Philosophy Club



The daywomen are represented in Women's Student Senate by the Day Council, and in Student Council.



TEMPLE TRIPS LIONS, 21-0

On Friday night, 26 September, the Red and White travelled to Philadelphia for its opener with Temple University. Catching the Owls on the rebound from a loss sustained at Penn State the previous Saturday, Albright went down stubbornly to defeat, 21-0. The work of the defensive platoon was outstanding as Temple's superior reserve strength spelled the difference.

ALBRIGHT 28, LAFAYETTE 6





G-MEN EDGE G-BURG, 7-0

Highlight of the game occurred in the final ninety seconds when Albright gallantly stood off four Muhlenberg attacks on its goal line, and forced the Mules to give up the ball on downs.





DIPLOMATS ON TOP, 20-13

At Lancaster the following Saturday the Lion gridders lost to a powerful Franklin and Marshall club that subsequently went on to finish out an undefeated season. Sudol and DePaul scored for Albright, but the Diplomats, working the option play to perfection, got two quick touchdowns in the final quarter, one set up by a blocked punt, and finished on top, 20-13.

CATS CLAW MORAVIAN, 49-14

Returning home, the Red and White had little trouble downing Moravian College's hapless Greyhounds under the lights, 49-14. Albright scored twenty-one points in the first quarter and thereafter the reserves took over. Seven Lions figured in the tally: D'Apolito, Tenley, Sudol, Krize, Carney, Setticerze, and Czutno.

DUTCHMEN BOW, 21-19

Before 4000 fans in the Lebanon High School Stadium, billed this particular Saturday as the Bologna Bowl, Albright edged Lebanon Valley College in a thriller, 21-19. Both clubs featured a passing game, as the Dutchmen's Lou Sorrentino completed twenty of forty-three attempts and the visitors scored twice through the air, once from DePaul to Eickhoff, once from Sudol to D'Apolito. D'Apolito also scored a second six-pointer and kicked all three points after touchdowns.

RED & WHITE STOPS PMC, 20-0

On Saturday, 15 November, Albright played host to the Cadets of Pennsylvania Military College in the second annual Pretzel Bowl. Rain reduced the expected crowd of 9500 by about half, and flooded the stadium turf into a mass of mud. The poor visibility grounded the vaunted PMC "flying saucer" offense, as the Cadets were held to a net of sixteen yards rushing. Chosen Most Valuable Players on their respective teams were Cadet Bill Applegate and Bruce Tenley.

SCRANTON 7, ALBRIGHT 6

Rain continued to plague Albright football as the Lions and the Scranton University Royals battled in the mud of the stadium the following Saturday. An extra point by Scranton's Sam Just proved the difference after the Royals blocked a Sudol punt and recovered in the end zone. DePaul scored for Albright from seventeen yards out. Wearing the Red and White for the last time in this 1952 finale were Bruce Tenley, Bob Zapora, Blackie Weidman, and Bill Locher.






Double wins were recorded over Moravian, Lebanon Valley, and Dickinson, while a double loss was sustained from Scranton.

TEMPLE 61—ALBRIGHT 54





ALBRIGHT 72—DICKINSON 68



The schedule features five home matches and five away matches. The opener is set for April 15 against the Moravian Greyhounds.



Weidman, DePaul Win State Recognition

Al "Blackie" Weidman, co-captain of the 1952 grid Lions, was named to the Associated Press All-Pennsylvania football team late last November. His selection as first-string defensive guard was a step up for the husky Weidman from the second team spot which he held following the 1951 season.

Based upon the nominations of newspaper sports writers, the AP team is the equivalent, on the state level, of the All-America squads chosen annually by the news press services and several nationally-circulated magazines. This year marked the second time that an Albright athlete was chosen on the all-state eleven. Ace punter Jack Sudol was picked for a defense halfback post on the 1951 squad.

Weidman led a Red and White defensive line which held its opponents to 10.6 points per game.



Mike DePaul, yearling basketball standout, was voted to the AP All-Pennsylvania basketball second team by a committee of outstanding sports writers in the state. As one of the ten best ball players in the Keystone State during the season past, in the opinion of the newspapermen, DePaul ranks with such court greats as All-American Ernie Beck from Penn, All-American Tom Gola and Norm Grekin of LaSalle, and Gus Lovett of Franklin and Marshall.

A little man by modern basketball standards, DePaul was the smallest member of the all-state first and second squads. His tremendous speed, dazzling dribbling, and shooting ability accounted for 585 points during the 1952-53 season, to lead the Lions in individual scoring. He received the Ron Regar Trophy as most valuable player.
