The retiring professors honored were Wilson I. Miller, professor of education and registrar of the College and Dr. Virgil Zener, professor of education. Miller has had a leave of absence this past year.

Miller Serves Church

Professor Miller received his bachelor's degree from Lafayette and his M.A. from Columbia. He also studied at the University of Pennsylvania. Miller came to Schuylkill Seminary as professor of education in 1919. Prior to this he served as a minister in the Evangelical Church.

Doctor Zener attended Indiana Normal School and the University of Michigan. He was graduated from the latter in 1910. Zener received his M.A. at Albright (Myerstown) in 1918 and his D.D. from Albright in 1938.

Active in Church

He taught for a few years in western Pennsylvania and also served the Evangelical Church in that section. It was announced that Dr. Zener will serve Albright in a part time capacity next year.

Criminology Class Visits Court House, Berks County Prison

Members of Dr. Morris S. Greth's criminology class took two field trips last week in connection with study about the criminal justice system as it functions in Pennsylvania and particularly in Berks County.

Last Monday, the group visited the Court House of Berks County, where Paul Tibbetts, probation officer, lectured to them and President Judge H. Robert Mays demonstrated the workings of the juvenile court. The class sat in on a civil case at which Judge Warren K. Hess presided, involving the contesting of a will.

Thursday afternoon, Paul J. Gernert, warden of the Berks County Prison in Bern Township led the class on a tour through that institution. The students noted the construction of the prison cell blocks, the opportunities provided for employment and for recreation for the prisoners, and the administration of a typical county prison. Berks County Prison is considered a model in the United States for county prisons.

The class will write a report on their visits, particularly comparing the Prison and the Home for the Aged which they visited last semester.
