General Biology students are studying as a final stage of their general education, the various theories of evolution. An evidence of evolution is shown by classifica-tion, which is based on morpholog-ical and anatomical similarities of the animal in question, so that the animals may be accurately classified into their phyla, sub-phyla and so forth. The way the animals rise from common stems to various families is also given as evidence

Furthermore, embryology which studies the earliest development of living forms points out the tremendous indifferentiation of the embryos of all animals in the earlier stages. Geology illustrates the progression of living forms from the simple to the complex, thus eliminating any ideas that complex forms arose at the same time as simple

Psychological evidences show that psychological reactions begin with the simple and proceed to the com-plex, as is noted in young children; for example, the development for example, the development o

Physiologically, relationships ed in many ways. One of the ways is the establishment of haemal relationships; that is, through a study of the plasmology of animals. Their re-latiouship has been established and this has shown at least one thing. The blood of the apes is most nearly related to man. Of course all of these changes must come about as a result of the influences of the environment or heredity.

This is a battle ground, although the study of identical twins and so forth seems to give heredity Hereditary changes result chromonismal changes, or mutations. All of which leads us into an inter-All of which leads us into an inter-esting field, genetics, but we have been told that these changes are often lethal. Where we have also been told by the "good professor" that if we flunk our genetics exam, this will also be lethal.

Berks County Prison is considered a model in the United States for county prisons.
