
Homecoming

The team has an optimistic attitude that will be tried out on the courts next season.



Coach Don Gotshall did a great job coaching this awesome team. Congratulations to this superb team in all its accomplishments. The up and coming team will have a hard act to follow.



Women's Cross Country had a very successful season with a record of 7-3. The roster consisted of a group of determined girls dedicated to the sport, who worked together as a group to be on top.







MEN'S SWIMMING


An article in one edition of The Albrightian read, "Almost half way through the outdoor track season, both the men's and women's teams remain undefeated."

















Keeping It All Together



Action Across



President Clinton's point man on health care reform in 1993 was his wife, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton.

When Mrs. Clinton appeared before Congress to implore its members to work with the administration to overhaul the health care system, she got a movie star's reception.

But the talk quickly turned to business.

Representatice Pete Stark, a California Democrat, said he favored expanding Medicare to cover all Americans. He told Mrs.Clinton that his mpther fears that she would be worse off under the Clinton's reform plan, even though it calls for new Medicare coverage for prescription drugs.

Mrs. Clinton, who chaired the White House task force on health care reform, conceded that Stark had a point.

"I have a mother, too," she said, "so if we can't pass the mother test, we're in trouble."


Flanked by forklifts carrying reams of government rules and regulations, President Clinton and Vice President Gore outlined plans to cut, consolidate and reshape the federal bureaucracy.

The president's speech on September 7, 1993, promised \$108 billion in savings by the century's end. "This is an American imperative and we all need to be a part of it," Clinton said.

Clinton's vision of a streamlined government would have 252,000 fewer jobs. Thousands of federal employees would be phased our through attrition, buyouts, early retirement and retraining for private sector jobs.

Six months in the making, the administration's report entitled, "From Red Tape to Results: Creating a Government that Works Better and Costs Less" marked the beginning of what the president said would be a hard fight to change the bureaucracy.





Declaring that "the times are changing," Ruth Bader Ginsburg in 1993 became the second woman to sit on the United States Supreme Court.

At her swearing in ceremony at the White House on August 10, the 60-year-old women's rights pioneer said that "in my lifetime, I expect there will be among federal judicial nominees...as many sisters as brothers in law."

"That prospect is indeed couse for hope, and its realization will be couse for celebration," she added.

Ginsburg, who became the 107th Supreme Court justice, joined Sandra Day O'Connor, a justice since 1981.

Ginsburg won several landmark Supreme Court cases as a lawyer for the American Civil Liberites Union Women's Rights Project in the 1970's. She was the prime architect of the legal argument, radical at the time, that the Constitution usually requires equal treatment of men and women.

The World



On a sunny Monday, September 13, 1993, three American presidents gawked in awe, just like everyone else, at a sudden turn toward peace.

All eyes were on two old enemies in their new roles as peacemakers. Their handshake, the grasp by Arab Yasser Arafat of the hand of Jew Yitzhak Rabin, brought a gasp, a shout, and finally applause from several thousand people on the White House lawn.

A few minutes earlier Rabin's Israel and Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization had signed a peace treaty that once seemed unimaginable. The PLO recognized the right of Israel to live in peace; Israel in turn, recognized the PLO as the representative of Palestinians.

Pope John Paul II used some of the harshest rhetoric of his 15-year papacy to decry abortion and euthanasia during a four-day trip to the United States in August, 1993.


On the last day of his visit to Denver, with Vice-President Al Gore standing nearby, the Pope denounced the "culture of death."

"The culture of life means respect for nature and protection of God's work of creation," John Paul said in a farewell address at Stapleton International Airport that was attended by Gore, a supporter of abortion rights. "In a special way, it means respect for human life from the first moment of conception until its natural end."

When Sheik Omar Abdel-Raham was charged on August 25, 1993, with commanding "a war of urban terrorism" in New York City, he was already one of the most unpopular figures in the United States.

Although his supporters described him as sincere and pious, the blind cleric's radical, anti-Western preaching antagonized many Americans.

The indictment accused him of being the mastermind of a plot to blow up the World Trade Center, which had been bombed on February 26, as well as numerous other targets in New York that never were hit, including the United Nations buildig and the Lincoln Tunnel.

In exile from his native Egypt, he denounced the bombing and denied involvement in the alleged conspiracies. But, he surrendered following a tense standoff outside a Brooklyn mosque. Several of his followers also were charged.

The Action



It was the biggest, wettest story of the summer The floods that washed across the Midwest may have been the worst in American history, and they captured the concern of people across the nation.

The stage for disaster was set during the winter when unusually heavy snow fell. There were not midwinter thaws, so the snow melted rapidly a spring arrived, enough to cause scattered record flooding. And then came the rains. Des Moines for example, logged more than 32 inches by the end of July, compared with 18.7 in a normal year. The casualties ranged from the thousands lefthomeless to investors and consumers in every corner of the United States. Some farm produce prices rose and insurers had to pay out millions in compensation. And Archer Daniels Midland Co. a big, publicly traded grain processor, reported a drop in profits.

An Amtrak train hurtled off a bridge into an inky bayou in Saraland, Alabama, early in the morning of Sept, 22, 1993, plunging its sleeping passengers into a nightmare of fore, water and death.

A barge had struck and weakened the bridge shortly before the wreck, which killed 47 people aboard the Sunset Limited. Some of the victims were trapped in a submerged, passenger car, others in a burned engine.

It was the deadliest wreck in Amtrak's history. 159 people survived, some helped other passengers who clung to wreckage from a collapsed section of the bridge.

Never Ends



Russia, one of the world's great powers, experienced political upheavel in 1993 more typical of a Third World nation.

When President Boris Yeltsin disbanded the legislature on September 21, many of its hard-liners barricaded themselves inside the parliament building in Moscow. Vice President Alexander Rutskoi and others tried to wrest power from Yeltsin in an attempted coup.

But, following Yeltsin's orders, tanks and troops flushed out the defiant lawmakers, many of them old-line Communists opposed to Yeltsin's attempts to move the nation toward a free market economy.

The workd was stunned by the sight of fire raging uncontrolled inside the stately parliament building. When the smoke cleared the rebellion was crushed, and its leaders, including Speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov and former Security minister Vicktor Barannikov, were in jail.

The world was drawn to Somalia in 1992 by photographs of starving children. It ws almost driven away the following year by photographs of fighting adults.

The latter pictures, notably one of a captured American servicemen being dragged through the streets of the capital, Mogadishu, symboized the difficulty a 33-country United Nations force had coping with a country tht had descended into feudalism. Mogadishu was a city divided, with a northern sector held by warlord Ali Mahdi Mohamed, and the south by a rival, Mohamed Farah Aidid. Aidid and Ali Mahdi had united to overthrow dictator Mohamed Siad Barre, whom they forced into exile in 1991. But their ensuing contest for power led to a full-scale war over Mogadishu tht killed 350,000 people in fighting and exacerbated a famine.





The civil war in what was once Yugoslavia moved through its second year at terrible human cost: as many as 200,000 people were dead or misssing, including 10 United Nations relief workers.

The 18-month-old civil war began in 1992 when Serbs rebelled over a vote by the republic's Muslims and Croats to secede from Serb-dominated Yugoslavia and form two separate governments.

Much of the attention in the barbaric war centered on Sarajevo, the long-suffering Bosnian capital under siege by the Serbs. But, life in other communities was even harder.

A U.N. observer described Maglaj, a north Bosnian town of 35,000 that was besieged in June by Croats, as "a shattered town of battered people" forced to live underground. He said, "They spend most of their time in the basements. They look dirty, tired and haggard."

Everyone Sees



It was the year of grunge rock, and a band from Seattle known as Nirvana was among the proudest purveyors of this unadorned, grinding form of rock 'n' roll.

At the 10th Annual MTV Video Music Award on September 2, 1993, at Universal City, CA Nirvana's "In Bloom" won the trophy for be alternative video.

Showing up to accept such an award might have seemed like a bit of a sellout for an avant gard rock group, but Nirvana showed it still had a least one bad boy.

As band members Chris Novoselic, Dave Grod and Kurt Cobain accepted their award on stag Cobain, the lead singer, unbuttoned his pant The camera turned away abruptly.

The show started off as an upstart, but by the time they finished handing out the prime time Emmy Awards on Sept. 29, 1993, "Seinfeld" was a member of the sitcom Old Boys Club. The NBC program took home three trophies, making it one of the night's two biggest winners, along with "Picket Fences."

"Now we're part of the establishment," Jerry Seinfeld, the series' star, told reporters after the program. "We're part of the old guard."

"Seinfeld," which features the comic misadventures of th New York comedian and his friends, was named best comedy series. Michael Richards, who plays the show's self-obsessed Kramer, won as best supporting actor in a comedy. Writer Larry David was honored for an episode entitled "The Contest."

Asked about critics' complaints that "Seinfeld" is a show about nothing, Seinfeld said: "It's a show about everything. That's the same as nothing."






Arrested Development won the MTV Vidoe M sic Awards for best rap video, "People Everyday and the Grammy Award for "newcomer of the year." The hip-hop group also won some attention with a message to black Americans: sper more time and money expressing your Africa heritage.

"Everybody in here can afford to wear some A rican clothes. Don't feel bad about that, becauthat keeps an African person working," Baba Oj the group's 61-year-old spiritual advisor, told a audience at Indiana Black Expo in Indianapoli an event showcasing black accomplishments.

The group, known for the hits "Tennessee" an "Mr. Wendal," also cited Clark-Atlanta Unive sity's "Black Wednesday." Each Wednesday, students wear clothing bought from black-owne stores and make purchases only at black-owne businesses."

What Happens



In a year filled with horrifying news phots from battlefields around the globe, one photo of human struggle brought a smile: a little boy's joust with a huge sumo wrestler.

It happened before a sumo tournament in San Jose, CA, on June 5, 1993. Salevaa Atisanoe, a 576-pound Hawaiian, sumo name, Konishiki, had some fun.

Before the matches, about 20 boys took turns taking on Konishiki, trying to push the huge man around. The boys ended up getting picked up and tossed about like dolls as the crowd roared with laughter.



Nancy Kerrigan, the 22-year-old U.S. figure skater who was among the gold medal favorites at the 1994 Winter Olympics, was attacked after practice on January 6, 1994, by a man who hit her on the right leg with a club or metal bar.

The blow severly bruised her knee and bruised her quadreseps tendon, an injury that could impede her jumping and landing ability.

Within days, an anonymous phone call to authorities pointed to Kerrigan's rival, Tonya Harding, and a few of her entourage.

Harding's ex-husband, Jeff Gillooly, her bodyguard, Shawn Eckardt, and two hired men were arrested.

The The U.S. Figure Skating Association formed a panel to investigate the case, the first step in the process that could have lead to Harding's removal from the team.

On February 23, 1994, Tonya Harding arrived on the ice in Lillehammer to skate and compete in the 1994 Olympics. Nancy Kerrigan was there too, claiming she felt well enough to skate her best.



Kimberly Clarice Aiken, Miss South Carolina, became the youngest woman to win the Miss America pageant.


Aiken, who beset 49 women to win the 1994 title in Atlantic City on Sept 18, 1993, called the honor "very overwhelming for me."

But, the 18-year-old didn't look or sound overwhelmed. Aiken said she liked to wear the rhinestone crown, unlike her predecessor, Leanza Cornett, and immediately announced plans to spend the year working to help the homeless.

"My main goal is to get homeless people off the streets and get people who may become homeless not to be in that situation," she said. "I'd like to make the greatest difference."

Aiken is founder and president of the Homeless Education Resource Organization in her hometown, Columbia, SC, where she worked with homeless children. She has an uncle who was homeless, but Aiken said that was not the source of her interest in the issue.

We Watch



Across the Northeast, the Midwest and larg parts of the South, the extreme cold of Januar 1994 brought an end to the daily routine.

Arctic air with wind chills up to 74 below zerswept across the eastern United States in the wal of a blizzard that dumped enough snow to paralyze several states.

At least 92 deaths have been blamed on the ba rage of cold and snow. Many of these victims we killed on icy roads or had heart attacks shovelir snow, while others froze to death.

Tens of thousands of homeless people sough protection ar shelters, which were filled to c pacity in many areas.

Tens of thousands of people were also without electricity for many days, causing water pipes freeze in homes.

At 4:31 AM on Monday, January 17, 1994, an earthquake of 6.6 magnitude struck Southern California, claiming 61 lives and leaving damage that may total \$30 billion.

Five interstate highways, including the state's major north-south route, and three highways were closed at several points, crippling transportation. Broken aqueducts cut off much of the water supply to the San Fernando Valley, the 260-square-mile suburban expanse hit hardest by the quake. Over 500,000 customers were left without power in Los Angeles County.

Streets were empty during nights of the 11PM-7AM curfew. National Guard troops patrolled against looting.

"The days ahead will also be rough for us," Mayor Richard Riordan warned Angelenos, even as he praised them for a coolheaded response to the crisis. "Let's all stick together."






Twenty six fires that swept Southern California the Fall of 1993 left four people dead and cause at least \$1 billion in damage.

Wildfires destroyed 1,150 homes, burned acro 200,000 acres and injured nearly 200 people Southern California in a matter of weeks. Addit to the horror, authorities said that 19 fires we set by arsonists.

After the discovery of two dead, Sgt. Ron Spesaid, "If it's an arson fire, then that makes murder. They were burned by the fire and as fass we know, it was an arson fire."

A \$250,000 reward was posted for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the a sonist.


The World

Dallas defeated the Bills 30-13 on Sunday, January 30, 1994, scoring 24 unanswered points in the second half after trailing 13-6 at halftime. Emmitt Smith, the game's Most Valuable Player, led the way for Dallas, rushing for 132 yards and scoring two touchdowns.


Smith, the league's MVP in the regular season, added the Super Bowl MVP award to his collection.



It was one of the most dramatic home runs in the long history of the World Series.

Joe Carter of the Toronto Blue Jays stepped to the plate in the ninth inning of the sixth game of the series, with two runners on base and the score 6-5 in favor of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Carter's Blue Jays lead the series, three games to two. And after one swing of his bat, the game was over and the Jays had won their second straight series. The right fielder circled the bases, arms outstreched over his head, and slapped palms with third base coach Nick Levya as the crowd in Toronto's Sky Dome stood and roared with glee.



One of the biggest stories of the 1993-1994 basketball season occurred before the first pre-season exhibition game, Michael Jordan, the world's best basketball player and one of its most famous athletes, announced his retirement.

Jordan's retirement came after he had led the Chicago Bulls to three straight National Basketball Association championships.


His departure, which Jordan announced at a news conference on Oct. 6, 1993, stripped the league of its most recognizable name and robbed it of a breathtaking acrobat who led the NBA in scoring the last seven years.

"The thrill is gone. I've done it all. There's nothing left for me to do," Jordan told a reporter the night before his formal announcement.

Jordan said his desire to retire at the age of 30 was not prompted by his father's murder during the summer; in fact, he said, father and son had already discussed it.


BYE BYE...
