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## Y's to Sponsor Xmas Party for Local Children

The Albright student YM-YWCA is sponsoring the annual Christmas party for the underprivileged children of the Reading area on Sunday, December 13 from 12:30 to 4:00 P.M. Dinner is to be served in the dining hall. An afternoon of entertainment is to follow in Krause Hall. Entertainment under the direction of Dennis Upton will include games and a movie entitled "How the Animals Discovered Christmas."

Anita Mossberg and Dennis Upton are co-chairmen of the affair with Dan Damon supervising toy repair in Krause Hall from 7 to 10 P.M. for this past week, Ron Davis on registration, and Bob Martin and Larry Beman in charge of the collection of toys from downtown stores and local schools.

Family Service and Fellowship House are co-operating with the student Y by supplying names of children. Approximately 175 children are expected to see Santa Claus who will distribute toys, candied apples, and candy cotton, to the youngsters.

## Glee Club To Present Christmas Concert

The annual Christmas assemblies will feature a concert of sacred music by the Albright College Glee Club under the direction of Mr. LeRoy B. Hinkle.

The programs will feature choral selections centered around the Christmas season, dating from the early seventeenth century to the present, highlighted by a short cantata, "O Beloved Shepherds", by the German Baroque composer, Andreas Hammerschmidt. This work includes four-part choral portions, soprano solo sections sung by Bonnie Schlager '68, and instrumental accompaniment by a baroque-type ensemble of two flutes, a violincello, and a harpsicord.

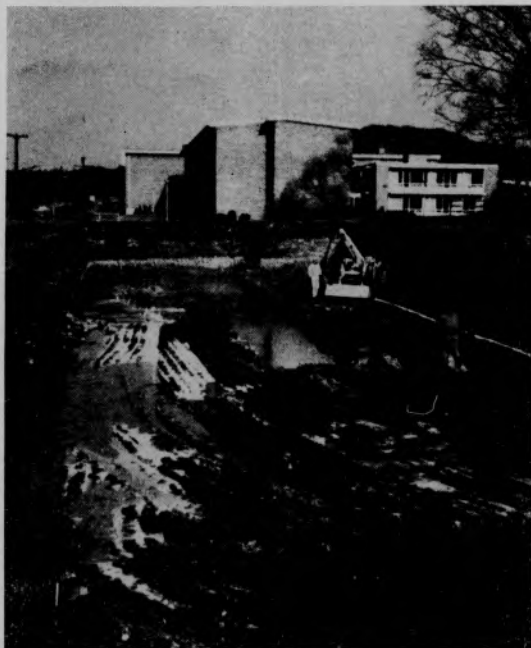

## Construction of New Resident Hall Begun Last Week

Excavation for the new \$500,000 Albright College resident hall located on the north-east corner of N. 13th and Bern Streets began last week. Similar to the existing dorms on the site, North Hall for women and West Hall for men, the new unit is the third of a proposed four dorm complex on the city block bounded by N. 13th, Bern, Linden and Richmond streets. With a capacity of 118 students, it will be connected to a core center that houses recreation areas and office space.

Muhlenberg Bros. is the architect and C. H. Schlegel and Son Inc., the general contractor. The building should be completed by July 30, 1965.

It was revealed last week that unlike North and West Halls, the new dorm will have a full basement. Heating will come from the physical education building directly opposite on 13th Street.

## Dominos Begin Rehearsals for Drama, 'Monique'

Rehearsals have begun for the new Domino production, "Monique". Written by Dorothy and Michael Blaukfort, the play will be performed in January. A drama in two acts, the play appears as a direct contrast with the players' first performance this season, a light comedy. A combination of mystery, terrifying suspense, and a touch of the supernatural, "Monique" is basically a study of the deterioration of human character through the passions.

In his first role with the Domino Players, Mickey Bauderth portrays Fernand Rovinee. Francis Rinehart is seen as Lisette, and Margaret Fritz, as Lucienne Rovinee, also in their first roles with the Players. Dr. Monique Rigaud is portrayed by Carole Frantz, Henriette, by Mark Wasickanin. Ronald Delp, who was seen as the stage director in last year's production of "Harlequinade", by Terrance Rattigan, is Gauhez, and Peter Beitchman, also acting for the first time with the players, is Andre. The Messenger is played by Harry Schoeb, the telephone operator by Clarissa Mallory, and Suzanne, by Karen Detwiler.

Those who wish to renew their applications for financial aid will receive College Scholarship Service Parents Confidential Statement Renewal forms at second semester registration. These will be due on March 15.
