## Albright Tutors Help Reading Students

In the fall of 1992 a tutoring program was set up between Albright College and Reading High School by Mike Steiner, a 1993 Albright graduate. After a successful year, he transferred the responsibility to Maura McLaughlin, currently a junior. As she continued with the program, a number of Albright students requested to tutor at the elementary level. The Thirteenth and Union Elementary School was notified and responded with great enthusiasm. Junior Suzanne Rehrig willingly offered to head this tutoring program.

During the first semester thirty Albright students tutored at Reading High School. The subjects they tutor consist of reading, writing, SAT work, all levels of mathematics, history and science. The volunteers tutor high school students from both sides of the educational spectrum: mentally retarded, learning disabled, college bound, etc. Some volunteers work one on one with students, whereas others are placed directly in the classroom while class is in session. Both methods proved to be advantageous. Working

one on one gives the student and tutor the chance to get to know each other and form a good relationship. The setting is quiet which prohibits the student and tutor from becoming distracted. In the classroom the tutor and student can still form a good relationship as well as the tutor and teacher. The volunteer is able to help more than one student. This enables the tutor and teacher to assist more students at one time.

The tutoring program at Thirteenth and Union Elementary School is now under way. Currently, twenty-one Albright students have responded to the program to tutor either one on one with a child or in the classroom. Due to scheduling conflicts only nine out of the twenty-one Albright students have been placed.

The Reading High School and Thirteenth and Union Elementary School Tutoring Programs will continue throughout interim and second semester. ## Choir Holds Holiday Candlelight Service

Every year, Albright College ushers in the holiday season with a festive religious concert known as the Candlelight Choir Service. Attended by over 500 students, faculty, staff, family, and members of the Reading community, this service is the most popular choir event of the year. As its title implies, the service's ambiance is created in part by the tradition of its being lit by the light of hundreds of candles. The 1993-1994 Albright College Choir has been hard at work all fall for this enchanting program.

One special aspect of this program is its dedication to the vast cultural influences that have enhanced the Christmas experience over the centuries. Featured in the concert will be German, Hebrew, English, Spanish, and African American pieces spanning the Seventeenth to Twentieth Centuries.

In German will be sung the Buxtehude cantata, "Das Neugeborne Kindelein," an impressive piece for choir, a choir quartet

starring Bonnie Sherwood, Laura Spatz, Kieran Daly, and Professor Roy Hinkle of the Music Department, and a string quartet including Professor John Pankratz of the History Department. Buxtehude is the composer whom young Johann Sebastian Bach traveled 200 miles to hear. He was also a contemporary of Pachelbel, who wrote the currently popular Pachelbel Canon. Another classic full-choir piece will be Psalm 150, sung in Hebrew, and accompanied by Albright's exciting pipe organ.

This year, the Candlelight Carol Service will feature several solos by students. Soprano and Choir Treasurer/Historian Katie Devlin will sing "The Birthday," a Twentieth Century English song written by the composer Alec Rowley. Choir members Kieran Daly (of Seventh Heaven fame) and soprano Amanda Probert will be featured in Catalonian and Appalachian carols. Choir President Bonnie Sherwood will solo in "The Lord Is My Shepherd," and Lisa Strum will sing the African-American Spiritual "Rise Up Shepherd."

Albright student instrumentalists will also participate in the program. Prior to the concert, a brass choir directed by Kristel Kemmerer will play as everyone gathers. Eric Musican, trumpet, will be featured in the contemporary psalm setting, "God is My Rock," and Holly Scheffey, flute, will solo in "Catalonian Carol."

Philip Holzman will be guest organist for the choir this year, and Chaplain John Gordon will lead in the Scripture Readings and prayers. Albright Music Department's Becky Gass-Butler has been "instrumental" in providing piano accompaniment for the choir all semester.

After the service will be a carol singing session by candlelight by both the choir and the congregation.

Choir President Bonnie Sherwood says of the program, "It's a really nice tradition that Albright has carried out over the years, and we'd like to thank the Albright and Reading communities for their support again this year." The Candlelight Carol Service will be held in Merner-Pfeiffer-Klein Chapel on Sunday, December 12 at 7:30 p.m. Choir Director Dr. Francis Williamson and the choir cordially invite everyone to join in the tradition again this year for an entertaining celebration to start off the holidays.

## Francine Britton Speaks at Albright

On Wednesday, December 1, 1993, Francine Britton, a local Reading author, joined a group of about twenty-five professors, faculty members, students and community members in the Campus Center for an informal discussion about her novel, *A Journey Into A Lavender Heart*. During this time she read various parts of her novel. Audience questions were generated along the way.

Francine's novel is a collection of short stories, poetry, and letters. In it she recounts her mental journey over the last five years. During this time she reached a turning point in her life. At the age of thirty-nine, after a period of intense pain and assault leading to depression, she was hospitalized for two months. At this time she underwent therapy ranging from art and dance therapy to hypnosis.

It was only after realizing that she had nothing left to lose that Francine was finally able to put her "phony" life behind her and begin to deal with memories of past abuse and also to deal with her own lesbianism.

Francine believes that *A Journey Into A Lavender Heart* is both a spiritual as well as an emotional book. In it she writes about her experiences of being a lesbian mother in a homophobic community, getting in touch with her own identity, discovering fulfillment in lesbian love, as well as dealing with new family relationships. Francine believes the book has something to offer all readers, not just those in the gay community. She is presently "out" in all of her relationships including her family, her workplace, and her church. By keeping active she hopes to provide a positive model for the gay community.

## Gift Funds Albright's Largest Scholarship

On November 15, officials at Albright College announced the receipt of a \$398,000 gift that, when added to a \$101,500 bequest previously received from the same source, will endow the largest scholarship in the college's 138-year history.

The one-half million dollar Margaret Woodring Brillhart and Margaret Hurst Woodring Memorial Scholarship is the result of the beneficence of S. Edward Brillhart who, while working for AT&T, was instrumental in the creation of the first Transatlantic coaxial cable. Mr. Brillhart, through his bequest, honors his wife of 62 years and her mother, "the two most beloved and influential women in my life."

Margaret Hurst Woodring was the wife of Dr. James Daniel Woodring, the President of Albright College in Meyerstown from 1902 to 1908. Margaret Woodring Brillhart was one of their six children, all of whom attended Albright. S. Edward Brillhart was

an alumnus of the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh, PA, therefore Albright College is indeed fortunate to benefit from his profound feeling for the two Margarets.

The Margaret Woodring Brillhart and Margaret Hurst Woodring Memorial Scholarship is intended to be a full four-year scholarship for incoming students who have demonstrated outstanding academic performance throughout their high school careers.

In her acknowledgement of the Brillhart bequest, Albright President Ellen S. Hurwitz remarked, "This magnificent gift not only enables us to prepare meritorious young people for the challenges of the future but also reaffirms the values prevalent in the days of President Woodring."

## Men Work to Curb Assault of Women

While self-defense and rape prevention classes offer women the means to arm themselves against potential assault, few such programs have been aimed at changing the attitudes and behavior of men. Now some college men are pioneering steps to teach their fellow males that rape prevention is not only a women's issue.

Tufts University senior Tom Penichter has used his leverage on the school's Inter-Greek Council (IGC) to educate fraternity members about sexism.

"If we look at this as a women's issue, then the most you can have is 50 percent of the population supporting you," he said.

At 6-feet-3-inches and 200-pounds, Penichter said it was unlikely that he would ever be the victim of sexual assault, but added that he "couldn't stay blind to the violence against women going on around me."

In speaking to the administration, to student groups and to the IGC, Penichter said he encountered a great deal of skepticism from people who did not understand his commitment to the issue.

"A lot of times I had to defend why I was doing this. I'm in a frat-- aren't I part of the problem?" he quipped.

Actually Penichter is doing his share to be part of the solution. He and some of his fraternity brothers have worked with troubled boys, teaching them about non-sexist attitudes

toward women, and how to curb harrasing behaviors. Penichter stressed the importance of being role models for younger kids so that they grow up viewing women as equals.

Together with other Tufts students, Penichter is compiling a resource book for friends of assault and rape victims. Sophomore Becky Harlan, who is working on the book and is active with the Tufts Women's Center, said she is happy that men like Penichter are pitching in to educate the campus.

"This isn't a male-bashing issue; it's society's problem," Harlan said. "Men need to listen with an open mind because their sisters, mothers and girlfriends might be sexual assault survivors."

Penichter also plans to serve as an educator on his campus with the federally-funded Mentor Violence Prevention (MVP) Project, which trains college athletes in the Boston area to teach their peers about sexism and rape prevention.

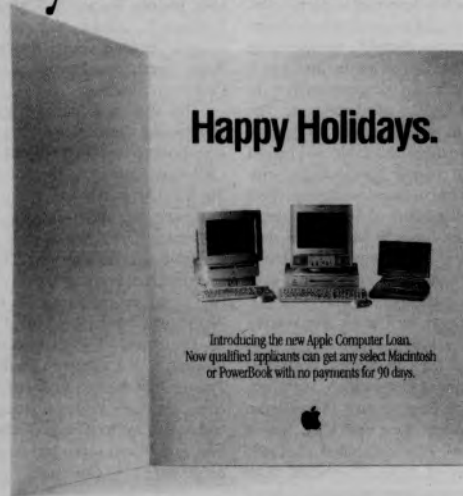
The long-term goal of the MVP Project is "to contribute to a significant reduction in men's aggressive and abusive attitudes towards women," according to project officials.

Jackson Katz founded the anti-sexist men's group Real Men in 1988, and has spoken on campuses nationwide to urge a change in the behavior of men who abuse women, and also those who stand by silently or encourage their friends to hurt women.

"The deafening silence on the part of men is a form of consent," Katz maintained.

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# UFO's: Fact or Fantasy?

Do UFO's exist, what are they, where do they come from, are they a secret project of our government, and did the government retrieve bodies from a crashed craft? Further, are ET's abducting earthlings? Questions such as these have polarized the public into two well-defined camps: the believers and the non-believers. Although the battle between these two factions has been raging for nearly five decades, for the most part the public is not aware of the details of the battles or their outcomes. This topic is now coming to the Albright campus.

In October there were two lectures presented at Albright by an astronomer, Dr. James Mullaney, who has logged thousands of hours in observation on large telescopes. Although these lectures were open to Albright students for a very modest admission fee, there were only a few students present. Perhaps the lectures were not well publicized, but whatever the cause, the seeming indifference was a tragedy due to the fact that Dr. Mullaney is an informed scientist who is willing to speak on such a controversial topic. He also presented a stunning slide show which included NASA slides that had previously been classified but which were finally obtained through pressures exerted by individuals under the Freedom of Information Act. These slides showed unidentified objects—objects that NASA must have considered important enough to classify and to withhold these pictures from public view. Simply stated, there are only two possibilities: either these objects are terrestrial in origin or else they are not. Suppose for a

moment that they are not, and consider the immensity of the implications of this statement!

Perhaps the question of whether we are alone in this vast universe is of no consequence to one at the moment. However, in light of some of the statements made by Mullaney, one might wish to reconsider one's stance; first, he stated that U. Thant, former Secretary General of the U.N., made a comment to the effect that the greatest problem facing humanity at that time was not the Vietnam Conflict but rather the UFO question; second, he (Mullaney) feels that the U.N. has prepared a time table by which each country of the world is responsible for preparing its people for what is coming "ET-wise." If one doubts this last claim, one might consider the number of references to ET's that have been appearing in high visibility areas such as commercials on television and ads in magazines. At the same time, it may also be equally significant that only rarely does one see any mention of UFO sightings in the newspapers; the full import of this absence can be appreciated when we hear Mullaney state the number of people who believe that they have had a sighting of some sort is 17 million. Of these, it is estimated that perhaps only 7-10% can not be explained. Yet even only 7% of 17 million is a staggering number and surely constitutes a sufficient magnitude to warrant investigation. Fear of ridicule has kept many from reporting their experiences; in fact, Mullaney stated that it has been estimated that only 13% ever do report them. Military personnel are also not likely to report their sightings for to do so may mean a fine of \$10,000 and up to ten years in prison.

In the morass of information, misinformation and deliberate *disinformation*, it is easy for one to feel almost powerless to sift fact from fiction. First, because the nature of this material is bizarre at most, and unorthodox at least, and especially because of the sensationalistic articles that frequently adorn the tabloids, the whole subject has gotten an unsavory or questionable name. Yet Ufology is quite respectable, in fact, there is currently a member of the Temple University faculty whose Ph.D. dissertation dealt with one aspect of Ufology. Secondly, if there is a deliberate attempt by the U.S. government as well as the other major governments of the world to cover up this whole matter, and if these governments have even "created" false "declassified" documents that researchers obtain believing them to be genuine, the task of winnowing out extant materials to discern the truth becomes even more frustrating and formidable.

In January, Dr. Arthur L. Hilt, Professor of Mathematics at Albright, will be presenting an Interim course entitled "UFO's, ET's and Space Beings" which will examine many of these and related topics. Students in the course will be reading materials both pro and con, many of which Dr. Hilt estimates the majority of students have never seen. They will be viewing several video tapes, including one dealing with the face of Mars. The entire UFO question may at first glance appear to be quite an inconsequential matter; however, in this course students will examine ramifications that extend in many seemingly unrelated yet momentous directions. Ultimately, such examinations lead to both philosophical and

metaphysical questions.

The intent of this course is not to proselytize but rather to bring this matter to people's attention and to encourage them to make their own decisions. The class will not spend a great deal of time reviewing the arguments as to their existence; rather it will take as a basic premise that UFO's represent a real phenomenon, justifying this stance by presentation of both written and visual materials. Morning meeting times will be spent in lecture and discussion, while the afternoons will be devoted to viewing videotapes, etc. It is the professor's hope that any interested students, whether or not they are enrolled in the course, will come to view these tapes and perhaps even enter the discussions which they are sure to elicit.

If suitable arrangements can be made, Dr. Mullaney will be invited to come to campus in January to give a slide show presentation again. This event will be open to all students, not just those in the Interim course, and possibly even to the public. Missing this event would be a great lost opportunity.

A concluding incentive may be the statement made by Dr. J. Allen Hynek, the astronomer who was responsible for the "swamp gas" explanation for UFO sightings, and who, originally a sceptic, later made a 180 degree turn to the extent that he founded the Center for UFO studies at Northwestern University, confided on the David Susskind show that the movie *Close Encounters of the Third Kind* was actually a highly dramatized hidden documentary. If that statement is true, what great surprises does the future hold for all of us? The answers may come in January!

## Albright Trustees Restructure

In a proactive move to increase levels of efficiency, interaction, and responsibility, the Albright College Board of Trustees refined its committee structure and revised its charter and bylaws during its annual meeting in November.

President Ellen S. Hurwitz, in her report to the Board of Trustees, enthusiastically endorsed the restructuring which, she indicated, would enable the Board to assess more immediately the College administration's adherence to policy; to work more closely with the administration in policy development and to gain a more intimate knowledge of all aspects of the institution. She also praised the Board for stipulating within their bylaws that faculty and students attend Board meetings in an advisory capacity, remarking that "the principle of including advice from the educational heart of the institution is paramount."

Galvanized by the leadership of the Ad Hoc Committee on Governance, headed by Board Chairman George A. Seighman, the Trustees voted overwhelmingly in favor of a committee realignment designed to mirror more closely the functions of the Albright College Cabinet. As reconstituted, the Committees of the Board are as follows: Executive Committee, Finance & Property Committee, Academic Affairs Committee, College Advancement Committee, Student

Affairs Committee, Admissions Committee, Nominating Committee and Audit Committee. The Finance and Property Committee will have Subcommittees on Human Resources, Investments, and on Lands, Building and Equipment and the College Advancement Committee will include a Subcommittee on Honorary Degrees.

In another action pertaining to governance, the Board approved a measure to reapportion the number of trustees elected by the supporting conferences of the United Methodist Church in order to bring Board composition more in line with other UMC-related colleges. The reapportionment would allow for greater flexibility in Board membership and permit the College to pursue relationships with Methodist conferences that more closely reflect the geographic distribution of Albright students. According to Rev. Susan M. Morrison, Bishop of the Philadelphia conference, this move also "reflects a national pattern that is a necessary response to fiscal realities."

In other business, the Trustees unanimously elected as trustee-at-large for a four year term ending in 1997 John D. Scholl, president, Berko Development Corporation, Mohnton, PA, and Calvin E. Green, partner, Philanthropic Consulting Services, New York City. Scholl is a member of Albright's class of 1969; Green, the class of 1950. Re-elected to an additional four-year term as trustee-at-large

were Salvatore Cutrona, partner, Andersen Consulting, Reading; Jerome Dersh, M.D., Eye Physicians Associates, Reading; and Samuel A. McCullough, chairman and chief executive officer, Meridian Bancorp, Reading.

Also included in the Board's elective process were appointments to the Executive Committee for a one year term: Raymond C. Schlegel, Esq., partner, Roland & Schlegel, Reading; Terrence E. Connor, Esq., partner, Austin, Boland, Connor & Giorgi, Reading; and Brian Hard, president, Penske Truck Leasing Company, Reading.

The slate of officers proposed by the Nominating Committee for the ensuing year was also unanimously confirmed by the Board: Chairman, George A. Seighman, Chairman, The Rand Partnership, Harrisburg; First Vice Chairman, Salvatore Cutrona; Second Vice Chairman, John F. Horrigan, Jr., chairman of the Board and chief executive officer, Horrigan American Inc., Reading; and Secretary, Edward H. Yarnell, retired pastor, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Red Lion, PA.

The Board of Trustees concluded their meeting with a tribute to the late Honorary Trustee John Moxon (d. October 24, 1993), citing his many years of exemplary service and dedication to Albright College.

Katz's approach is "not pointing the finger and saying, 'you're a bunch of jerks, change your act,' but to appeal to the better instincts and leadership abilities of male students," he said.

In one exercise, Katz asks male members of the audience to list the things they do each day to protect themselves against sexual assault. On most occasions the question is met with silence or giggles. When Katz poses the question to women, however, their responses fill an entire blackboard.

"My friends and I are talking a lot more about how women are perceived in our society," said junior Elizabeth Foster after hearing Katz speak.

At the University of Montana, Katz's talk inspired students to form a new men's group.

"Any man who cares about women should be concerned with these issues," Katz said.

## Sigma Alpha Epsilon Colony Established

Approximately one year ago this week a group of about 35 young men gathered together to show their interest in starting a new fraternity on campus. After a brief description of exactly what it would entail, provided by the head of Greek Life, the group of 35 decreased to 20 young men with high expectations and many long-term goals. After two or three more meetings they decided to pledge "Sigma Alpha Epsilon."

The first step of this process for the group was to establish themselves as an organization on campus, to which they became known as "The True Gentlemen Society." This name was originated with high regard to a poem entitled "The True Gentlemen," to which SAE abides.

During Spring Fever Weekend 1993, "The True Gentlemen Society" reached the second half of their four steps in becoming a nationally recognized chapter of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. After a very brief interview of the college and Greek Life at Albright as a whole, this group of young men were no longer "The True Gentlemen Society" but better known as Sigma Alpha Epsilon Interest Group.

The next step was a much longer road than the previous two. A balanced budget, community service, campus support, desire, and consistency are just a few examples of the characteristics and qualities that the interest group was now expected to portray. They began to work with the Big Brother Project of

Berks County, United Way, and Adopt a Highway Program. They sponsored various fund-raisers alone, as well as with the sororities on campus.

On September 20, 1993 a National Advisor arrived at Albright College with the intentions of viewing the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Interest Group as a whole in addition to other necessary aspects that were important for acceptance as a nationally recognized colony of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. They presented the Advisor with a book of their history, rules, and regulations, and most of their short and long term goals. Among these goals was the initiation of their group into a colony. Upon leaving, the National Advisor told them that he would be in touch and that they would soon find out if they fulfilled the requirements of becoming a colony of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

On October 21, 1993 the Eminent Archon (President) of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Michael Stephan, received a phone call from the National Advisor. This phone call would forever change their lives, as it projected a colonization date for November 7, 1993 of Homecoming Weekend. As of this date, the members of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Interest Group were now the Brothers of Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

The Brothers of Sigma Alpha Epsilon would like to relay to the Albright Community that its establishment here was not intended to negatively effect the campus in any way but rather to enhance the Albright College campus and community.

## Student Pugwash Links Technology to Environment

Many student environmentalists work on such specific problems as toxic waste, urban blight or rainforest destruction, but members of Student Pugwash are attempting to tie these various ecological and social crises to the larger issue of modern technology.

Dave Anderson is the northeastern regional coordinator for the group and a junior at Hampshire College in Massachusetts. This year he organized a student conference entitled, "Environment Change and Global Conflict" for the five-college consortium in Amherst. The conference focused on the depletion of

natural resources and the social conflicts that result from that depletion.

"The one thing I'm focusing on right now is education," Anderson said. "If students don't understand issues, don't look at them or think about them, then they will never take action, or the action they do take will be haphazard because they don't have good information."

Pugwash originally was founded in 1957 by a group of prominent scientists, most notably Albert Einstein and Bertrand Russell. The group was created as a response to the

development of the hydrogen bomb and was named for a conference on science and world affairs held in Pugwash, Nova Scotia.

Student Pugwash USA will be holding its national chapter conference next month at Stanford University, and the group will hold its annual international conference at Johns Hopkins University in June. Some 100 students selected from 25 countries will come together at that event for a week of intensive issue analysis and interdisciplinary dialogue with 60 eminent professionals from government, industry, academe and non-profit

organizations.

Student Pugwash was founded in 1979 and has sponsored more than 700 events on campuses across the country, including a student forum on "Overpopulation and its Effects" at George Washington University and "Race and the Incidence of Environmental Hazards" at Michigan Tech.

The Domino Players are currently performing an excellent play by the name of "The Boys Next Door" (running through Dec. 12). Created by Tom Griffin, the play quickly enraps the spectator. The Domino Players' obvious dedication to their work is omnipresent as they deliver a fabulous performance.

poking fun at the mentally handicapped and neglecting the realities of the congerly of biases the boys surely experience. For example, Arnold incurs daily problems at work with Melvin who forces Arnold to shine and polish his shoes.

Viewers, however, were overjoyed to see the mentally handicapped captured with the innocence and warm heartedness displayed by the boys. Ed Butler Jr. embodies this essence with ease, as one is virtually forced into adoring Lucien P. Smith.

The play, however, is not simply about mental handicaps, rather handicaps of all kinds. Barry's father has only one arm. His father's disability has embittered him towards the world, but more importantly, towards his own son.

Jack has no handicap per se, but is handicapped by the "Boys" themselves. He acknowledges to the audience, "The guys are draining me." Jack loves the guys dearly but supervising them for some years has clearly taken its toll on Jack.

Superb acting, complimented by an amazing set, constitutes one of the best plays I've ever been a witness to.

This play is highly recommended to everyone with an interest in theater and even to those without.

One can't help but love each and every one of the characters and all their idiosyncrasies.

## What's NADI and Nice

"It's exciting, it's new, and yet it represents fifty years of experience, identity, and visual innovation," advertises an add for the 103rd visually stimulating display show, NADI. "Where a world of ideas meets a street of innovations..." adulates another.

What possibly could be worthy of such praise? The National Association of Display Industries, known casually to those affiliated with the fashion industry as NADI, presented its winter market of visual marketing and store design products. Such are used by only the most reputable store planners and designers, visual merchandisers, and sales promotion personnel.

As over two hundred exhibitors were featured, piers ninety and ninety-two were bustling with enthusiastic customers and voyeurs from December 4-7. Over seventy permanent showrooms, as well, debuted their newest innovations for creatively exhibiting merchandise.

"The power of creative display" was certainly at work in New York City, the hub of the visual apparel industry. Produced and managed by George Little Management, the entire program consisted of alluring exhibits, instructional seminars, and prodigious student contest winners.

From seductive mannequins who proudly wore a selection of wigs, to a display by Niedermaier which featured sophisticated variations to "the little black dress," NADI's methods of presentation appealed to Jacks of all trades.

Ended in a fine lace, a bodice of smooth lines which was mounted atop a french, satin covered footstool was featured at the Bernstein Display. A soft, rose sheet draped gracefully in the background which added to the serenely Victorian and romantic ambiance.

Flute Inc. of Chicago introduced a technique that included wrapping a customer's fabric around a vase and displaying it near a coordinating museum-wrapped canvas wall hanging. Together, the conceptual art works

allows the consumer to view multiple, intriguing variations of the product.

Paper mache sculptures of brightly colored red and blue primaries or contrasting black and white checkers and stripes attracted much attention. While merchandise could be featured on these props, matching sculptures were intended to be displayed near the poles to unify the entire presentation.

Just when the minimalist's view of visual merchandising became universal as the excess of the eighties yielded to a powerfully simplistic streamline approach of the nineties, NADI surprised its patrons with extravagant, technologically advanced designs.

A glimpse into the future was contingent as the Fiber Light Association invited viewers into an underwater world of neon fish and glowing treasure chests. In a 4x6 ft. fiber optic "Aquarium," a multitude of images and effects were created with two to eight light sources and color wheels.

Perhaps the most captivating display was that which presented several sequences on thirteen video screens that combined to form one complete image. "Expandaview" is a necessity when "floor and wall space are of the essence," noted CDI, the manufacturer of the replacement of chrome racks and mannequins.

Expandaview emphasizes the impact of the media on a public audience; what works for CNN viewers will just as immeasurable effect clothing consumers. Especially with a target market of fashion conscious teenagers and young adults, the up-beat music coupled with flashing, captivating faces on the various screens are sure to create an ambiance that will keep the customers returning to the store.

So say good-bye to the days of ordinary, metal T-stands and shelf-laden walls. Visual Merchandising is about being auxiliary as well as artistic, functional as well as funky. As for NADI's seasonal marketing displays? Prestigious merchandisers and socialite spectators wouldn't "trade" this carnival of color, lights, and aesthetic appeal for the world.

One word of warning to those of you who may decide to become regular readers of our column. As we know, there will be many of you ready to hang onto our every word.

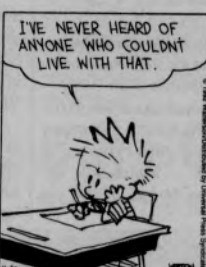
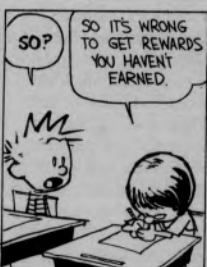
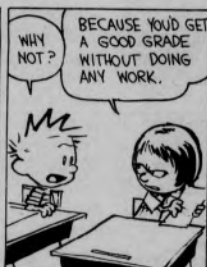
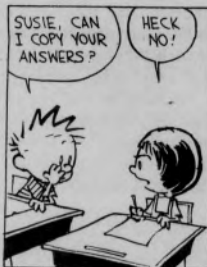
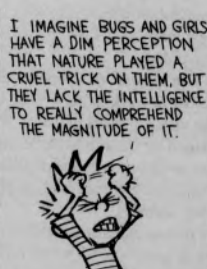
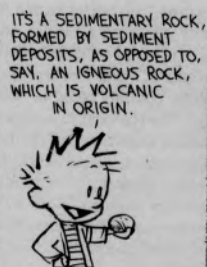

## Men's Basketball: At The Foul Line

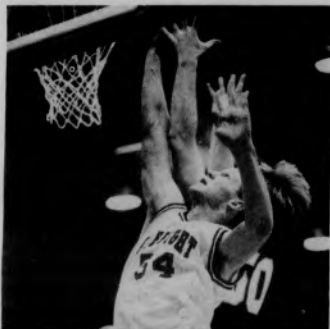

Then Albright began to take the tie off the clock, maintaining their fourteen point lead with just over 2:00 remaining. After an Albright time-out, they just kept the ball away from Drew to run out the clock.

Turnovers played a big part in the outcome of the game. Drew committed 31 turnovers

while Albright coughed up the ball 20 times. Miller isn't overly concerned about the turnovers. She said, "We play an up tempo game because we aren't very tall, so turnovers are a part of the game. I would like to say that we only have four a game, but we are simply too young for that to be realistic."

Albright guard and team captain Becky Shumaker hurt her foot late in the first half. Miller said that Shumaker should go to the doctor on Wednesday to have it looked at.

Kelly McCarty led Albright with 25 points on Tuesday night, while Jennifer Myers led the team in rebounding with 12. The victory improves Albright's record to 1-5 overall, but they are still 0-2 in league play.

Albright has suffered from an unexpected departure of key players from last year. Janice Johnson and Becky Shumaker are the only returning players on the team. The rest are Freshman and Sophomore newcomers. Miller said, "What the departure did was force some of these young recruits into starting roles a little more quickly than I would have liked, but they will learn and hopefully improve."

The team will travel to Tampa Bay for a holiday tournament late this month. Miller hopes that the team can gain some useful experience at the tournament that they could take into the second half of the year
