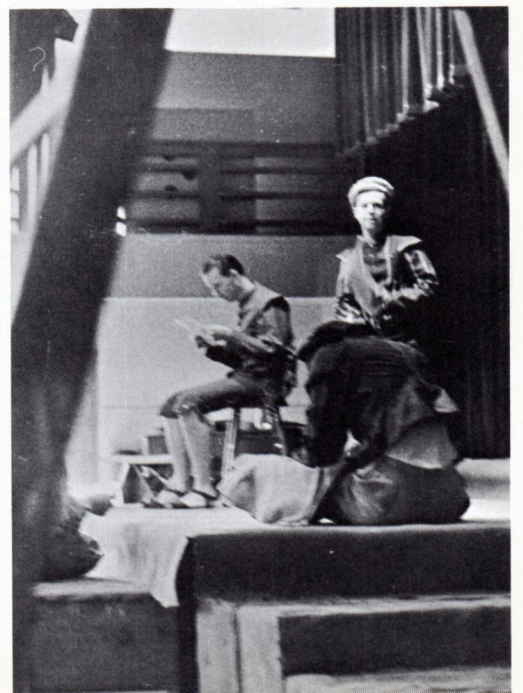

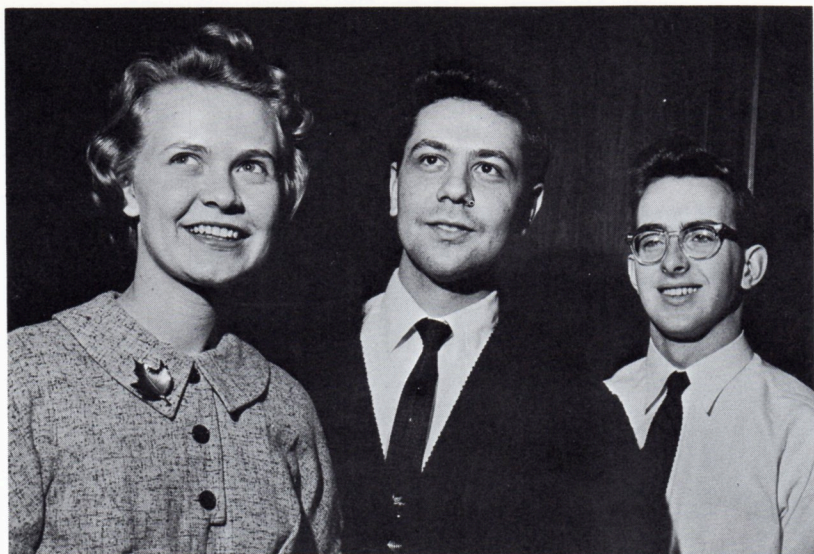

The Albright College Band, under the leadership of Lester R. Yeager, plays an important part in the life of the college.

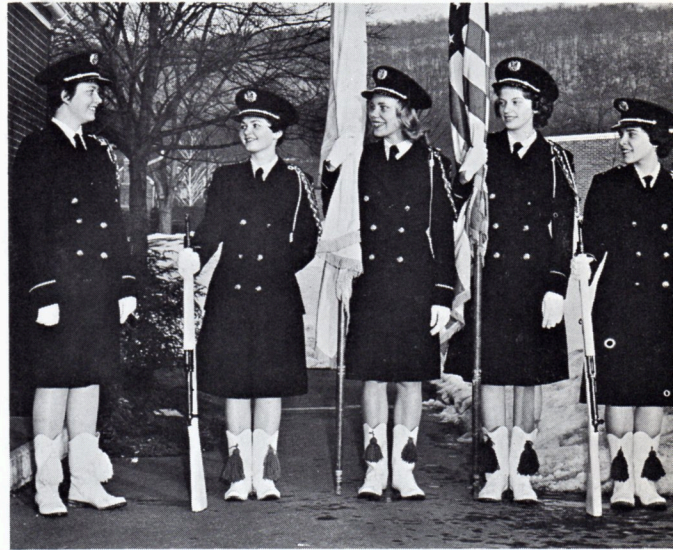
During the football season, the band contributed much to the spirit of the game. The marching band also displayed some of its talent in various parades and other community activities.

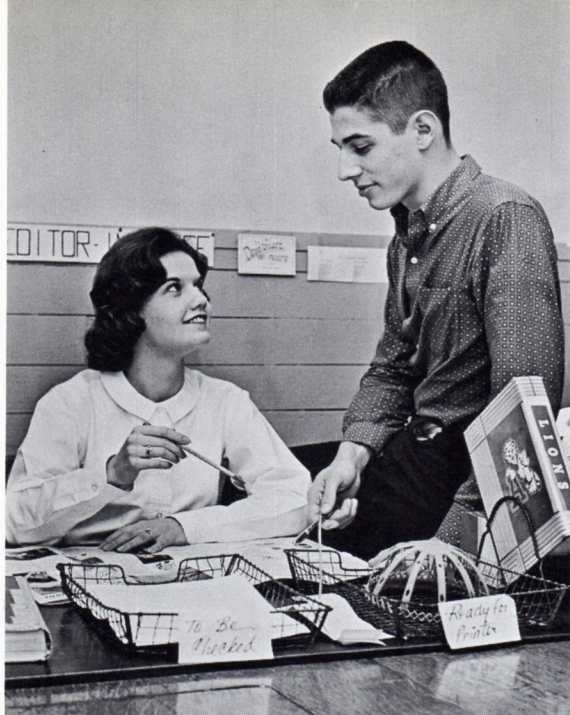


# Albrightian

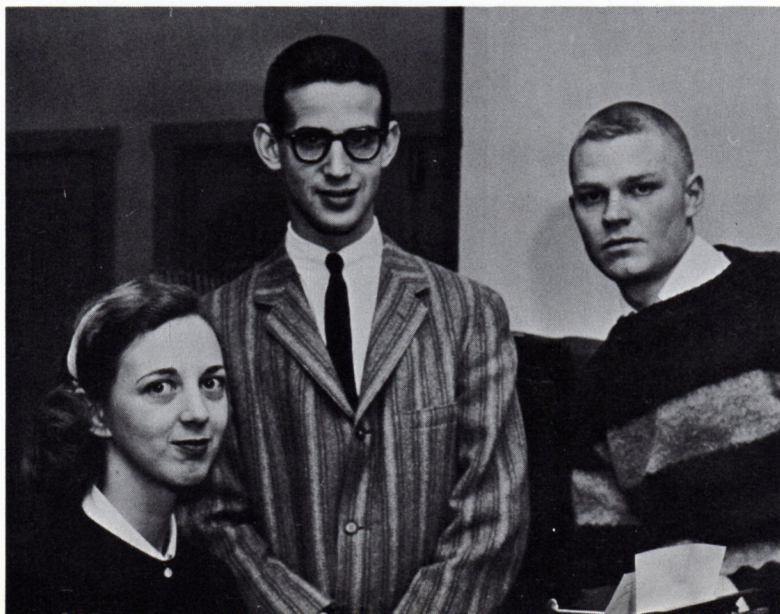

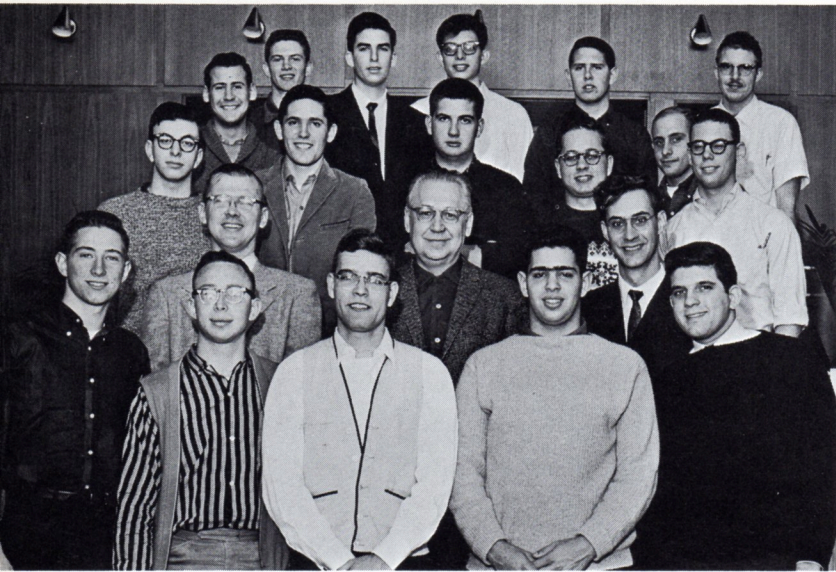
# GREEK INTRAMURALS

## IN MEMORIAM . . .



John Burton

Like the falling of a tall tree leaves a space against the sky, the sudden death of John Burton, the custodian of the Chapel-Auditorium left an emptiness in the life of Albright. Because he made his life an affair between himself and God, between time and eternity, everyone who talked with him found life more exciting and inspiring.

Though John knew how to live on the streets of human life, he was always in sight of a greater way of living. The songs which he always sang while he worked told of another dimension to his life—a vertical line fixed between man and God. He lived in the assurance that each word he spoke was being recorded on God's seismograph, each act was being watched over in Holy Love.

There was a strength of simplicity in John's life, and he expressed his Christianity in countless ways. To students he was patient and kind, even when he felt it his duty to reprimand them for infractions of the rules. Students were persons to John, to whom he gave a good word of faith whenever the opportunity afforded. To all, faculty and students, he was unfailingly courteous and gracious. His loyalty to Albright College equalled or surpassed that of any member of the Albright family. His good humor never failed him because he trusted in a God whose infinite purposes transcended the little annoyances to which our lives are prey. He belonged to the college family as a full participant.

Clearly reflected in his life were the prophet's words: "He has showed you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God."

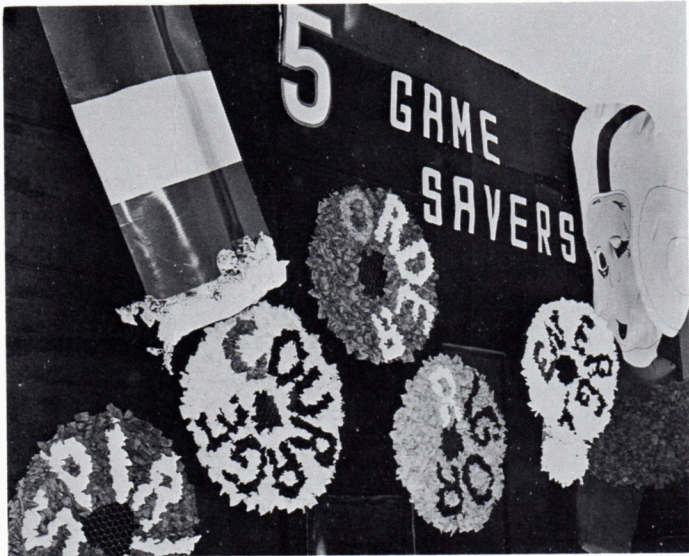

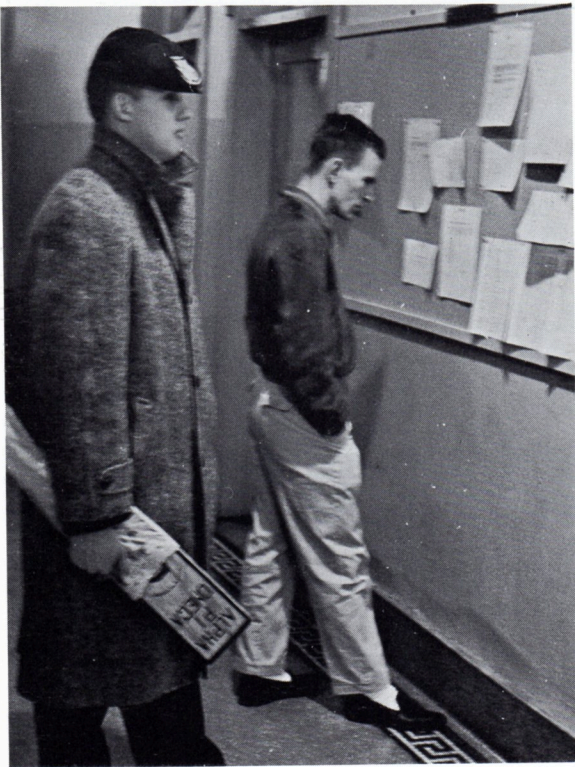

To the graduation seniors, the remaining brothers wish luck in the wide world. Their memories of Pi Tau Beta will be among their most cherished ones.





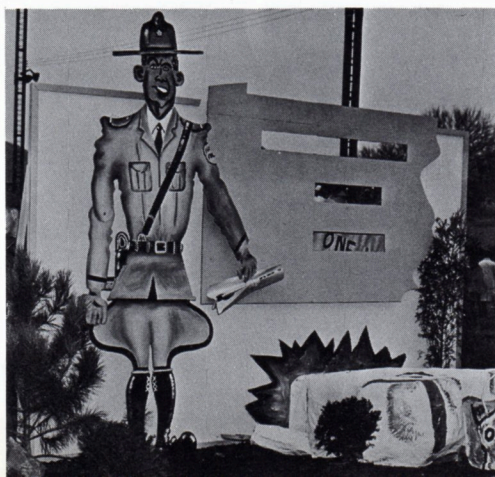

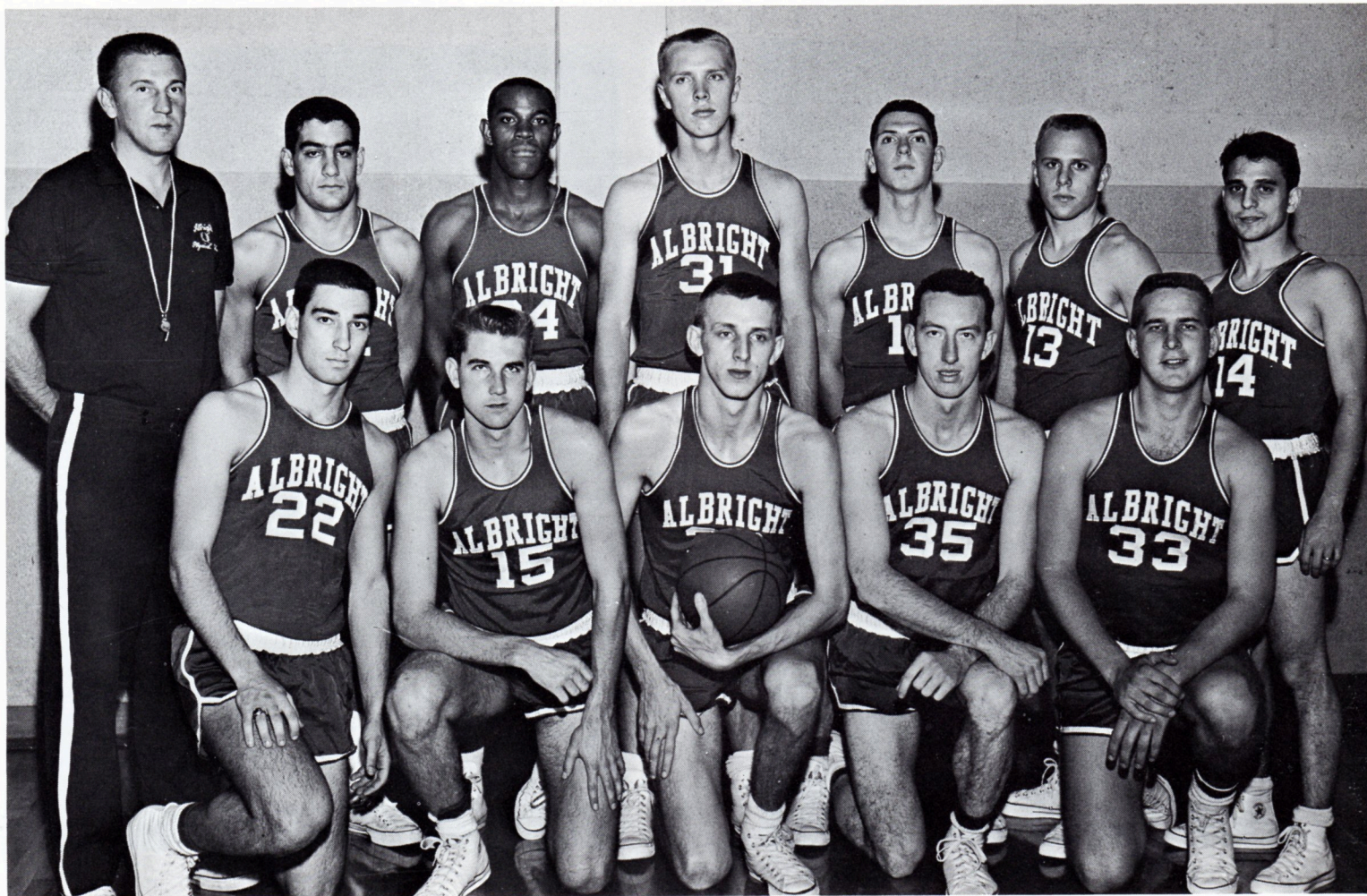








# MAC CHAMPIONS

Albright's roaring Lions made college basketball history this season by winning the school's first Middle Atlantic College Conference Championship. After posting a 14-1 record in the Northern Division of the Conference, Coach Wilbur Renken's team won the conference tournament by beating Haverford and then Hofstra. The team's overall 19-9 performance tied the college record for most games won in one season and the team's total point production in its 28 outings set a new one season scoring record. The team, by virtue of its MAC crown, played in the Eastern Regional section of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Small College Tournament, losing to Mt. Saint Mary's in the finals. Tom Pearsall led the ball club in scoring with a

20.6 average and set a new school consecutive foul shots made record at 35. Supporting Pearsall in this season's victorious squad were seniors Ken VanDine, the team's leading rebounder, and playmaker Sam Preston. VanDine was honored by being selected to the Eastern Regional NCAA all tournament team. Pearsall was named along with VanDine while receiving several other honors: first team all East Small college team, second team all state, and third team Little All-American. Other members of this season's cast included Norm Bautsch, Ted Evans and Ray Sommerstad, who were all instrumental in many of the team's victories, as were the other supporting members of the squad.

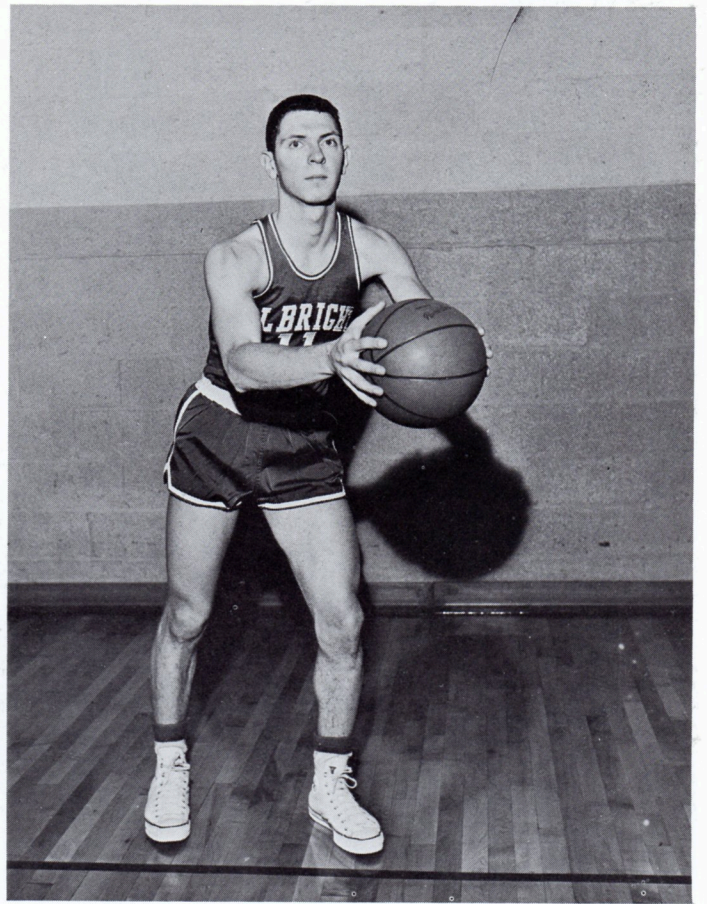

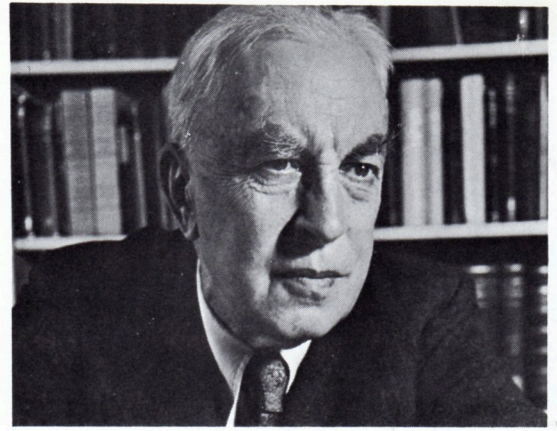

It is in the hope that students might enrich their fields of interest that these programs have been presented.





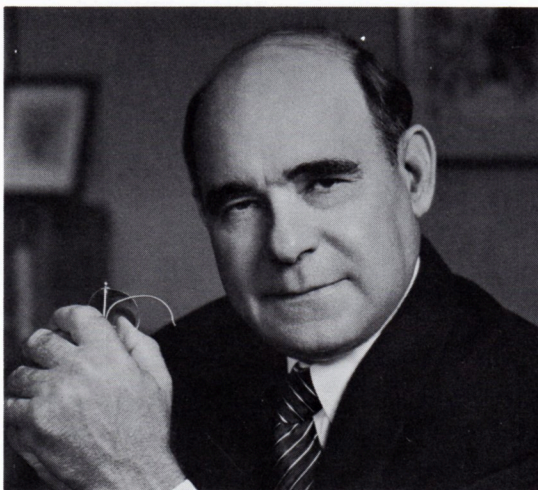

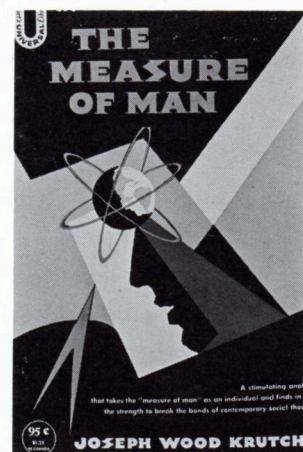

Master of ceremonies for the evening was Robert Matthews.

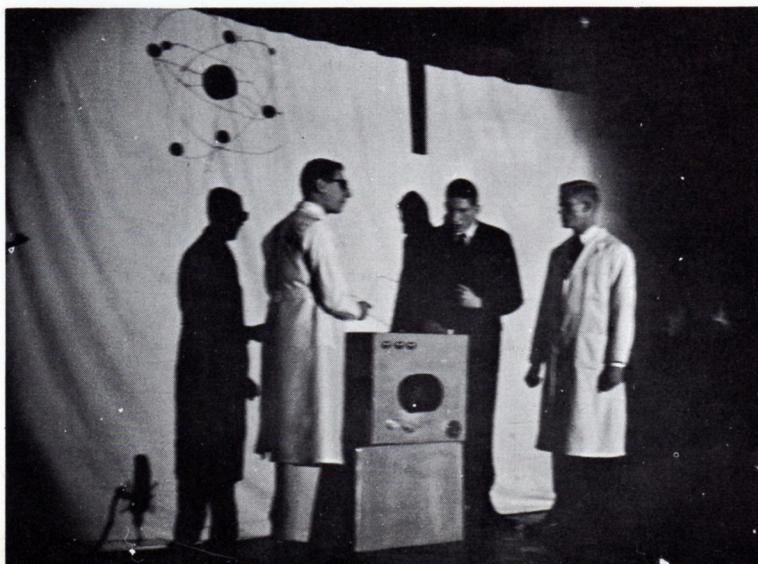


FIRST PLACE—Pi Alpha Tau.

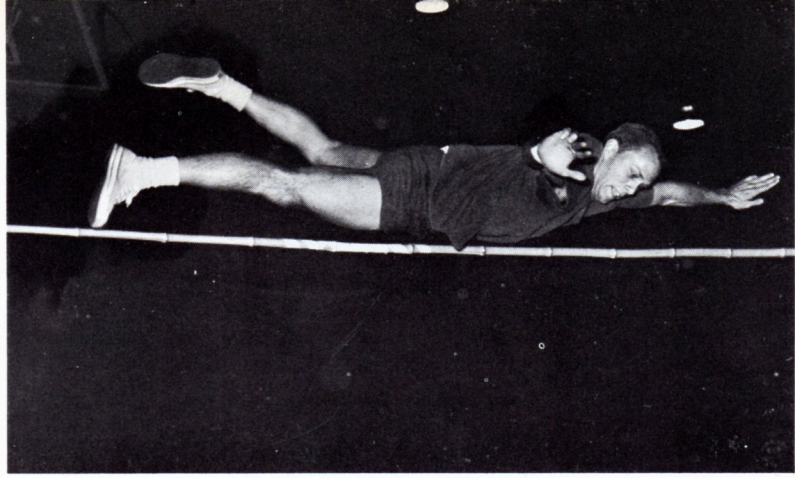


SECOND PLACE—Alpha Pi Omega.

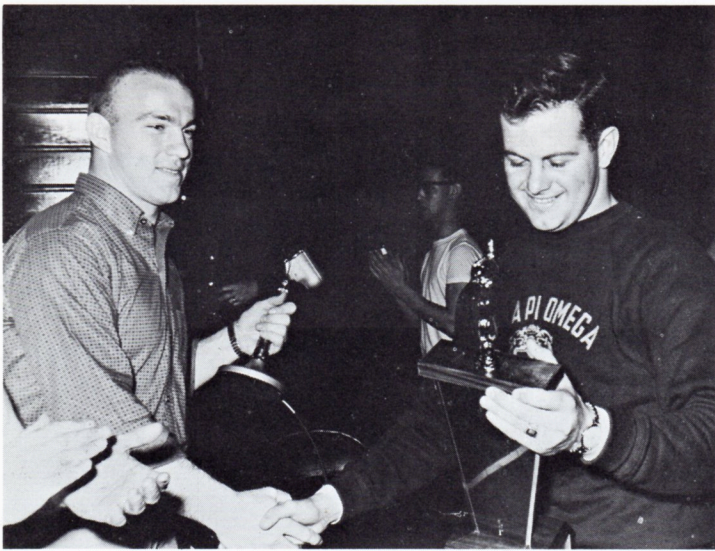

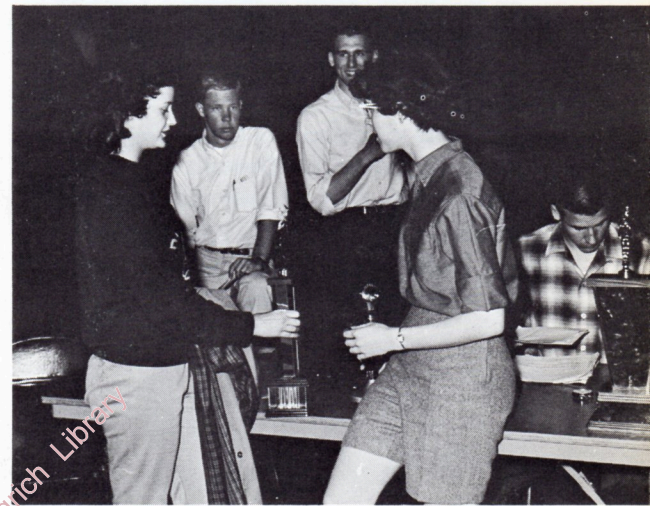

## SPORTS NIGHT

On the night of April 7, 1961, the Albright College fieldhouse was the scene for the annual, competitive Sports Night sponsored by the YM & YWCA's. Those groups participating were: Zeta Omega Epsilon; Pi Tau Beta; Alpha Pi Omega; Kappa Upsilon Phi; Men's Dorm; Daymen; Pi Alpha Tau; Phi Beta Mu; Dorm-women and Daywomen.

The Pats, for the second consecutive year, triumphed in the girls' competitive events. 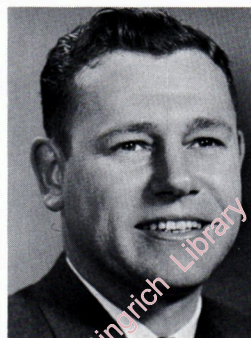

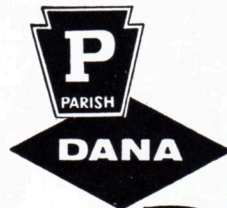
