Following the sorority inductions, on November 2nd at 7:30 P.M., three out of Albright's four local fraternities also brotherized a '64 pledge class. These fraternities were Alpha Pi Omega (A.P.O.), Pi Tau Beta (Pi Tau), and Kappa Upsilon Phi (Kappa); the Zeta Omega Epsilon fraternity will have a pledge class in the spring.

Masters Hall, the Alumni Memorial Hall, and the Library-Administration Building. Coffee and Danish pastries will be served in the Home Economics Department from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. An outdoor chuck wagon barbecue "a la Van Driel" featuring hot beef sandwiches will be served at 12 noon to alumni.

Wilkens Appointed Secretary of S.C.

The Student Council meeting of Tuesday, Nov. 3, 1964 was called to order at 4:20 P.M. by President Barry Ache.

The first order of old business pertained to the upcoming Ivy Ball. It was reported that there had been insufficient publicity regarding the purchase of tickets. It was decided that the publicity committee would post notices around the campus which would designate the locations where tickets can be purchased.

Nuclei Report

A representative of Nuclei reported that a census would be taken at chapel next week, in order to determine what activities the student body would like the council to present.

There has also been some confusion regarding a college regulation stipulating that there can be only one activity scheduled for a given evening. It was reported that the rules regarding rescheduling have been established by the student body, rather than by the administration, and the council can, therefore, take appropriate action to change them, if they feel it would be beneficial.

The discussion of new business began with President Barry Ache reporting that he had received a letter from Wilkes College which requested an Albright banner to decorate the new Wilkes Student Office Building. The council decided in favor of this action, and a banner will be sent to Wilkes College as soon as possible.

Secretary Appointed

Unfortunately, due to other commitments, Geneva Bruckart, the Corresponding Secretary will be unable to carry out the responsibilities of her office. The council approved a motion to have Jean Wilkens take over the office until such time as Geneva is able to return.

Dean Manzillo and a group of the women students have been working to establish a female counterpart to Alpha Phi Omega. The faculty has already approved a girls service sorority, Gamma Sigma Sigma. The council also approved both the idea of the organization, and permission to have national affiliation.

The last order of business was a council decision against both co-sponsoring and giving financial aid to the Alpha Phi Omega Nickelodeon Night, Nov. 14.

At 5:10 p.m. the Student Council adjourned until Tuesday, Nov. 17.

At 1:30 p.m. the Albright Lions will meet Lebanon Valley in the Albright College Stadium. Last year's Homecoming Game was against Delaware Valley with the Lions clobbering the Aggies 63-0. Cider and doughnuts will be served in the Field House at 4 p.m. At 4:30 p.m., the Post Game Salute and the Songfest will be held in the Field House. Nine groups with the possibility of ten at this printing will be competing for the trophy. At 6 p.m. the Alumni Candlelight Dinner will be held in the Dining Hall for alumni and students. After dinner, an evening of folk music will be enjoyed with Karen Cuper singing.

The annual Homecoming Weekend enables the alumni to renew old acquaintances among the alumni and to meet the present Albright students, stimulating spirit among the Albright College family.

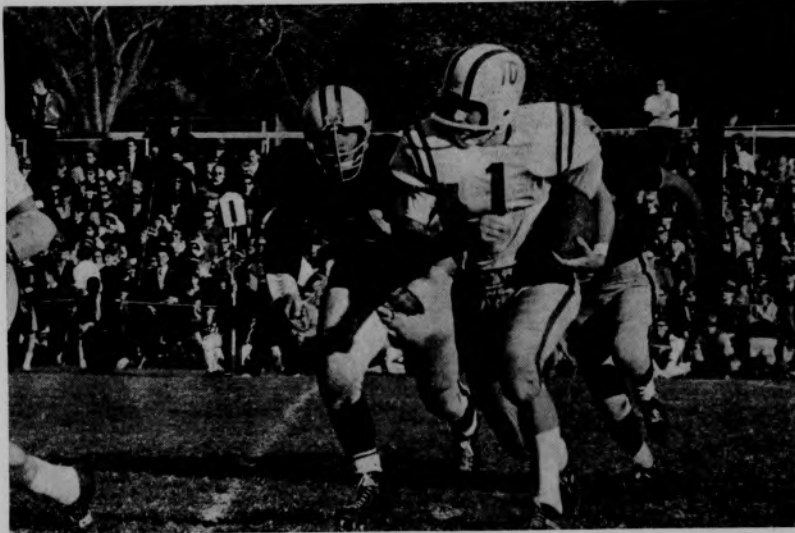

Gridders Stomp Moravian 40-0

The Albright Lions used six touchdowns in turning back the Greyhounds from Moravian, 40-0 in the 14th Annual Pretzel Bowl. The crowd of 7,500 enjoyed 70 degree weather and the clear bright sun as they viewed the contest.

Nevins Scores

After winning the toss and electing to receive, the Lion's halfback, Dan Manlove, returned the kickoff to the Albright 49. Quarterback Lew Nevins, who received the outstanding player award, started the Lion offense clicking. Using Frank Herzog, Bill Bors and Dan Manlove and a 14 yard pass to Carmen Communale, Nevins moved the ball to the Greyhound 10. After handing off to Herzog, who gained one yard, Nevins ran nine yards for a T.D. The point after touchdown was made by Jim Kearns, who had a busy day kicking four extra points and scoring a touchdown as he led all Lion scorers with 10 points.

Moravian Threatens

The Greyhounds, attempting to even the score, started their march on their own 35 yard line. Fifteen plays later found the Greyhounds on the Albright 16 and threatening. On a fourth and seven situation, Moravian quarterback Jerry Transue took to the air. Transue was forced to his pass as defenders blitzed and he missed his intended receiver.

The ball was turned over to the Lions on their 16 and the second quarter found them on the Moravian 49. On the first play of the second quarter, quarterback Nevins fumbled. The fumble was gathered in by Jim Fox and the Greyhounds regained possession of the football on the 49.

Greyhounds Halted

The Greyhounds penetrated to the 13 on their next series of plays, but the strong Lion defense again halted their drive on a fourth and three situation.

The ball changed hands four times in the remaining time of the second quarter. Twice the Lions lost the ball on intercepted passes with Bob Corradi and Bill Silcox respectively accounting for them. The Greyhounds, who did not pose a serious threat the rest of the game, lost the ball by an intercepted pass and

and a lost fumble with Bill Bors accounting for the interception and Wib Leonard scooping the loose ball.

Lions Recover Fumble

After the intermission kickoff, which was returned to the 25, Transue's initial pass was intercepted by Jon Paris. The Lions needed only three plays to score as halfback Don Manlove ran seven yards for the second T.D. The point after touchdown by Kearns was good.

Minutes later as the Greyhounds attempted their first punt, which was blocked by George Gamber, the Lions scored again as Wib Leonard gathered in the loose ball and scampered 25 yards for the T.D. Again it was Kearns for the PAT.

Late in the third quarter the Lions scored their third T.D. of the period. Fullback John Haggerty took a handoff and crashed in from the one yard line for the score. An attempted two point run was missed.

Shellhammer Passes for TD

The Lions put the game on ice with two fourth quarter touchdowns. Freshman quarterback, Roy Shellhammer passed to Jim Kearns for the quarterback's first collegiate touchdown pass. The pass covered 75 yards as Kearns scampered for the T.D. The PAT by Kearns was good.

In the waning minutes of the game Frank Bartletta, another freshman, passed 10 yards to Tom Grifflie for the last score of the game.

Saturday's victory was the Lion's sixth in seven decisions and their fourth shutout.

TRUSTEES RAISE TUITION \$200

At a board of trustees meeting last week, the comprehensive fee was raised \$200 a year bringing the total fee up to \$1,400. The board also authorized the construction of a new \$500,000 dormitory, which will accommodate 118 persons, next September. It will be located just east of N. 23th St. between Bern and Richwood streets; the dorm will be located after North and West halls.

Besides officer re-election, two new members also joined the board, they are: John Moxon, Oley R. D. 1, and J. Britian Winters, a Baltimore lawyer.

Leroy M. Burkholder, the board chairman, reported that Albright received \$230,542 for its development fund last year, bringing the total, as of June 30, to \$1,459,030.

Albright To Face Lebanon Valley in Homecoming Game

Albright will face the Flying Dutchmen of Lebanon Valley College tomorrow in the Homecoming Game. Lebanon Valley owns a 9-2 record this season with victories over Wilkes, 27-14; Moravian, 20-3; and Dickenson, 14-0. The Blue and White were beaten by Juniata, 20-8; and Muhlenburg, 30-22.

The Flying Dutchmen, coached by Mr. William McHenry, are an experienced team with fine passing. They are led by junior quarterback John Vaszily. Lebanon Valley's line is experienced but not too big.

The Lions are seeking revenge after last year's 21-12 defeat at the hands of the Flying Dutchmen. Underdog Lebanon Valley upset them in the final game of the season as they beat the Lions for the first time since 1953. The Lions won the battle of statistics but could not overcome Lebanon Valley's alert defense. The Flying Dutchmen intercepted five passes and recovered three Albright fumbles in that game. The Lions came back strong in the last quarter with two touchdowns but they were too late.

NEW DORM WINS FOOTBALL TITLE

Albright's intramural football league officially began Oct. 5, after a week of postponements because of wet grounds. The seven teams in this year's league were the New Dorm, the Old Dorm, the Daymen, and the four fraternities: Alpha Pi Omega, Kappa Phi Upsilon, Pi Tau Beta, and Zeta Omega Epsilon; each team played six games during the regular season. The New Dorm and Pi Tau Beta shared top position with 5-1 records. On Oct. 22, they played for the league championship and the New Dorm won 26-0.

The New Dorm led the league in total offense and also total defense. They averaged 26.6 points per game offensively and 6.6 points per game defensively. Pete Nichols of the New Dorm was the league's high scorer with 8 T.D.'s and 4 P.A.T.'s.

Following Rev. Witmer's talk, the Albright Glee Club, under the direction of Dr. Hinkle, sang "Lord God, We Worship Thee", by Carl Mueller. The assembly ended with a postlude played by Professor Fredricks.

Charter Day is celebrated on the first Thursday of November to commemorate the authorization by the state of Pennsylvania of Albright College to grant current degrees in higher education.
