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



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

which has made them so.












LIONS OVERWHELM GENEVA

BEFORE a crowd of more than 7500 spectators, the Albright Lions opened their 1937 football season with an impressive 20 to 0 triumph over Geneva College. It was the debut of the Red and White's new coach, Lone Star Dietz, and his proteges presented him with a well-earned victory.

Paced by their captain, Dick Riffle, the Lions overpowered and outsmarted the Geneva aggregation unleashing an attack which produced three touchdown

thrusts and lost another only through an untimely fumble.

In the second period a sustained drive of 78 yards produced the Lions' first score. After Riffle had made ten yards on a lunge inside tackle, Al Oslislo broke through the Geneva line for 26 yards on the two succeeding plays. From the Geneva 22 yard line, Riffle gained 19 yards on a lake pass play. Babe Korner, attempting to lug the oval across, fumbled in the shadow of the goal posts, but the Lions' alert right tackle, Ed Cammarota, fell on the ball in the Geneva end zone, thereby gaining the honor of scoring the first touchdown of the season. Bob Rettinger, place-kick expert, added the extra point.

The second tally came in the third quarter after a march of 58 yards. On fourth down with the ball on the one yard stripe, Moose Disend, the Lions' left tackle, pulled out of the line and taking a lateral from Burt Aszman, sophomore fullback, plunged across the goal for the second Red and White counter. Rettinger

again converted the try for the extra point.

Late in the fourth stanza, the third and final touchdown was tallied by Babe Korner who raced 25 yards after taking a 35 yard pass from Dick Riffle.

The Albright team played fine defensively whenever Geneva threatened and kept the Beavers from penetrating beyond the fifteen yard stripe.

ALBRIGHT CRUSHES C. C. N. Y.

Playing before New York experts the Albright Lions put on a spectacle, the like of which Lewisohn Stadium is not likely to see for some time to come. The Lions, led by Captain Dick Riffle who tallied three times himself, defeated the College of the City of New York 34 to 0.

Riffle made history for his alma mater late in the fourth period when he ran 102 yards for a touchdown after intercepting a pass behind his own goal line. The crowd had hardly settled down after Riffle's feat when Mario Nicotera, sophomore halfback, dashed 77 yards for Albright's final score.


The Red and White tallied once in the opening quarter by taking advantage of a recovered fumble and sweeping 58 yards to a score. Riffle counted on a straight plunge through right tackle. Rettinger booted the extra point.

In the second period, Eddie Zelonis, stellar guard, recovered a fumble on the C.C.N.Y. 19 yard line. On the next play, Lovey McCormack passed to Tony Troisi for a touchdown and the Lions led 13 to 0.

The third chukker found C.C.N.Y. putting up a desperate battle and succeeding in holding the Lions scoreless during that session. At the start of the fourth quarter, Albright stopped a C.C.N.Y. drive and then countered with a 45 yard march led by Riffle, Oslislo, and Muller. This was climaxed by Riffle's second touchdown.

C.C.N.Y. came back with their strongest offensive threat of the day, putting on a sustained march of 64 yards. With the ball on Albright's three, H. Stein's fourth down pass was intercepted by Riffle who ran the length of the field to score his third touchdown. Rettinger converted for the second time in the period. A few plays later, Nicotera took Marsiglia's punt on his own 23 and ran 77 yards to mark up Albright's fifth touchdown.

It is significent to note that four Albright gridders, Riffle, Troisi, Cammarota, and Disend, were placed on C.C.N.Y.'s all-opponent team.

BEARS TIE THE LIONS

Albright's undefeated and untied eleven struck somewhat of a snag when they were held to a surprising scoreless tie by the fighting Ursinus Bears.

Despite the fact that the Lions registered even first downs and gained 137 yards from scrimmage, they were unable to manufacture the slightest sort of a tally. One scoring opportunity was muffed when the sun blinded Muller as he was about to take a touchdown pass from Riffle on the last play of the first half.

The Lions completely outplayed the Bears offensively, registering eleven first downs to none and sporting a net yardage gain of 137 yards to none for Ursinus. Riffle, Muller, DeLorenzo, and Oslislo shared the honors on the offense. However the real laurels for the day went to the hard charging linemen and the alert backs of the Ursinus team who kept the Red and White from reaching the coveted scoring territory. The nearest approach which Albright made to the Ursinus goal was

when Walt Zuke, senior end, recovered a fumble on the Ursinus 26, one play before the end of the first half.

While the Lions were rather spotty on the offense, they played a whale of a defensive game. The center of the line led by Disend, Robson, Cammarota, Zelonis, Gustitus, and McCrann was especially outstanding on the defensive. Burt Aszman, sophomore fullback, backed up the line in fine style.

The Lions faced by a five man line were unable to cope with the situation and the Bears, primed for this game, were able to hold the Red and White even. Frequent substitutions failed to produce any change in what seemed an off-day for the Lion gridders. Desperate in the final half, they attempted to uncork a passing attack, but were thwarted by the speedy Ursinus backfield.


ALBRIGHT TROUNCES MORAVIAN

Moravian College's Greyhounds caught the Albright Lions on the rebound from the scoreless tie with Ursinus and went down to a crushing 25 to 0 defeat.

The Lions, sparked by Captain Dick Riffle's brilliant 65 yard touchdown dash in the first period, followed this feat with three more tallies which completely routed a Moravian machine which had always proved dangerous in past years.

The Red and White not only proved a power on offense but also was impregnable on defense, Moravian being unable to cross the midfield stripe once.

The Lions' first score came in the opening stanza when Riffle, carrying the ball for the first time in the contest, sprinted 65 yards to the pay-dirt. The slippery

ball retarded three other Albright scoring opportunities in the first half and the Lions led by 6 to 0 as the third period opened.

The second tally of the game came in the third quarter when Johnny Muller's nine yard dash through right tackle climaxed a 36 yard march. Riffle and Oslislo gave much of the impetus to the drive which placed the ball in scoring position. Disend converted the extra point. Riffle scored the third touchdown on a nine yard run from passing formation.

The final score came in the fourth chukker when Mario Nicotera, sophomore halfback, raced 45 yards to tally and place the Lions ahead 25 to 0.

The Greyhounds were handicapped by the loss of Teddy Mazza, their star back, who was stopped so savagely by Moose Disend early in the first period, that he had to remain inactive for the remainder of the game.


ALBRIGHT UPSETS BUCKNELL

By virtue of their performance against Bucknell on Albright's Homecoming Day, the Albright band of gridiron stalwarts earned the right to be classed as one of the best small college teams in the country. The win over Bucknell in the stadium was a great victory for the team as a whole and also a personal triumph for several members of the outfit who dominated the play.

In the Red and White backfield, the shining lights were Johnny Muller, Dick

Riffle, and Tony Troisi, while Ed Cammarota, Moose Disend, and Jack Robson starred on the forward wall.

Once again Dick Riffle proved he was of All-American calibre and scored the lone touchdown of the afternoon on a short romp around right end in the third period. Johnny Muller's twenty yard off-tackle dash, the longest of the day, placed the fighting Lions in scoring position on Bucknell's 17 yard mark. From this position Riffle carried the ball five times in succession to pay-off territory. Tiny Tony Troisi, the veteran quarterback, ran the team with extremely fine judgment and also aided his mates through his many fine returns of Bill Lane's punts. Ed Cammarota, the sterling right tackle, was a bulwark on the defense and it was he who recovered the fumble which started the Lions on their touchdown march.

On only two occasions did the Bucknell Bisons seriously threaten the uncrossed goal line of the home team. Early in the first period Riffle's fumble on the Albright 22 was recovered by Bucknell and they were placed in an advantageous position. However three line plays and a forward pass proved of no avail and Albright took the ball on downs. Again in the second period the Orange and Blue threatened when Bill Lane, Bucknell ace, got off a magnificent punt which placed the Lions with their backs against the wall. Riffle's punt was returned to the Albright 52 by Lou Tomasetti. A pass, Tomasetti to Funair, placed the oval on the nine yard stripe, but the splendid line play of the Red and White forced Bucknell to relinquish the ball on downs and the last serious threat of the Bisons was halted.

It was a big day for Albright and for the thousands of alumni and friends who literally packed the stadium to see what proved to be an excellent exhibition of football.

LIONS DEFEAT LASALLE

Only through heads-up play and a fighting alertness did the Albright Lions maintain their undefeated slate against the husky LaSalle Explorers.


Although the Lions outgained the Explorers and piled up eight first downs to four for LaSalle, they had to take advantage of two breaks to score.

On the third play of the contest, Williams, LaSalle back, fumbled a bad pass from center, and the alert and scrappy Albright guard, Eddie Zelonis, recovered on the LaSalle 17 to start the Lions on a touchdown march. After Dick Riffle and Johnny Muller had made six yards on two line thrusts, Riffle faked a run and shot a lateral to Tony Troisi who romped untouched across the goal line to put the Lions out in front.

The Lions' longest drive of the game came in the third period when they marched 52 yards only to have their machine stall on the visitors' 15. In the fourth stanza LaSalle made its most serious threat. The Explorers reached the Albright 17 but Dick Riffle came to the rescue and intercepted a forward pass to frustrate the LaSalle effort.

The Lions tallied their second touchdown late in the fourth chukker when Moose Disend, giant tackle, knocked Gidjunis' pass into the air and Eddie Zelonis grabbed it and sped 25 yards for a touchdown. Riffle added the extra point.

Cammarota, Disend, and Zelonis not only proved to be the bulwarks on the defense but also did their share in opening holes for the Lion backs. Burt Aszman



and Riffle were the lads who carried the mail for the most yardage in the Red and White's fifth win of the campaign.

ALBRIGHT DOWNS TRADITIONAL RIVALS

The Albright Lions held in check during a listless opening half, roared forth with all their might in the third period of the traditional game with Lebanon Valley to turn back the invaders 16 to 0. The Valiants who played the entire first half without substitution were unable to keep up their fine defense in the closing chapters.

Though the Red and White threatened several times in the first half, they left the field at halftime leading by only 3 to 0 as a result of Bob Rettinger's place-kick from the 16 yard line. Mike Bonner, Lion end, who will pilot next year's squad, gave Rettinger his opportunity by blocking a Valiant kick on the nine yard stripe. The alert end also blocked another kick in the closing stanza.

The only serious threat Lebanon Valley made during the game came in the second period when Belmer, scrappy Valiant center, recovered an Albright fumble on the 24 and Tony Rozman, dangerous place-kicker, attempted a field goal only to have his efforts fall a few yards short.

The Lions unleashed their power in the third quarter with Riffle going over from the one yard line after a march of 39 yards. On the previous play, the homesters had gained 13 yards when Riffle lateraled to Ted Soja, sophomore quarterback. A little later in the same period the Lions scored again. Burt Aszman tossed a lateral to Riffle who raced twenty yards to his second tally of the game. Rettinger

booted the extra point. This win gave the Lions their third successive triumph over their traditional foes.



ALBRIGHT NIPS THE MULES

Playing before 9000 excited fans, the Albright seniors brought to a close their glorious careers as they barely eked out a 7 to 6 win over Muhlenberg. The Lions maintained their undefeated record by only the narrowest of margins and were scored on for the only time during the season when Stamus, Mule back, tallied in the closing chapter about a minute before the game's end.

The Lions were outgained and outplayed but not outgamed. Riffle, playing his last game, was outstanding on both the offense and defense. In the second period he intercepted Burin's pass on the Muhlenberg 37 and the "Corning Express" was off on his last collegiate touchdown run. Bob Rettinger was rushed into the game and his placement try split the middle of the uprights for what proved to be the deciding point.

The Mule tally late in the fourth quarter climaxed a march of 74 yards. The tricky Red and Gray attack ripped through the Albright line and finally Stamus pushed over for a touchdown. Poust's attempt to tie the score went wide of the posts. The Mules had previously made a drive of 74 yards only to have Riffle stall it when he tossed Gutekunst for a fifteen yard loss.


In the second quarter the Lions threatened when they uncorked a passing attack which took them to the Muhlenberg 16 but a Mule interception stopped that drive.

The triumph of the Lions gave them a season record of seven victories and one tie which is the best slate ever carded by a Red and White gridiron combination.

The record of the senior class is also remarkable in that they suffered only two defeats and two ties in the 28 games they played while at Albright. They registered wins over such noted teams as Bucknell, LaSalle, Georgetown, and Franklin and Marshall and held a vaunted Western Maryland team to a 6 to 6 tie.

It is only proper here to pay tribute to the eleven seniors who have played their last game for their alma mater. The departing stars are Dick Riffle, Tony Troisi, Al Oslislo, Ed Cammarota, Norm Jowitt, Les Knox, Moose Disend, Lovey McCormack, Johnny Muller, Ed Zelonis and Walt Zuke. And so we say farewell and good luck to the finest group of gridders that Albright has ever had.

Basketball

AGAINST the powerful Villanova aggregation, the Albright College hoopsters rang down the curtain on what proved to be a fairly successful season after a rather drab start. The Lions terminated the season in fourth place in the Eastern Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Conference, being preceded only by Gettysburg, Lebanon Valley, and Muhlenberg, and finishing in front of Ursinus, Franklin and Marshall, and Drexel. The basketeers had a league record of six wins as against six losses and defeated every team in the conference except Lebanon Valley at least once.

The Lions played three of the strongest teams in the East in Temple, Villanova, and St. Joseph's, and although playing out of their class managed to put up a good exhibition. The Red and White five appeared on the two double-headers played at the Hershey Sports Arena, suffering defeats there at the hands of Lebanon Valley and Temple.

The Lions proved to be a strong home team losing only three games on their own court while being returned victorious seven times. However eight defeats in nine away games spoiled an otherwise good Red and White record.

The team was severely handicapped through the latter half of the schedule by the fact that Cliff Doremus, star forward and high scorer during the early games, was placed on scholastic probation and declared ineligible for further competition. Throughout the season Captain Al Oslislo maintained his usual steady form and was the keyman of the squad. The club was led in scoring by the flashy sophomore forward, Charley Schwartz. Ray Thorpe and Les Knox shared the center post with

Knox showing his defensive ability to good advantage against most of the teams played. Steve Hydock and Ray McCrann blossomed into scoring threats near the end of the season and show promise of aiding the team greatly during next year's campaign. Johnny Comba, next year's captain, earned a starting assignment in mid-season and filled his post well during the remainder of the season. Among the replacements who gave valiant service were Tony Troisi, Dutch Treida, Harry De-Lorenzo, Hen Czaikoski, and Randy Horowitz.

Al Oslislo, Les Knox, Tony Troisi, and Dutch Treida wound up their college careers the past season and will be missed next year. Despite the loss of these players, the Lions should present a good combination next year as Coach Hino will have seven junior and sophomore veterans from which to mold his club.

The so-called weaker sex seemed athletically minded this year and a girls basketball team was organized. Two games were played, the girls losing to both the Shillington High lassies 47 to 23 and to the Lebanon Valley College co-eds 53 to 21.


Y. M. C. A. Cabinet




Domino Club



Skull and Bone Society





Dramatics

The only existing dramatic group on the campus at the present time is the Domino Club. This organization, one of the most active in the college, has been striving for years to make this campus drama-minded with much care, particularly in the last few years, as to the type of productions given, and, consequently, they are of the highest order. The ideals of the club are a better appreciation of the drama, the development of amateur dramatics to a high plane upon the campus, the expression and development of histrionic talent among the student body, and the work and pleasure that come from such development. The college and the surrounding community have been given the chance to see a high type of Little Theatre productions by these players.

The organization out of which the Domino Club developed was started in 1915 when the group headed by Dr. George W. Taylor, Head of the Business Administration Department, presented several evenings of plays throughout the year. The activity of the club for a number of years was confined to semi-annual productions with an elaborate dinner party each spring. The productions at first were presented in the College Chapel but the group soon found it necessary, because of impressive presentations to move to off-campus auditoriums. It was not until 1935, with the remodeling and renovation of our College Chapel that the Domino Club came into its own in Collegiate dramatic circles.

The term 1935-1936 also marked the dissolution of the Green Guild which for four years had been a feeding group for the Domino Club. With the extension of Domino membership to anyone on the campus interested in dramatic activity and the resources of an excellent Little Theatre, the Domino Club has presented a splendid list of productions ranging from Everyman to O'Neill.

As the renovation seems to mark the rebirth of dramatics on the Albright campus, we will start there to show the high grade of work presented. In 1935-1936 the season was opened with Philip Barry's *The Animal Kingdom* as the autumn full-length play. This production was followed by the introduction of The Annual Passion Sunday Drama Festival when three Mystery Plays of the Resurrection from the old English cycles were presented. The year was concluded with the first annual June Week One-Acters, namely, *Lima Beans* by Alfred Kreymborg, *Riders to the Sea* by John Millington Synge, and Wurzel Flummery by A. A. Milne.

The following year, 1936-1937, the fall full-length play presented was that delightfully pleasant play Arms and the Man by George Bernard Shaw. This was followed by a Mid-winter Matinee comprised of The Host by Ferenc Molnar, The Twilight Saint by Stark Young and George Kaufman's outstanding comedy The Still Alarm.

The most elaborate production to date, a presentation of Everyman as the Second Annual Passion Sunday Drama Festival, followed. For the June Week One-Acters a group of five original plays written by the students of the college were given. They were Fantasie in Talmania by Jeanette Snyder, What Now? by Mary Lower, King Frank the First by John Boland, Moon Madness by Mary Capallo and An Elephant Did It by Victor Hyman.

The 1937-1938 season found the Domino Club reaching new heights in artistic achievement. Not only were a large number of plays given, but the quality and staging effects were improved. Starting with Three One-Acters in October, made up of The Pierrot of the Minute by Ernest Dowson, Before Breakfast by Eugene O'Neill, and The Proposal by Anton Chekhov, the club proceeded to present more plays than ever before. The November offering consisted of A. A. Milne's Mr. Pim Passes By, called the club's most artistic production. In January the Domino Club added to the prestige of the college and community by bringing the world-famous Hedgerow Theatre to the campus in a production of Shaw's Candida. This was the high spot of the dramatic activities at Albright College. Following this outstanding success, the club participated in the Cultural Olympics at the University of Pennsylvania by presenting The Proposal by Anton Chekhov. This was very well received and much praise and prestige was given to the club and the college. Adding success to success, The Terrible Meek by Charles Rann Kennedy, one of the finest things the club has ever done, was presented as the Third Annual Passion Sunday Drama Festival. The season will be completed with an annual presentation of June Week One-Acters.

In 1934 was instituted, the first Annual Greek Festival at Albright College, a day given over to Greek games and general festivities colliminating in an outdoor production of the Antigone of Sophocles. The dramatic festival was a success and since then it has been an annual event. In 1935 was presented Sophocles' The Oedipus Tyrannos, the greatest of all Greek tragedies. The production in 1936 was The Medea of Euripides and in 1937, The Hippolytus of Euripides. This year The Iphigenia in Tauris of Euripides has been selected. These presentations have added much to the dramatic and cultural life of the campus, and we applaud the efforts

of those connected with the Greek Dramatic Festival and hope that the presentation of these plays will lead to the development of an outdoor theatre on the campus.

In the last few years there has been a definite move through the co-operation of the Domino Club toward the development of an active Foreign Language drama on the campus. There have been annual plays by the French club and Christmas and Shrove Tuesday German productions with the anticipation of a Spanish play, all of which leads us to look forward to well-rounded dramatic activity at Albright. With the finest Plays in the English Language brought to the Campus by the Domino Club, Greek plays by the Greek festival, and the development of Foreign Language drama by the language departments, Albright College can be proud of its Dramatic activities. Slowly drama is taking the place which belongs to it—an important part in College life.



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
