Ms. Beideman has been vice-president of the Student Dietetics Association, president of the Albright College Choir, secretary of Jazz Band, and a chairperson for Lion Diplomats. She has also participated in Alpha Phi Omega Little Sisters, the Peer Orientation Program for two years, and the BASE program. She has volunteered for the American Heart Association and has been a dance teacher at ABC Dance for four years. She was recently awarded the Margaret Scheifele Music Award.

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International Journalist to Address Albright

Journalist Vladimir Pozner, whose inside reports and commentary on the fall of communism and the dissolution of the Soviet Union gave the world a clearer understanding of those events as they happened, will deliver the commencement address to the 134th graduating class at Albright College on Sunday afternoon, May 23rd.

Pozner, author of "Eyewitness: A Personal Account of the Unraveling of the Soviet Union," and co-host of the "Pozner-Donahue" show televised worldwide on the CNBC cable network, is one of four individuals who will be awarded honorary degrees at the 1993 Albright Commencement. He is to receive a doctor of laws degree. Walter Bonner, Jr., professor emeritus of biochemistry and biophysics at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, and Ned Heindel, professor of chemistry at Lehigh University and president-elect of the American Chemical Society, will each receive doctor of science degrees. The Rev. Thomas Webb, superintendent of the Harrisburg District of

the Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church, will receive a doctor of divinity degree. Rev. Webb will speak at the annual baccalaureate service the morning of Commencement.

After Pozner's address, nearly 300 graduates will receive diplomas from President Ellen S. Hurwitz as families and well-wishers look on. They include Mr. and Mrs. Narayan Mishra, retired college administrators who are flying to Reading from Kathmandu, Nepal to watch their daughter, Pragma, graduate as the fourth-year student with the highest grade point average in her class. Pragma, who has earned a bachelor of science in biology and hopes to become a physician and return to

Nepal, got a "B" in United States 20th Century History her first semester. Since then she has earned nothing lower than an "A" to compile a 3.969 average out of a possible 4.0.

A year ago, Pragma and Debra Means led the 133rd Commencement procession as flag bearers, an honor bestowed upon the two juniors who lead their class in academic standing. Debra, who amassed a perfect 4.0 average in her first three years at Albright, spent her senior year at Duke University in Durham, N.C. as part of a cooperative program in environmental studies. The daughter of

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Patricia Lynn Fitzgerald has earned a degree in Accounting from Albright. From Iselin, New Jersey, Ms. Fitzgerald comments that she hopes to work in the accounting department of a company, in fact, she says, "I am still searching, so if anybody knows of any jobs in the New Jersey area..."

Her activities included Phi Mu Fraternity, for which she has acted as president, discipline chairperson, Rush party chairperson, standards chairperson, and standards representative of the sophomore class. She has been captain of the Varsity Softball Team, a Volunteer Income Tax Assistant (VITA), a member of BASE and the Accounting and Business Association, Walton Dorm Council Treasurer, a participant in Intramural Volleyball, and a Varsity Football and Basketball Statistician. She has earned the Phi Mu Award.



Pamela G. Gibbons is graduating in the last Nursing class at Albright. From Warminster, Pennsylvania, Ms. Gibbons plans to work as a Registered Nurse on the Medical-Surgical floor at Doylestown Hospital.

Ms. Gibbons has been active in the Albright community by working as a Peer Orientation Person (POP), a member of the Parents' Weekend Committee, and by dancing in the Muscular Dystrophy Association Dance-A-Thon. She has been president of the Albright College Organization of Nursing Students and vice-president of the Lion Diplomats.

Among Ms. Gibbons' honors and awards are the David Caramanica Memorial Award, the Nursing Faculty Award, and Dean's List.

Due to her high academic standing and long record of being active in the Albright community, Ms. Henry has been honored as a Member of the Dean's List, a Walton Scholar, and a Jacob Albright Scholar as well as having been awarded the Gold "A" Award and the Service Above Self Jacob Award.

Pragya Mishra is the Valedictorian for the graduating class of 1993. From Kathmandu, Nepal, Ms. Mishra is a Biology Major who plans to study medicine.

Ms. Mishra's list of activities at Albright is extensive. 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Mr. and Mrs. Donald R. Pozner of Morgantown, Pennsylvania, she will come to Reading to claim her bachelor's degree from Albright May 23rd, and return to Duke to complete work on her master's degree there. This year, the flag bearers are Nicole E. DiCello, a business administration: marketing/psychology major from Bethlehem, Pa., and Stephen J. Martino, a biochemistry concentrator from Lansdale, Pa.

Pozner's appearance at Albright will be the first, but the third that he has scheduled here. Nine years ago, Albright was to be one of the stops on a national college tour canceled when the Soviet regime would not allow him out of the country. Later, after glasnost had liberalized such restrictions, he was scheduled to speak again, but stayed home because of an illness in his family.

The son of a French mother and a Russian father who worked in France for American film companies, Pozner came to New York with his family in flight of the Nazis when he was six. The Pozners settled in Greenwich Village and young Vladimir attended Stuyvesant High School. But three years later, in 1948, they were on the move again after Vladimir's father was black-listed because of his Communist sympathies and lost his job

Who is the professor that influenced you the most and why?

Rebecca: Between the quietly subversive suggestions of Jeff Barker and the inexhaustible demands of Michael Adams, I have thought longer, harder, and deeper than a nineteen-year-old Rebecca could have imagined was possible. It has been painful and unspeakably rewarding. I will always be profoundly grateful to them for suggesting the journey.

Cheryl: Dr. Adele Newson and Dr. Mary Jane Androne—they are terrific role models. **Susan:** Dr. Karen Jogan. She has inspired me to further my education in Latin American Studies and to travel. She has always made me feel as if I am capable of doing anything I want and being successful, just like my mom.

Pam: The professor who influenced me the most has been Deborah Bevrino, MSN. She has been a role model for me for my future nursing career in working with people of all ages. Deb has a special talent and skill for communicating and listening.

Wendy: Dr. Francis Williamson helped me to know that I can do anything as long as I set my mind to it. He allowed me to further develop my musical abilities and to expand my musical appreciation. Thanks, Doc.

Heena: Dr. M.J. Androne. Taking her Sex Roles Class really made me see things differently and increased my respect and admiration for her because I think she is strong and stands up for what she believes in. **Mario:** Jeff Sparagana—he's been straightforward to the point, no B.S. He's both a friend and a coach who's always there when I need him. However, who can forget Vince Schiaro?

Carey: Two people who have influenced me greatly at Albright are Freida Texer and Michael Adams. As a freshman, Michael was my eye-opening introduction to college. He forced me to operate at a new level of thought. Although I haven't had a class with Michael in three years, I still use Michael's standards. **Jerry:** One of the world's greatest chefs, along with Kathy Ireland.

What is the one thing that you'd change about Albright?

Rebecca: The puke-green rug and floor-to-ceiling paneling in my apartment. (Does that count as two?) Really, though, Albright's doing okay—of course there are problems, but what would competent, intelligent, and generally creative humans do without problems

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at MGM. When France refused to allow the Pozners to return, the Soviets offered Vladimir's father a job in East Berlin. In December, 1952, they moved to Moscow.

Pozner, who graduated from Moscow University with a degree in human physiology, worked as a literary secretary to Samuel Marshak, a noted Russian translator of English poetry, and in 1961 became a senior editor at the Novosti press agency. He was managing editor of *Soviet Life*, an English-language monthly distributed in the United States and later of *Sputnik*, a monthly digest of Soviet press accounts. Starting in 1970, he became a familiar figure in this country as a commentator for the North American Service of Radio Moscow—the Soviet counterpart of the Voice of America.

Pozner rose to chief political observer for Soviet TV and radio in 1986 and was one of the identifiable figures in the reform movement instituted by Mikhail Gorbachev. That fall, Pozner and American television personality Phil Donahue started their program on CNBC.

Pozner shared the Better World Society's "communicator of the year" award with Donahue in 1987. In addition to "Eyewitness," he wrote the best-selling "Parting With Illusions" and (with Helen Kayssar) "remembering War."

as means of self-evaluation. Freida was not only a great professor, but also a friend and mentor. Through her guidance, I realized my potential as a student. A continual source of encouragement, she played a vital role in my development as a person and a scientist. Michael and Freida had an especially profound impact on who I am. I'd like to say thanks.

Mike: The best part about Albright is the faculty. I really feel indebted to basically all the professors who I have had in classes. I especially appreciated the persons who helped me examine issues from new perspectives. The one person who probably influenced me the most was Dr. Ingram. She introduced me to new ideas and helped me think about experiences I had. Most importantly, she made me feel guilty if I stayed silent—and convinced me that I must contribute to thought, discussion, and action on and beyond campus.

Jerry: Dr. Yoder by far influenced me in the area of Academic and Professor Wache influenced me the most to think and be creative.

Information was gathered from the college catalog, the sports stacionian, the Registrar's Office, and the Student Affairs Office.

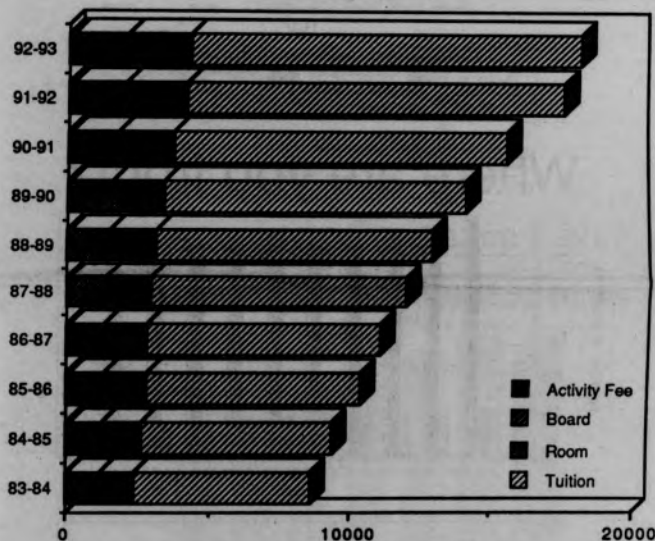

(Fall Semesters 1983-1992)

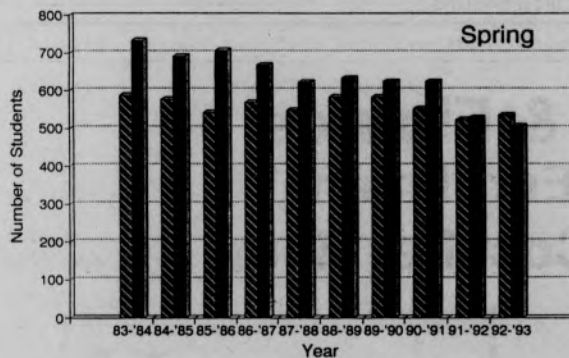
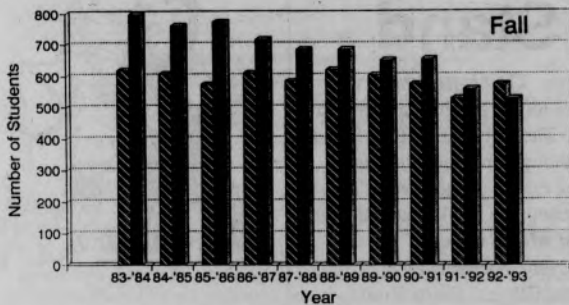
