
## A Message From Our President







#### ALBERT R. AULENBACH


. . . The ribbing in Chemistry lab.

#### THOMAS BARNETT


. . . Anatomy class of '49-50 . . .




#### ROBERT BURNS




#### LELAND LEWIS CAPPEL










## J. ROBERT DEFARGES






## JAMES DUNKELBERGER

## WALTER EISENHOWER, JR.









### WILLIAM EMERICH




#### PAUL H. ESHENAUR

### KATHLEEN M. GUENTHER






#### PAUL E. LEVAN




### BEATRICE SYMON

The highlight of this year's activities was a tour of Western Pennsylvania and New York lasting





With half of the home team carrying Christmas mail, the Rams finally wore down the tired Lions and continued their unbeaten skein.




Still lugging the mail, the hump-back Cats made a futile trip to Lewisburg, to absorb their third defeat in a row.




#### Albright 64—Lafayette 59

A worked-up Lion team brought back a sweet and upsetting victory over Lafayette, Coach Gulian's former coaching position.


#### Albright 74-New York AC 88



### J. V. Basketball


