TOLD BY AN ALUMNUS

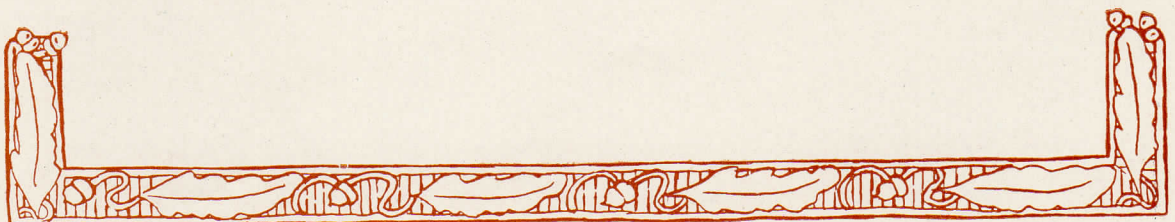

A word of commendation is due the able Committee which made the event possible. Miss Lena Tobias was the Senior Head of the Committee; Mr. Earl R. Shappel, Manager. The dances were under the capable supervision of Miss Grace Faust and her assistant, Miss Ruth Ott.





Model Assembly of the League of Nations

Princeton University, March 27-28, 1931



Albright College was represented by a delegation of six students and a faculty adviser at the Model Assembly of the League of Nations at Princeton in March, where students from twenty-seven colleges and universities of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania gave a realistic portrayal of the actual workings of the League at Geneva. The Albright delegation, representing the Union of South Africa, was as follows: Kathryn Kutz, Douglas Cloud, Arthur Ericksen, Russell Hiller, Lincoln Kenney, Sydney Hoffman, and Professor Milton Hamilton.

The first plenary session of the Assembly saw the election of a president as well as an attempt of certain countries to place additional questions on the agenda. The attempt of Italy (Vassar) to force a reconsideration of African boundaries was thwarted by South Africa (Albright) when Mr. Cloud's motion to table was passed. The action of the latter was praised by Mr. James G. McDonald in his final critique of the sessions.

Three major questions were then discussed in Committees. That which dealt with the Polish Corridor produced some fireworks when Poland withdrew in protest, only to be cajoled for the final session. Messrs. Hiller and Kenney were members of this committee. Mr. Hoffman spoke effectively in the Committee on the United States of Europe, and followed this with an address before the Assembly. Mr. Ericksen worked with him on the committee. Miss Kutz and Mr. Cloud played their part in the Committee on Disarmament.

In the final plenary session the work of the Committee was placed before the Assembly by their respective rapporteurs. It was discovered that little could receive the unanimous vote necessary for passage, but the debate and procedure proved interesting. Some of the speakers showed considerable knowledge of international questions as well as forensic ability.

In any such report as this the social side is not to be slighted. The hospitality of Princeton was generous and highly appreciated. Banquets and other meals were served in the dining room of Madison Hall. The men were comfortably housed in the undergraduate clubs, and the ladies in faculty homes. A formal dance on Friday evening was generally attended, and the delegates were well pleased with the courtesies shown them. All returned enthusiastic supporters of the Model Assembly and of Albright's continued participation.



Washington-Lincoln Essay Contest

The Washington-Lincoln Memorial, established by the Alumni Association of Albright College, sponsors an annual Washington-Lincoln Essay Contest which is open to members of the Freshman class.

The first prize of five dollars in this year's contest was awarded to Stewart W. Kinsey, whose essay dealt with the excellence of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Paul M. Fye received the second prize of three dollars for his essay which had for its theme the death of Lincoln.

The winning essays were read in chapel where Dr. Teel awarded the prizes.



Junior-Senior Oratorical Contest

The annual Junior-Senior Oratorical Contest was held in the chapel on Monday evening, April the twenty-seventh. Professor H. William Voigt presided and Robert Arnold of the English Department of Senior High School, the Reverend Mr. Loefferts Loetscher, and Mr. Charles W. Matton, attorney-at-law, served as judges.

The oration, "Men of Vision," delivered by Harry A. Klingeman, '31, won the first prize of fifteen dollars in gold. Mr. Klingeman stated that "progress in all ages has come with men who have been able to visualize what lies before them."

The second prize of ten dollars was awarded to Miss Hazel Hill, '31 for her oration, "Social Justice, an Unsolved Riddle" in which she said that "between the two paths, the one socialism, the other our present situation, lies a great abyss, wherein is found the unsolved riddle of social justice."

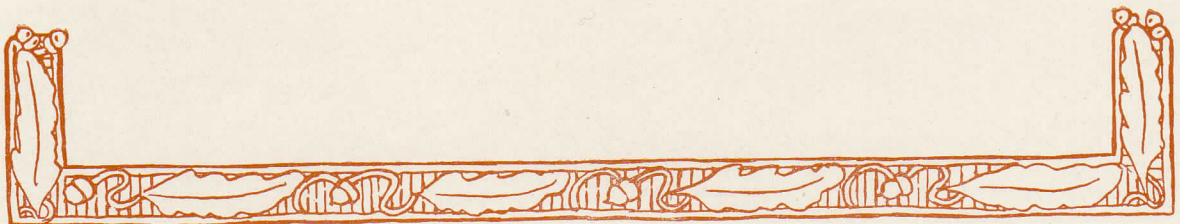

FOOTBALL RESUME



In early September Coach Al Julian made his first call for football candidates. Fifty huskies responded, and from that group was developed one of the strongest teams in the history of the school. Although he had a tough task on his hands in replacing such men as MacFarland, Petrolonus, Neff, Snyder, Lilley, Vince Boyle, and Peckham, Julian, nevertheless, had excellent material in his old men with Captain Ding Schaffer playing at guard, Franny Hatton at center, Abe Karlip at end, Hal Carney back at tackle after a brilliant season at guard, Yank Emmett at quarter, Larry Hatton, the man with the educated toe, who with Charlie Haines was mentioned for All American, at halfback, and Hal Weigle, star of the 1929 Lebanon Valley game, at fullback. Smash Seesholtz, a veteran guard, was unable to do much playing because of an old injury. His place, however, was capably filled by Johnny Kozlowski, the fighting Pole. Herm Suydam at tackle, and Art Daub at end completed the team that was to go through the most strenuous and successful season of Albright's existence, and win for itself the name of "The Iron Men."

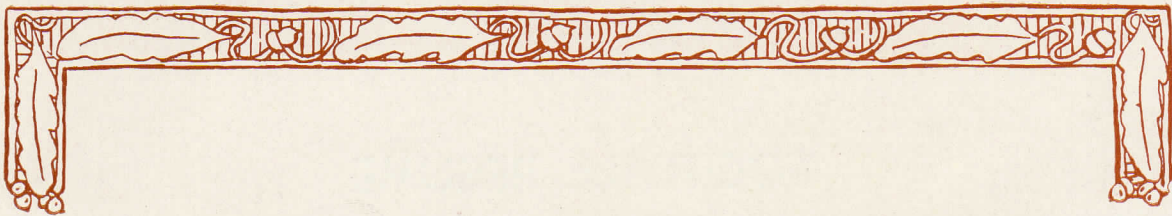
It is not to be thought that this great team came to the fore overnight. There were long, hard drills in which much experimenting was done before the "machine" was running smoothly enough to satisfy the exacting Julian. Too much credit cannot be given to him for the masterly method in which he developed this group of players into the team that was to blaze the name of Albright throughout the sport world.

It would be difficult to pick a star on this unique team, for everyone starred in his particular position. It was a perfect "machine" which worked with clock-like precision that represented the school in every game. It was this perfect cooperation which accounted for the success of the team. Although Albright's line was outweighed in the majority of games, it proved itself the equal of any. Even the heavy Bison line of Bucknell found itself pitted against a demon. The school was fortunate to have two capable punters in Larry Hatton and Charlie Haines. Seldom was the team out-distanced in the punting game.

This was Julian's last year of coaching for the Red and White. Though it is with deep regret that Albright sees him leave, yet she extends her best wishes for the success of him who has made a record upon which he can look with pride.

THE 1930 FOOTBALL TEAM

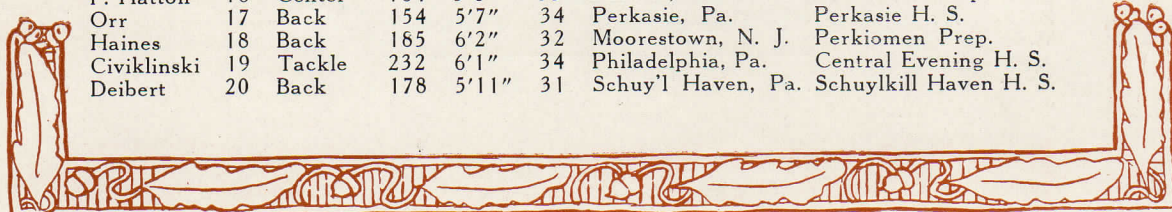

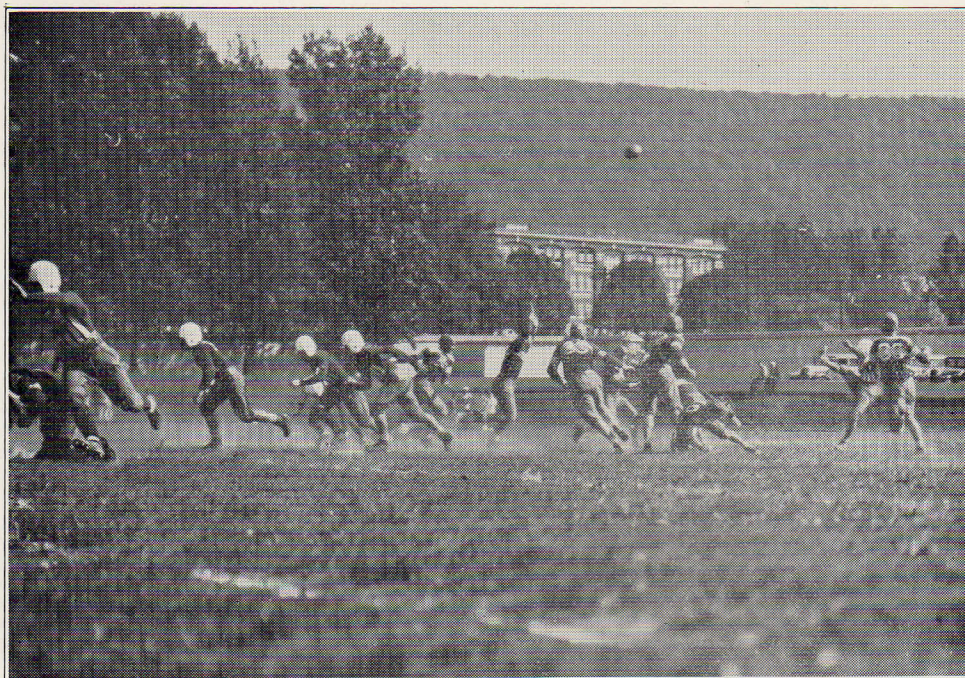

ALBRIGHT vs. CONNECTICUT AGGIES



THE SEASON

The Lions opened the football season by clawing the game from Connecticut Aggies by a 19-0 score. Albright was slow to start, scoring nothing in the first half, although the pigskin was but a foot from the Aggies' goal line when the whistle blew.

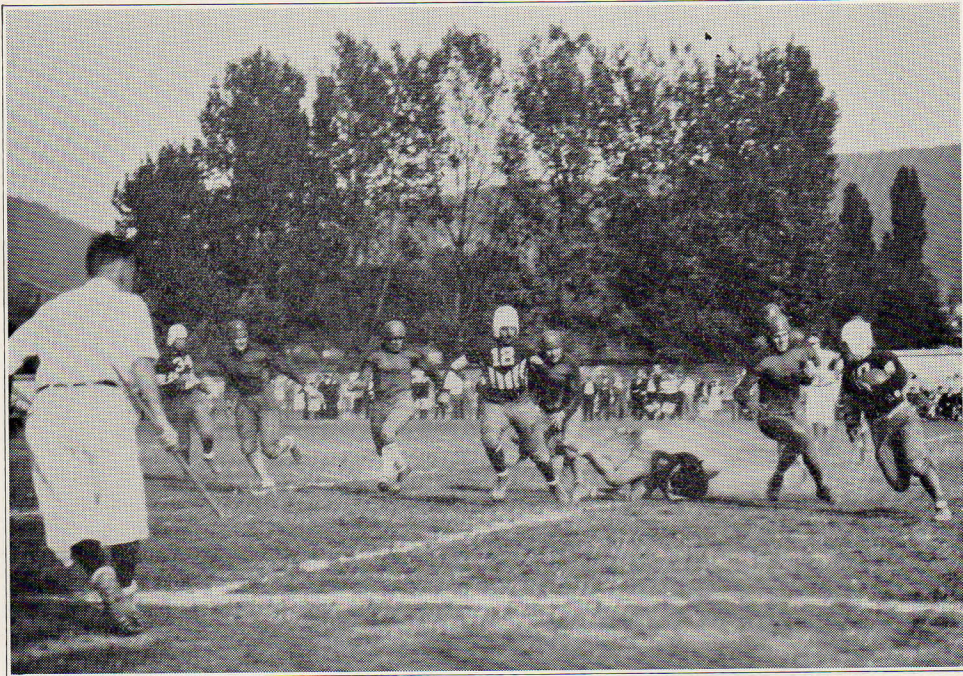
With the injection of Hino and his fast running and passing attack a renewed spirit was apparent during the second half. A baffling assortment of aerial and running plays put the ball within scoring distance, and Orr carried it over the first counter. From this time on the proteges of Julian had little trouble with their heavy opponents, and two more touchdowns were scored before the game came to a close, one coming at the end of the third quarter and the last in the fourth period. A forty-five yard pass. Hino to Andrews, scored the second touchdown, and the third was scored by a line plunge, with Purnell carrying the ball.

The veterans played their usual good game. Weigle's line-bucking was a feature of the offense. Emmett drew the crowd to its feet when he intercepted a pass and side-stepped his way down the field for forty yards before being downed. Karlip thrilled the fans by the uncanny method in which he pulled several passes out of the air. The entire line played a bang-up game throughout, and threw the "Farmers" for losses on many occasions.

After this victory the Lions were ready for another, but things happened differently. They were given their only set-back of the season by the powerful Bucknell Bisons. The Lions' heavy shock troops started the game and the Bisons took advantage of a heavy wind to score in the opening minutes of play. Hinkle went over the line on an off-tackle slice and Brumbaugh followed soon after with a seventy yard run for the second score. The light but speedy Varsity then relieved the second team, and Bucknell knew that it had real opposition. The ball see-sawed up and down the field, until a poor kick against the wind again gave Bucknell the ball in scoring territory and Mezza went over for the third score, ending the half.

Going into the second half, the Lions thrilled the crowd with their fierce, tireless marches down the field, only to be repulsed at the enemy's goal line through fumbles, intercepted passes, and poor officiating. Hinkle intercepted one pass and ran sixty yards for the fourth touchdown, making the score 26-0. But the Lions never gave up. First down after first was completed, and only bad breaks kept the fighting-mad Albright

team from scoring. Albright's light line clearly out-fought and out-gained its heavier foes, and its backs brought cheers from the Bucknell stands with their display of grit and fight. Albright scored eighteen first downs to Bucknell's eight.

But the Lions were far from becoming pessimistic about this defeat as was shown in the next game on the schedule. They had expected a tough time in the encounter with Mt. St. Mary's, but they had not overrated the strength of the Jesuits. It took a last desperate march in the closing minutes of the game to out-point the strong Maryland eleven. The Lions outplayed the Jesuits, scoring twenty-one first downs to their six, but a strong defense held the Lions off when the goal-line was threatened.

The first half ended without a score although nine first downs had been made by the Red and White team. At the closing of the third period, Weigle flipped a pass to Karlip, who ran thirty yards for the first score. The try for extra point was blocked. The Jesuits went one better in the fourth quarter when Edelen shot a long pass from his own forty yard line into the arms of Fearn, who went over to tie the score. Valibus drop-kicked the extra point and Mt. St. Mary's took the lead 7-6. With only five minutes to play the Lions staged a fighting, crashing offense that could not be stopped. Emmett, Haines, and Weigle carried the ball to the enemy's goal line with four successive first downs, and Haines smashed through for the winning score. Weigle's placement was wide, and the game ended. Franny Hatton, Captain Ding Schaffer, and Johnny Kozlowski played well on the line and Haines, Weigle, and Emmett featured in the back-field. Weigle's passing and line bucking were particularly effective.

Next the Lions found themselves in the game with Pennsylvania Military College. Here the smoothly running Julian machine crushed down all opposition to score a victory of 42-7 over the cadets. A strong wind and over a hundred yards in penalties kept the score from being even higher. P. M. C. was unfortunate in losing Captain Warran, its star, through injuries inflicted the day before the game. Albright's line was the feature of the game. Running plays were continually thrown back for losses, and on the offense wide gaps were opened in the Soldiers' line to put Albright's fleet backs into the open. Franny Hatton, Art Daub, and Herm Suydam were effective. All the backs were supported by brilliant line work, but Larry Hatton and Charlie Haines were continually in the fore with their spectacular broken field running.

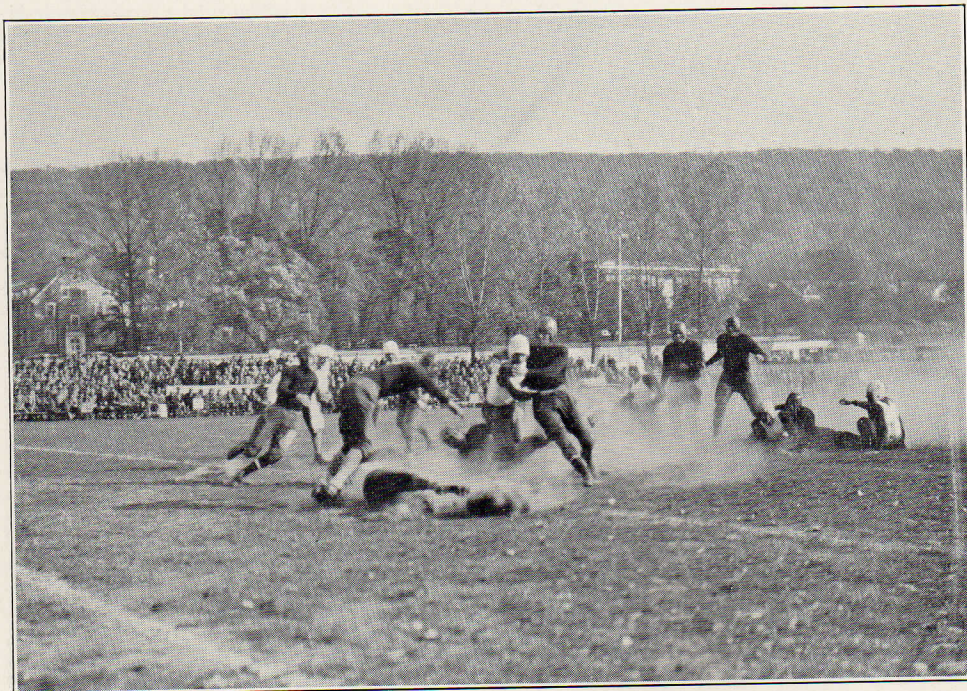


The first quarter was scoreless. In the second quarter steady gains by Hatton and Haines, a pass by Weigle, and a ten yard jaunt by Emmett made the first score. Hatton kicked the point. A forty-five yard run by Hatton gave the second score, Weigle bucking the point over. Weigle then made a forty yard run to the five yard line and took the ball over for the third score. Hatton's try for point was successful, and the half ended 21-0 in favor of Albright. The second half was a repetition of the first with Haines scoring two touchdowns and Orr another. Hatton kicked his fourth consecutive extra point and Haines also kicked one over the bar. The Cadets' lone tally came as the result of a blocked kick, while the second team was playing. Redmont ran to the twelve yard line where latesta pulled him down from the rear, but Yoseo skirted the end on the next play with a triple pass, and scored. Kern added the point with a drop-kick.

A score that almost rivalled this one was rolled up in the exciting game with the Philadelphia team. Playing on a cold, wind-swept gridiron, which made passes and kicks hazardous, Albright beat St. Joseph's to the score of 35-6. The game was marked by sixty yard runs by both Karlip and Larry Hatton, the former intercepting a pass, and the latter starting from scrimmage. Larry also continued his sensational extra-point kicking by running his record up to nine straight.

The first quarter went by without a score, but the smooth-working Lions ran up twenty-one points before the half ended. The first came when Hal Weigle crashed through from the four yard line after Karlip had fallen on a fumble. Charlie Haines added the next six points with a buck from the one yard line after a long march that was characterized by a twenty yard run by Yank Emmett and two passes, Weigle to Karlip, that netted forty yards. Hatton climaxed another long march with the third touchdown as the quarter ended. Abe Karlip started the third period by intercepting a pass and galloping sixty yards for a touchdown. Hatton added the point. The latter created some excitement in the last period when he side-stepped his way around the Hawks' secondary defense, cantered sixty yards for the last touchdown and then booted his fifth straight point of the game.

St. Joe's lone tally came in the third quarter, when a fumble and a kick against a strong wind gave them the ball on Albright's thirty-five yard line. A pass, McNabb to Morris, put the ball on the eleven yard line, while Albright's bucks and a five yard penalty put the pigskin on the one yard line, and Kane scored after two futile attempts. The kick was blocked. Another victory was added to the list!

Now all eyes turned toward Davis and Elkins, the next team to fall before the Red and White of Albright. The powerful "Scarlet Hurricane" from West Virginia forced the Lions to accept the defensive throughout the first three periods of the game, but the tables were turned in the last quarter when Larry Hatton booted a beautiful sixty yard punt that went out on the Southerners' five yard line. Corzine, Davis and Elkins triple threat man extraordinary, was forced to kick from behind his own goal line. He kicked to Hino on the thirty-seven yard line, who returned it to the thirty. A penalty gave the Lions a first down on the twenty-five yard line, and Charlie Haines smashed tackle for another first down on the fifteen yard line. Haines, Hatton, and Weigle carried the ball on repeated short thrusts at tackle for small but precious yardage, and Weigle put the pigskin on the one yard line. Haines took the ball on the next play, and went through tackle for the lone touchdown of the day. Larry Hatton then calmly booted his tenth consecutive extra-pointer across the bar and the score stood 7-0, favor Albright.

Too much credit cannot be given to the line. Play after play was stopped at the line of scrimmage and Corzine seemed to be the only man able to gain. His line bucks reminded one of Harry Knorr, but Corzine must have outweighed Harry by twenty-five pounds. Art Daub played a wonderful defensive game, and the rest of the line was right in there with him. The boys who played "down where the grass is short" out-fought and out-gamed their heavier and more experienced foes throughout the entire game.

In the next event Albright romped over a huge George Washington University team, scoring five touchdowns to the Generals' 0, with three extra points to boot. The score, however, does not indicate the character of the game. The boys from Washington, D. C. actually outplayed the Lions in the first period of the game, and several times were within scoring distance only to have the Red and White team brace and take the ball on downs. The opening of the second quarter saw Larry Hatton take a lateral pass from

Charlie Haines and out-race the Senators' secondary for sixty yards to a touchdown. Hatton kicked the extra point, making it twelve straight he had booted. Weigle's intercepting a pass was instrumental in the next score, Haines going over soon after on a hidden-ball play. Hatton's string of consecutive extra-point kicks was broken when the ball, which was headed straight between the bars, was knocked down by an opposing linesman who had broken through.

The second half saw Weigle break through the center and gallop fifty yards to put the ball on the Senators' ten yard line; and to show his versatility, he threw a pass to Haines, who stepped over the line for the third touchdown. Weigle missed the point. Soon afterward Weigle flipped another twenty-yard pass to Haines, who ran forty-five yards for a touchdown. Norris, replacing Hatton, made the extra-point by a line buck. The last period saw some exceptional open-field running by Stan Hino, a Freshman, who had replaced Emmett at quarter. He ran one punt back sixty-five yards to be thrown out on the ten yard line, and he then fought over the line on the next play, for the last touchdown of the game. Weigle kicked the point. A few moments later he ran another punt back seventy yards for a touchdown but was called back because a penalty had been incurred by a teammate.

The game of the season was next on the list. A great Albright team rose to supreme heights to tie an undefeated and untied Western Maryland team 7-7, breaking that team's string of twenty-three straight victories. The teams were evenly matched, each having several scoring chances but lacking the punch to put the ball over. The Green Terrors gained more yardage from scimmage than did the Lions, but Larry Hatton, who had held off Davis and Elkins with his educated toe, more than made up for this with his long punts.

The first score of the game came in the first quarter when Hatton, using a tricky reverse play, raced thirty yards for a touchdown, and then place-kicked the extra point. This was made possible by a quick kick by Haines that had rolled to the Terrors' four yard line, where Captain Schaeffer fell on it. Doughty, kicking behind his own goal line, punted poorly, and Emmett took the ball on the twenty-nine yard line. Two plays later, Hatton went over for Albright's lone tally.

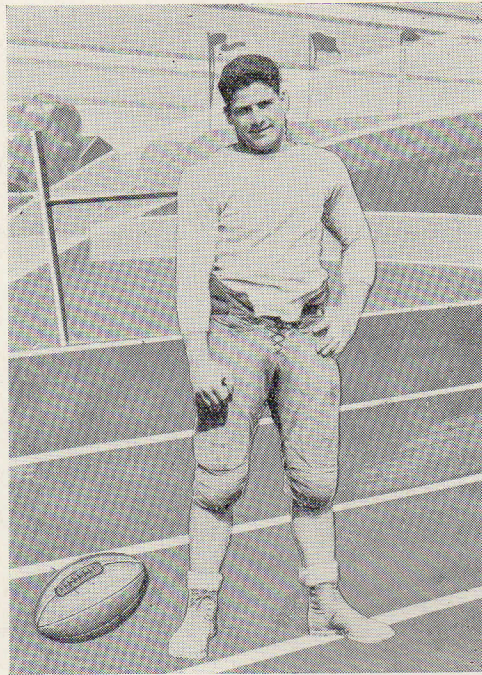

For the rest of the game the ball went up and down the field, both teams playing wonderfully, until with three minutes to play Western Maryland got its break. With the ball on the thirty-five yard line, near the sidelines, and third down, Hino, who had replaced Emmett, elected to run the ball to the center of the field and to kick on the fourth down. Hatton's punt was blocked, and the proteges of Dick Harlow had the ball on Albright's twenty-six yard line. Clary and Jones carried the ball to the thirteen yard line for a first down, and Lawrence skirted the end for another first down on the one yard line. The second line buck, with Clary carrying the ball, was successful and Lawrence made it 7-7, with a perfect drop-kick. The game ended with the ball in mid-field.

The Lions finished the season by defeating their old rivals Lebanon Valley, to the score of 12-6. The game had few thrills, Daub of Lebanon Valley giving the crowd the biggest one with his sixty-five yard run for Lebanon Valley's lone tally. Albright scored in the first quarter when Larry Hatton took a lateral pass from Haines on Lebanon Valley's eleven yard line and crossed the goal line unmolested. Although pushed all over the field for the rest of the half, Lebanon Valley's scrappy club would not stay down, and before the half ended they succeeded in tying the count 6-6 when Daub juggled a lateral pass and finally tucked it under his arm to continue his way down to Albright's goal line, sixty-five yards away. Several Albright men let him go by unmolested, thinking he had gone out of bounds.

The only score in the second period came when Larry Hatton ran thirty-five yards for a touchdown just before the end of the third period. The fourth quarter saw Coach Julian throw in his entire second team and later part of his third team. Excepting the Bucknell game, when the second team started, this was the first time Julian had removed his Iron Men wholesale, unless injury to one had demanded it. The fresh men played well and were in scoring distance when the whistle blew ending the game and finishing the greatest season Albright has known on the gridiron.

BASKETBALL RESUME

Albright's basketball team emulated the excellent achievement of the football team by completing the most successful season in the history of the college.

With but one week of preliminary training the team traveled to Easton where it met defeat at the hands of Lafayette with a score of 43-38. The men again showed their lack of training when Rutgers handed them a 39-24 set-back at New Brunswick two days later.

The Lions hit their stride, however, when they met and defeated Kutztown, Princeton, and Ursinus by these respective scores: 41-23; 34-25; and 42-24. St. Joseph stopped this winning streak at Philadelphia when its team beat the Albright court men 30-24. Then, after beating Gettysburg at Reading 65-40, the Lions evened the score with St. Joseph's men when they came to Reading. The score was 45-31.

Opposing Drexel at Philadelphia, Albright played a great game to beat them 40-34. Franklin and Marshall was next to fall before the accurate shooting of the Red and White team. The score was 39-32. The quintet then drove into Scranton to hand St. Thomas its first defeat of the season, and the second in two years, in an extra-period game. Captain "Abe" Karlip scored the only field goal in the extra five minutes of play to win for Albright 38-36.

Bucknell was defeated by a 44-26 score, and then the succession of six victories was broken by Ursinus at Collegeville. Here the men were unable to get together and the game ended with Albright on the wrong side of a 38-35 score.

Lebanon Valley came to Reading and gave the crowd the biggest thrill of the season when it forged ahead by one point with only sixteen seconds to play. But "Abe" turned the tide by dropping in one of his last-minute field goals. He scored three seconds before the game ended favoring Albright 37-36.

The last four games, in which Albright was victorious, were played away from home. Elizabethtown fell 87-38; Bucknell was beaten 64-44; and Franklin and Marshall lost a tough game 37-35. The Lebanon Valley men failed to put up the fight expected of them on their home court and lost 47-39.

This ended the Albright court season with a punch.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM

Resume of the 1930-31 Season

The women's basketball team closed a rather unsuccessful season from the standpoint of games won and lost, but nevertheless it deserves a great deal of credit. The schedule included two of the strongest teams in this section of the country: Beaver, with a large physical education department, and Ursinus, which this year had the greatest team it has produced for some time.

The squad also worked under a great many handicaps. From last year's squad of twelve, only five were left. Of these, four were guards and one, a side center. A complete reorganization of the team was necessary.

Recruits were taken from all classes. The seniors who had stuck to it for several years received their rewards by being given positions on the team. Among these was Maud Sitler who was developing into a splendid forward when illness removed her from the squad. The center material seemed to be concentrated in the freshman class, in the persons of Peg Wittmann and Agnes Bittle.

From this rather inexperienced material, Miss Van Duzer developed the most versatile team that Albright has ever had. There was not a person on the squad who could not fill at least one position beside her regular one, if she were called upon to do so. Captain Porter, the most versatile of all, played every position on the team at one time or another. The first few games were somewhat experimental. Since it was necessary to find a pair of coordinating forwards, Porter and Billy Kutz were changed from guard positions to forwards.

Due to Moravian's inability to play at night, the women's first game was with the Shillington Town Team led by Eva Mosser, Albright's star forward last year. The Beaver game followed. About this time Betty Wanner broke her nose, and Mim Reddig sprained her back. These two were on the side lines when the team journeyed to Elizabethtown and almost brought home a victory. Leah Deck sprained her ankle and was obliged to stay on the bench for about a month—a bad break since Leah's playing was the mainstay of the team. When the Elizabethtown Team played on Albright's floor its game was even better than before. Then came the contest with the strong Ursinus Team, marked by the excellent work of Mary Ellen Venus, a rookie in intercollegiate basketball. The team was further crippled by an injury to Porter's knee.

The team rose to new heights in the game with Lebanon Valley. All the first string players were in condition and Albright led at half time 12-10. A slight letdown in the third quarter lost a wonderful game. The trip to Beaver brought no better results. In practice Peg Wittmann fractured her wrist and was compelled to watch the second Lebanon Valley game in which her place was filled by Agnes Bittle. The season ended with the Moravian game.

Despite the low count of points, the team accomplished something in its clean playing and splendid sportsmanship. With the end of the season Albright loses Ruth Krott, whose guarding has been outstanding for a number of seasons, and Marian Costello, a splendid forward and guard. The squad also loses a warm friend in its mentor, Miss Van Duzer, who leaves a wealth of experienced material to her successor. With this foundation a much better season is assured for next year.

BASEBALL RESUME

A call for candidates for the baseball team found Coach Smith with much material to weld into a team. "Joe" Betz and Bobo Brookes were prepared to take their turns on the mound again, with Larry Hatton on the receiving end. "Pinky" Purnell, Captain of the team, was at his old position at second base, and "Abe" Karlip defended the hot corner. A veteran outfield, Fromm, Cruttenden, and Vickery, assumed its place with the nine. Luke Wenrich, a Frosh pitcher, was the best of the new material, and he quickly earned himself the position of "Ace" on the pitching staff. Hino and Oslislo, both Freshmen, were chosen to hold down short-stop and first base respectively. The reserve men, all of whom were Freshmen, included: Tinny Haynes, catcher, Kennedy, pitcher, and DeFranco, infielder. Andrews was forced to drop baseball for track.

The opening game of the season was dropped to a powerful Seton Hall nine, the score—4-2. Although Wenrich pitched a good game, allowing but nine hits, the home team was able to collect only six base hits.

Bobo Brookes hurled the Lions to their first victory, with Kutztown as the loser. Although both teams had seven hits, the Albright men bunched theirs, to win 11-4.

Dickinson was defeated on its home ground, 4-0, for the second victory of Albright's season. Fromm was the "big gun," collecting three hits himself, one of which was for three bases, and another, made by a circus catch, for four.

In the next game, Lafayette staged a four-run rally in the eighth inning to win 6-5. Wenrich pitched. Hatton and Fromm each gathered two hits.

Albright came back and defeated Bucknell 3-1, as "Luke" again did sensational work on the mound. Fromm added two hits to his remarkable record.

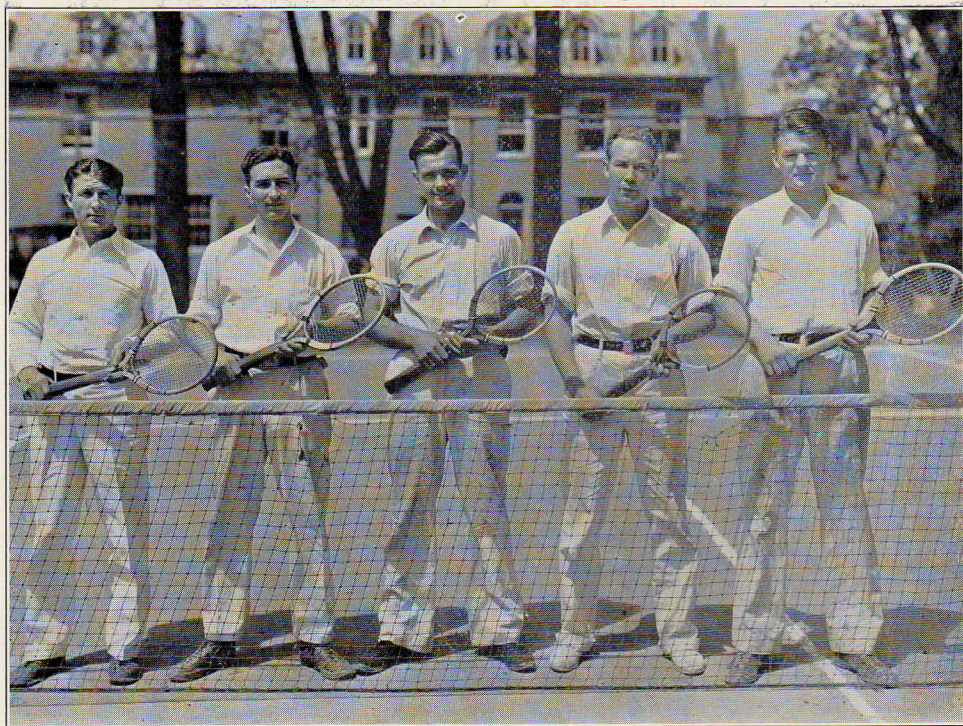

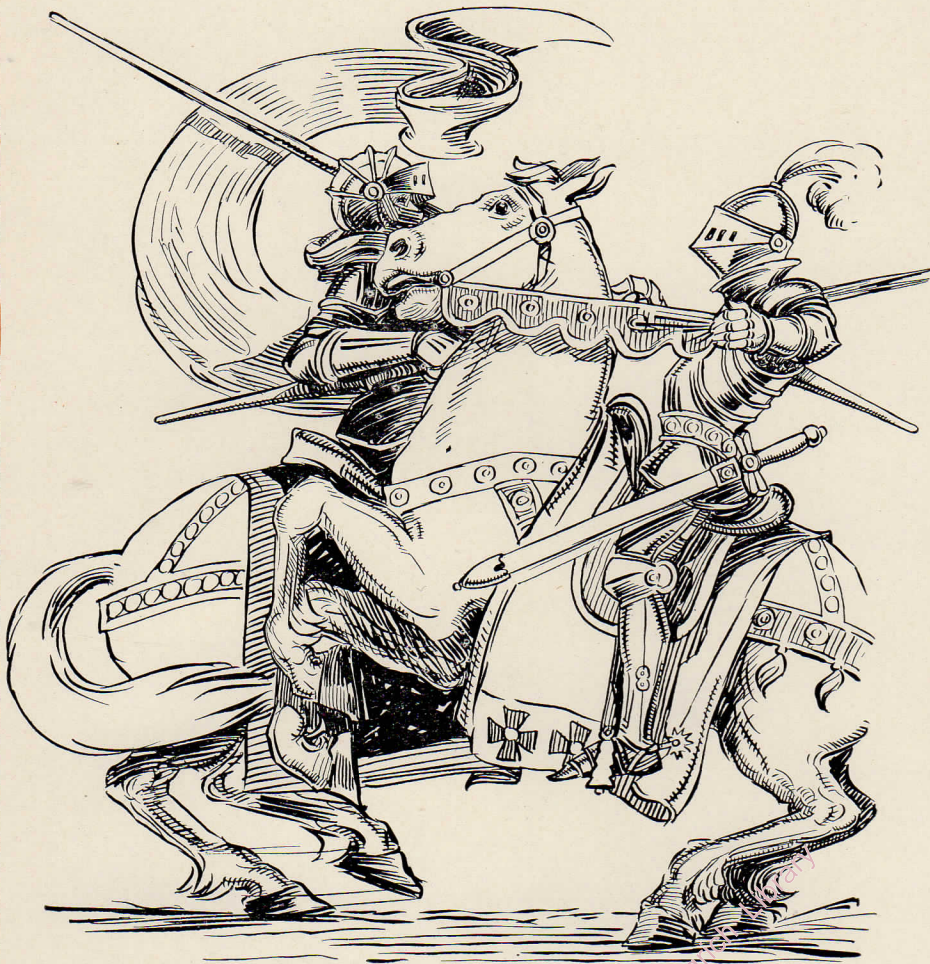

TRACK

Albright's track activities were this year confined to the Penn Relays and the Central Pennsylvania Intercollegiates held at Selinsgrove. The mile relay was unable to place at the Relays, but the Track team, composed of only nine men, placed second in the Class B events at the Intercollegiates, being beaten out for first place by Ursinus.

With its small entry, Albright managed to take four firsts and a tie for a fifth first place, one second, one third, and two fourths. Captain Vickery won the high jump, Bartholomew the mile, Gaskell the 220, Andrews the javelin, and Haines tied with two others for first place in the pole vault. Eddie Andrews made himself high scorer for Albright when he took second place in the 120 yard high hurdles, and Jimmie Gaskell second highest when he added a third in the 100 yard dash to his first in the 220 yard dash. Dittman took a fourth in the discus throw, and Haines scored again with a fourth place in the broad jump. Gaskell's time of 22 seconds flat in the 220 yard dash equalled the meet record.

Social and Moral Influences: High ideals in social and moral conduct are encouraged. The building of noble manhood and womanhood is essential in education.

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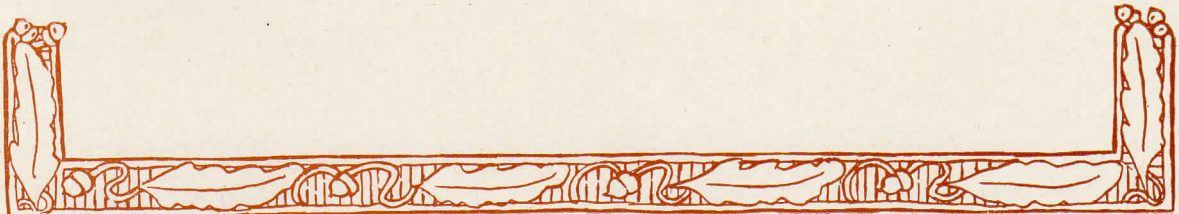
