Rev. Robert S. Smethers, Jr. Named To Fill New Position

Pastor To Coordinate Fund-Raising Project

The Rev. Robert S. Smethers, Jr., pastor of Immanuel Evangelical United Brethren Church, Reading, has been named to fill the newly-created position of director of church and community relations.

In his position as director of church and community relations at Albright, he will present the services, needs and other interests of the college to groups and individuals in the supporting territory of the EUB church. The coordination of fund raising as it affects the church, industry, and the alumni annual giving is another of his major functions, according to Dr. Harry V. Masters.

Rev. Mr. Smethers will begin his duties May 1, announced Dr. Masters. Currently serving as president of the Greater Reading Council of Churches and formerly president of the Reading Ministerial Association, Rev. Mr. Smethers came to Reading from the Fleetwood Emanuel EUB Church.

The Rev. Paul Price, pastor of Calvary EUB Church, Mohnton, presently serving the college in a part-time capacity in church relations, will continue with the same responsibilities under the title of EUB student solicitor.

During the course of Rev. Mr. Smethers' pastorate at Immanuel, a \$156,000 rebuilding debt has been reduced to \$7,000 in six years. An enlarged lay participation policy in all phases of church administration has been established. Monthly family night programs and Sunday evening youth organizations have been emphasized.

Rev. Mr. Smethers received his A.B. degree from Penn State in 1938 and the B.D. degree from the Evangelical School of Theology in 1941. He was licensed to preach by the East Pennsylvania (Ev.) Conference of the EUB church in 1939. He has done graduate work at the Mt. Airy Theological Seminary.

A total of \$10,800.75 was pledged by Albright students during the recent student campaign, announced Terrence Connor, '51, campaign director. Goal for the campaign, which was part of the Centennial Development Fund to raise \$900,000 for needed campus improvements, had been set at \$10,000, and is earmarked for a Minor Sports Room in the Physical Education Building.

She expressed her feelings at being appointed as, "Not too excited—excitement will come when the appointed day arrives." Currently finishing her first year of studying the French language, Mrs. Englert plans to do a great deal of sight-seeing while in Paris.

New Post Meets Need

The appointment of the Rev. Robert S. Smethers Jr. of Immanuel EUB Church to the position of Director of Church and Community Relations on the administrative staff is another step in bringing about a closer relationship with Albright and the supporting churches of this conference area. The Board of Trustees upon noting that similar positions were being filled at other EUB supported colleges felt that the creation of this new post would serve as another integral link between the college and the community.

Among other duties Rev. Smethers will visit numerous EUB churches in Pennsylvania and will be available for sermons and discussions with the pastor, Young Peoples', Brotherhood, and other church groups. In these discussions he will show the Albright film and answer any questions which may arise as to the operation of the campus. During the summer months he will also visit church camps and may thereby closely co-ordinate all the members of the Albright-EUB Family.

Serving in this position, Rev. Smethers will be closely associated with the Centennial Fund Project. Since the EUB Church has granted Albright the over-all sum of \$500,000 it will be his job to solicit and correlate the individual pledges from the church membership. He will also be in charge of arranging long range plans for bequests from the churches.

Devoting full time to church-community relations, Rev. Smethers will be working with the Rev. Paul Price who has been and will continue to work part time on the campus as an EUB solicitor.

We feel that the addition of this office will be a valuable asset to the campus and will bring about a well integrated relationship between church, community and college.

A Message To Day Students

The grand opening of the day-students' mixer lunch period took place on Valentine's Day, and since then we have not seen very many masculine hearts around. At first, this mixer period appeared to be a success because of the novelty. Then slowly, the male students began to return to their former haunts, and the co-eds found themselves alone once again.
