a very competitive market there," out stated Gazzerro.

Faculty salaries are \$3000 to \$5000 and 25% lower than the collegiate average.

Students have been angered recently by several extemporaneous fees that have been implicated within the standard tuition. One such fee, a \$100 dollar graduation fee, has left students baffled as to why them must pay to gradu-

"I already pay ever \$20,000 to attend this school, the tuition is raised, and then next year I have to pay \$100 just to graduate," stated junior Toby Ranck. "Albright is leaving a bad taste in the mouths of Alumni who are going to be disinclined to contribute back to their alma mater after gradua-

Along with the tuition students also pay almost \$7,000 for room and board for eight months, a \$200 technology fee, and a student activity fee.

There is also a \$200 late fee if payments are not made in time. Some students and parents might consider a \$200 late fee a bit steep.

I was one day late with my payment and was charged a \$200 late fee,' stated one concerned parent. "The punishment just doesn't fit the crime here.

Safety on campus...the school year in review

Officer Gerken, Director of the Safety and Security department, remarked in an interview that "it's not that we are the worst college campus, but we want to be the best college campus" in regards to safety at issues at Albright. Many advancements and changes occurred this year in the safety and security department in order to raise the school to higher standards.

Every fall semester, a group of a dozen or so students, security members, facility members, and student service workers take the annual Safety Walk around the entire campus at dusk and take note of students concerns and ideas to help better Albright. This year, the bushes growing on the

pathway up to the Albright Woods were trimmed, emergency phones were added around North Hall and the Woods, and foot escorting services were created to walk students around campus at night as a result of suggestions from the walk. Also, energy saving lights were implemented along with additional lighting in shadowy areas, better internal lighting was installed around the buildings by Science Field, and solar lighting was added at the end of Kelchner Field.

Security took many other steps as well to create a safer environment for students

According to Officer Gerken, all officers of the safety department and health services department were trained in CPR, first aid, and AED, or Automated External Defibrillator training.

AED, the shock paddles that are used for resuscitation of the heart, were received by Albright through a grant so that health and security personnel on campus could engage in immediate resuscitation in the critical first 3 minutes of an emergency.

The security office also checks emergency phones on campus every day, along with lighting and residence hall doors. Emergency buttons were installed in certain areas around campus that ring directly to the security office in mainly in case problems with people outside the Albright community.

The parking policy was also established with different colored stickers marking the areas where students live in order for security to be able to tell who belongs in certain areas and who

does not. ID cards that unlock residence buildings also the same purpose. Albright received a bicycle 2 weeks ago from a donation made by SGA in order for security officers to do a bicycle patrol, which enables them to get around more quickly and quietly.

Officer Gerken in security and Samantha Wesner, Nurse Practitioner/Health Educator, agree that the most significant thing for women's safety on campus is the RAD (Rape Aggression Defense)

Officer Gerken feels that the emphasis is not so much on sexual assault and rape on campus, but more that Albright has become increasingly aware that this problem is occurring all over with college age students. About 55 women on campus have gone through the

class and now are lifetime members, meaning they can take a RAD refresher course anywhere for free. Carrie Miller, a graduate of RAD says that the class gives you "the confidence to know you could handle yourself in a situation like that."

She would highly recommend the class to all women on campus because it uses your instincts and shows you how to use them effectively to defend yourself using the skills of awareness, risk reduction, and actual physical moves.

The powerful and rewarding course runs once a week for 3 hours, for 4 weeks and is taught over the summer and 6 times over the course of the college year and is free of charge.




Many students constantly chat with friends long distance through an Internet service called instant messenger. Instant messenger is completely free provided that you have Internet access, which all college students have.

College tuition rises far past the standard rate of inflation

The price of higher education continues to rise, much more than the standard rate of inflation, according to a study by College Board.

According to the board, college tuition and fees rose 4.4% in four – year public institutions and 5.2 in private four-year colleges last year. The country's inflation, as measured by the consumer index, rose only 3.4% during the same period.

"Students are now graduating with over \$20,000 debts to their alma mater," said Albright College Executive VicePresident of Finance, Paul Gazzerro. "The price for higher education is just getting more and more expensive."

One factor that has affected the tuition, is the competition to attract decent professors to a particular institution. Also, current professors are pressuring schools to augment their salary in accordance with other the rise for other professions.


"Professor wise, it's an extremely competitive market out there," stated Gazzerro. "Colleges are competing for the best professors, while also having to worry about rising the salaries of their current professors, and that is one of the factors that is driv-

ing up tuition."

Albright College is among the lowest in professor salaries among all of the national liberal ax's colleges in the country, paying 25% below the national average.

It is very difficult now for an undergraduate to consider going to graduate school, because of the financial damage that was already suffered.

"I can't even imagine paying for graduate school, when I am this far in debt from college," said Albright senior Tracy DiMezzo. "You are looking at another \$20,000 at least for graduate school, after undergraduate puts you an additional \$20,000 in debt."












Sixers were busy bickering amongst themselves.


They finished Game 3 downtrodden and down two games to one to a Raptors team holding a can of Raid -- the one with the formula for killing pesky Sixers in their tracks.

The entire world revolves around self-interest. Every time you work for money, in some way you do it out of self-interest. Anytime you buy anything, in some way you do it out of self-interest. In turn, other people are able to make money or benefit from your work.

From time to time people will try to hurt your

rights in the process. That is when self-interest becomes wrong. That is when the government should intervene.

Libertarians recognize that the world has its problems. Even a libertarian world would have problems. So what kind of world would you like to live in? Libertarians would like to live in a world where they have the freedom to control their own destinies.

There would be problems in this world, however only in a libertarian world would you best be able to solve those problems.

With freedom comes responsibility, take away freedom and you lose the responsibility. Libertarians are not calling for anarchy and lawlessness. We are calling for a world where everyone has the right to life, liberty and property. Laws would ex-

ist to protect these rights from being violated by others. To give meaning to those laws the government would enforce them.

Would you like the right to your life, your liberty and your property? Would you like to have the ability and responsibly to maximize those rights as you see fit? The time is now to start evaluating what is truly lawless and what in the name of the "common good" is perpetuating true lawless-
