Hurwitz Holds Press Conference

Ellen S. Hurwitz, college president-elect, held a press conference Friday, April 24, prior to addressing the spring meeting of the board of trustees.

Several members of the local press, including WRFY radio, WYLH Channel 69. and The Reading Eagle gathered in Roop Hall for the morning conference where Hurwitz fielded questions about her plans for Albright.

I plan to listen to the constituencies at the college and work with them," said Hurwitz. "I have no set agenda, and will

come to the college with an open mind."

The twelfth president of Albright made sure to note that not only was she chosen by the college to be president, she also chose

"I chose to be president of Albright," said Hurwitz, "I want to make it clear that it was a two way street." She said she was impressed with the unprententious nature of her future colleagues, the faculty's commitment to teaching and the students'

"I just like the people," said Hurwitz,
"That's the biggest and best thing I could say about Albright.

A respected scholar and Russian historia who speaks seven languages, Hurwitz said that through a liberal arts education, most human problems can be addressed.

When asked how she will market Albright for the 21st century, she replied that she will make the case for education.

"For too long you have been told that you need to go to college to get a job, not that you need to go college to get the most enjoyment out of life," said Hurwitz.

Hurwitz has been with two other Methodistaffiliated colleges (Illinois Wesleyan University and Wesleyan University) and was asked if there was any particular reasons she chose those organizations.
"I believe the Methodist church functions

as a consciencein a liberal mind to do good things" she said.

She also noted that she is a racial equality advocate and has found the Methodist church to be very supportive of those ideals.

Trustees Report Upswing in Admissions and Strong Financial Outlook

Albright College trustees were told at the recent meeting that the college is experiencing a surge in admissions activity in response to a streamlining of its admissions process and the repackaging of financial awards.

"We're gratified with the positive resp

"We're gratified with the positive response to our efforts to attract students who will be successful in their studies at Albright and who, by their presense here, will enhance the very nature of this college community," commented Dr. Eugene S. Lubot, vice president for academic affairs.

Freshman enrollments are fifty-four percent ahead of last year," Lubot said. "Credit for the upturn is attributable in considerable part to the implementation of new financial aid procedures which are more user friendly."

Central to the new procedures are an early assessment of individual need, a 'walk

through' of the aid measures available to each prospect's family, and the options which ensure that an Albright education remains an affordable option to all qualified students regardless of need.

"Our efforts have been guided by the fact that there are many parents involved in the college admissions process who recognize

One of the first women to graduate from umbia University Law School, Kennedy has been in the forefront of the fight for equal rights for over a decade. In her speech, she urged students to get involved in the government. "You can have impact on the world no matter who you are, she said. "What

are you going to do to change the world?" Kennedy began her lecture which was entitled "Racism and Sexism in the 1990's: We've Contribution; Service Above Self and Administrator's Awards. There are no set numbers for winners in each category.

Lynn Yeakel was the apparant winner in Tuesday's Democatic Senate Primary according to a survey of voters.

Yeakel, 50, who runs a fundraising organization, upsetted Liet. Gov. Mark Single to become the democatic nominee for the United States Senate. According to political analyst, Yeakel's victory was the result of her television advertisement that reminded people of Senator Arlen Specter's forceful questioning of Anita Hill during the Clarence Thomas nomination hearings.

Yeakel received strong support from educated, high-income voters, and women under age 60. Her stand on women's issues, education, and the economy also propelled her to a

Yeakel will now go on to challenge Specter. Specter, a two-term incumbant won over his rival State Representative Stephen F. Freind for the Republican nomination.

Multicultural Experience?

I would like to respond to your article, "Multicultural Experience," regarding the visit of Mrs. Michelle Leonard, a Native American. I remember the evening as something less than a multicultural triumph and left feeling somewhat annoyed. First of all, the fascinating anthropological aspects of Native American cultures were quickly passed over and Mrs. Leonard rushed through her slides (too many) almost without commentary. Instead, we were treated to a standard multicultural diatribe-which, with theme and variations, has been given by Jamake Highwater, Peggy Sanday, the Gay Couple, and sundry professors and visitors to campus: the evils of the White Man. Mrs. Leonard also gave us a long list of directives on how to treat in a "sensitive" way the topic of Native American culture in the classroom. The only one I remember, save for avoiding the three stereotypes, was no jokes and humor. She further asserted that there were 50 million NativeAmericans in the territory of the continental U. S., who were reduced by disease and warfare to less than 200,000. I learned (circa 1965) that there were one or two million, who were reduced to 200,000. Could the subsistence economy of those cultures, based mostly on food-gathering and hunting, support that many people? Her intent was to stage an exaggerated comparison with the Holocaust, which Winston Churchill called "the greatest single crime in the whole history of mankind." I think one can adequately stress theoppression one's people have suffered without such inadequate parallels and without going into super-whine. Far from being erased from the earth, as the Nazi would have had it with theJews, the image of the American Indian plays an enormous role in the American imagination (and always has), and recently I have seen three films about Native American culture all very good: Dance of the Wolves (politically correct), TheBlack Robe (politically incorrect) and Thunderheart(difficult to say). Elsewhere, contemporary middle-class values seem to have made themselves felt in the way in which she understood her own people. Thus, we learned that Indian women wrought their own better pottery for cooking (as opposed to contemporary man-made designs) and that divorce was easy: an Indian women merely

removed the unwanted male's belongings from the dwelling. All this was presented with a prissiness and moralizing, which is no longer found in advanced feminist circles, and which made the Victorian era seem almost unaffected. Educated Guess: Without ever cracking a book, I think examples could be found of women being used as a medium of exchange in cementing alliances, familial power, or inacquiring "sons." This is typical in pre-capitalistic economic formations (and even later); Jacob had to serveLaban seven years for Rachel's hand in marriage (Genesis 29). Women's rights cannot be seriously considered apart from their economic empowerment in the work place. Mr. Toscano, you also forgot to attend to the delicious bit of scandal: Mrs. Leonard, upon my allusion to JamakeHighwater, flatly stated that he is not a real Native American, but rather a Greek! Horribile dictu, this handsome man is from the very loins of Western civilization. Now who is responsible for bringing that fake Indian to campus? I fear that the hegemony of multiculturalism -- an educational ideological which has come under ferocious attack in the mass media-both on campus and in the Humanities curriculum is fostering a climate of intellectual irresponsibility in"representatives" of minority groups who come to campus. From the continuous parade of these visitors, we have learned that the "West is a sinking Titanic (Jappake Highwater), that Western culture originated with the "Twah" tribe in Africa that the early Church condoned same-sex marriages, and that main-stream American culture is racist and repressive (PeggySanday). Such opinions, departing as they do, from widely-and even internationally held assumptions, require a lot ofevidence and rigorous argumentation. This has not been forthcoming. What is worse, the hege mony of multiculturalist thought on campus is fostering an atmosphere of intellectual dishonesty, particularly among the faculty, who rather than testing these and other ideas in public, are eager to show "solidarity" with the politically correct, to "raise the consciousness" of students by these "experiences," more often are eager not to seem antagonistic, "old-fashioned," bigoted,or even "racist."

Despite the fact that everyone was very helpful, Albright campus was very difficult to traverse. Science Hall was totally inaccessible, Teel Hall can be entered through the backdoor, and the door to the elevator in Masters Hall requires some delicate manuevering to get through. The Sub is

almost impossible to enter, and the ramp to the Campus Center is blocked when there are meetings in South Lounge. If you have class in the Chapel, forget it -no elevators. Selwyn Hall is out of the question, and you can only get to the first floor of the library. The only ways to get on campus are around the Center for the Arts (a rather steep incline) or around

for the Arts (a rather steep incline) or around Teel Hall. These are only a few of the difficulties a handicapped student would have to face here at Albright.

Some may ask, "Who cares?". After all, there are no students in wheelchairs at Albright. Yet, when you consider our age group and the associated statistics about accidents and the associated statistics about accidents and injuries, it's not all that unlikely that one of us could be disabled. If that were to happen, even with the helpfullness of the students and staff here, you would probably have to transfer just to be able to attend classes.



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












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

TB On the Rise

Tuberculosis (abreviated T.B.) sometimes is seen with romantic eyes. After all it is the favorite disease of "operatic heroines" and "sensitive poets", as some people see it. Usually this view includes the image of the turn of the century sanatorium, a place where people afflicted with T.B. would go to rest (for a long, long time) and recover from their illness. A place up in the mountains (because of the clean air) or in Europe somewhere would do. As such, this disease could be considered not much worse than an extended vacation.

The only problem is that T.B. used to take over 100,000 lives every year until the middle of this century. And now, it is back, despite the hopes that the disease was under control or maybe even close to erradication (at least in the U.S. and other industrialized countries).

Three years after Dr. Louis Sullivan, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, set the year 2010 as the target for the elimination of the disease, there has been an outbreak of a strain of the tuberculosis bacillus that resists conventional drug treatments.

Tuberculosis is caused by several species of Mycobacterium. In man it is usually caused by the human and bovine varieties of the bacillus (M. Tuberculosis and M. bovis, respectively).

The first type of infection is caused by the former and is the most common. This infection occurs through the respiratory route directly from another infected person and has the greatest effect on the lungs, although it can spread to the lymph nodes, the bones and joints, the skin, intestines, genital organs, kidneys and bladder.

The second type is caused by the latter, and has become increasingly rare. The primary mean of infection is bovine milk, and the almost universal pasteurization of milk prevents this form of contamination from

enjoying any success. When it does occur (such as in a recent case of a limited number of contaminations from deer), it primarily affects the bones and joints, although it too can spread.

There is no specific cure for T.B., but the best results come from combining bed rest, drugs and surgical removal of parts of affected organs. Several drugs, most of them discovered in the 1940's and 1950's, are available, and most effective when used in groups of three or four to prevent the formation of drug resistant strains.

Symptoms of the disease, such as lack of energy, weight loss and persistent cough, usually appear in late stages of the disease, making it hard to diagnose and treat a patient.

Other difficulties encountered in the treatment of T.B. include:

 Unavailability of some of the drugs necessary for treatment and lack of research into new drugs, because of the view that it was not economically feasible;

-- Duration of treatment, which can take up to three years of daily dosages up to a dozen different medications a day (at least people are not confined to sanatoriums like they used to — yet. There are proposals to start confining problematic patients in reopened sanatoriums, since many of the legal mechanisms that were used to do that fifty or sixty years ago still exist.);

— Unwillingness of the main groups affected by T.B., the poor, drug addicts and immigrants, to submit themselves to the rigorous treatments necessary:

rigorous treatments necessary;

— Complications resulting from the association of T.B. with other diseases, especially those that affect the immune response of the body, such as AIDS;

— Ineffectiveness of tests for detecting tuberculosis in persons with AIDS or in those who have taken the B.C.G. vaccine, against tuberculosis.

Robo Bugs

Electronics has taken yet another step forward in the art of robotics. Well, at least a tiny step forward. It all started as a vision 10 years ago for Johannes Smits, a material scientist from Boston University. For him it was a dream that would take along time to study, develop and create. But now, the first prototype had finally been created; hence, the birth of the micro bug.

Smits creation is a tiny robot about one fifth of an inch long. This micro - robotic wonder can either be mounted with a sound sencing device, a small gripping mechanism, or an extremely small camera. Amazingly enough, the whole works can be run off of a tiny solar cell battery located at the posterior part of the micro bug's body. But with all the extraordinary things that can be attached to this tiny carrier, the most amazing is how it how it actually carries these things.

After long years of research, Smits had conquered the art of piezo electronics, a branch of electronics studying the behavior of certain metals, such as zinc oxide or quartz oxide, under different voltages of electric currents. In his studies Smits found this line of electronics the ultimate way for his tiny

creation to get around

Using piezoelectronics, very small bursts of electricity will be sent into each of the six legs to fasion sort of a weeble wobble way of moving. These bursts will be maintained by the central prosessing unit located at the center of the tiny machine.

By manipulating the current that actually travels to the tiny legs, the minute micro bug can turn to up to 90 degree angles.

All programming can be done by either direct programming into the CPU of the robot, or loud bursts of sound which can be detected with an added sound detector.

An additional note, the reason for the mimicking of the six legged insect instead of a quadropod is naturally for balance. Because of this, the tiny micro bug will not be easily detracted from the task at hand.

But, you might ask, what could that task possibly be? Well, because of its minute size, armies of these tiny crawlers can be sent to do a variety of things such as: Picking up an disposing of radioactive dust particles, destroying a harmful insect in a farmers crop, checking for leaks in pipes or a variety of other things that objects larger than a fifth of an inch just cannot get at.

As of now, though, the prototype is still being modifed, and the tiny world of the micro bug will not be perfected for a few more years.

COUNSELING CENTER: MEN'S ISSUES PROGRAM

This year a new program has been developed by the counseling center to focus on men's issues. The purpose of the men's issues program is to address societal issues which are effecting males and which impact on both genders, to educate both genders on specific male issues, and to provide a safe environment for those males who wish to explore significant issues in their lives. The men's program on this campus is not a political movement, but a psychosocial movement intended to raise male consciousness in terms of their identities, their relationships with women. The program intends to present a variety of perspectives on male gender identity.

What are the ssales that are currently facing men? The major issue is the definition of masculinity and the process by which men are socialized in our society. We have defined our sense of masculinity and self-esteem based on our role as protector and provider. In looking at gender identity development, theorists in this area of study have found that traditional masculine behavior norms which tend to be unemotional, all-knowing, self-reliant, and most powerful have resulted in a shorter lifespan for males, larger number of physical health problems, and an increase of mental health concerns. Other, and more specific issues of crucial concern for men deal with such things as self-concept, intimacy, trust, friendships with men, relationships with women, father/son relationships, careers, sexuality, initiation rites into manhood, childrearing, fatherhood, violence against self, men, and women, homophobia, dual career

couples, substance abuse, and intergenerational isolation. Besides these internal gender concerns, men have also been effected by the repercussions of women seeking their own identity and of rion-European men seeking their own restructuring of the hierarchy system. Thus, the men's issues program at Albright College seeks to provide activities such as group discussions and workshops which will explore some of the above issues of masculinity and assist students in developing healthier attitudes and viewpoints on masculinity.

During the 1991-1992 academic year as part of the men's issues program, the following services were provided. Group discussions were provided for students dealing with issues of male gender stress, differences in gender communications in relationships, and lifespan roles. Dr. Michael S. Kimmel, sociologist and leading authority on men's studies, helped raise student awareness and interest in this topic by delivering a presentation on masculinity as part of an experience event. In addition, one of the better known regional men's journals, Wingspan, has been made available in the library and in the sub. Finally, an off-campus television appearance at Kutztown University concerning issues of masculinity and relationships provided an opportunity to address and to develop

connections with other students and

professionals.

In an effort to assess the major issues toonfronting male students at Albright College, a survey was conducted of the male student population during the Fall 1991 semester. Ninety-five of the thirty-seven item survey were returned. The following issues were found to present the most concern: identifying/planning life goals, making decisions and solving probelms, communication, self-esteem, AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases, developing and maintianing satisfactory relationships. These issues will be addressed via events, programs, workshops, and group experiences.

This past year has been one of network building, and program development. The upcoming year will include continued program development, further networking and resource gathering as well as the creation of a student male discussion group. Those of you who have an interest in our program please feel free to contact me. I welcome the opportunity to share information and ideas.
